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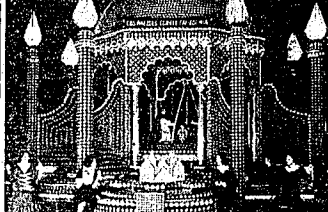

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TRACK RECORDS MAY TAKE DROP IN EAST MEET

Two Mile and Pole Vault Will Be Handled by Collegiate Stars—Why—Can Best Marks Now Standing

NEW YORK, March 4. (UP)—No less than four records are expected to go by the boards when the eagerly anticipated collegiate athletics meet opens here today. The four marks expected to be broken were the mile, two-mile, pole vault and 35-pound weight throw.

Crack Miller Entered of Pennsylvania University, as almost certain to smash Jimmy Connors' 4:17.3 mark for the mile. Connors himself is the one of the world's finest mile runners. He won the mile in 4:15.4 at the distance in 1915 to defeat Harry Conner, Leo Leonard and other crack veterans.

Joe McCleary, Fordham's runner, is expected to put the mile under the two-min mark of 4:12.3 set by Fred Stetter in 1922. Stetter, a former runner of Penn.

MUSCLE SHOALS

The Muscle Shoals proposition has been a moot question altogether too long in Congress. Just what is to become of the costly construction is a matter of universal interest. President Hoover has his ideas on the subject and stated them in his veto message to congress Tuesday. His position, according to the United Press account, is summed up in the following:

The power plants, he said, are earning a margin over operating expenses which could be increased if operated by such a commission as he suggested without further capital outlay. He believed all profits should be used for the benefit of agriculture.

While giving a detailed analysis of the Norris compromise measure in his message, Mr. Hoover laid his heaviest blows on the principle of government ownership involved.

"This bill," he said, "raises one of the important issues confronting our people. That is squarely the issue of federal government ownership and operation of power and manufacturing business, not as a minor by-product, but as a major purpose. Involved in this question is the agitation against the conduct of the power industry." Further he said:

"This bill would launch the federal government upon a policy of ownership and operation of power utilities upon a basis of competition instead of by the proper government function of regulation for the protection of all the people."

At another point the President declared he was opposed to the government entering into any business the major purpose of which was competition with private business though recognizing exceptions when emergencies made cost a secondary consideration or when flood control, reclamation or similar projects were beyond the capacity of private or local government capital to construct.

"But for the federal government to go out and build up and expand the major purpose of a power and manufacturing business," he added, "is to break down the initiative and enterprise of the American people; it is the negation of the ideals upon which our civilization has been based."

He said the Norris plan would inflict upon the people of the Tennessee valley "all the vicissitudes of national politics," "and the tyrannies of remote bureaucracy" over-riding state and local government.

The Senate manifestly was swayed by the President's words, and sustained his veto, which will insure that we can continue to talk Muscle Shoals, pro and con, indefinitely, without getting any closer to a solution than at present, it is regrettable to state.

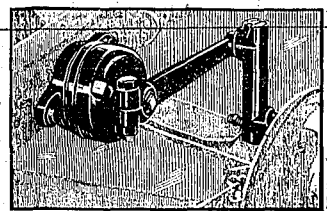

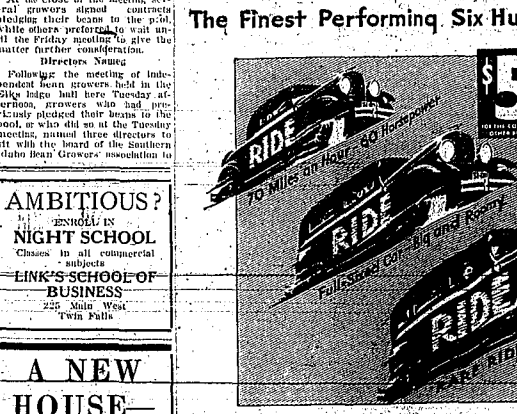
