THE BIG ONES

THE news story carried in the Evening Times Thursday indicating that the Bell Telephone system is easily the largest corporation in the world, gives rise to the question "What are the other great corporations?"

Investigation reveals that nearly one-seventh of the national wealth is represented by 24 giant corporations, whose aggregate value is approximately forty-three billion dollars. The Bell Telephone System, with assets of more than five billion dollars, heads the list, which includes seven railroads; five banks; five public utilities; four insurance companies, and three industrial concerns.

All these combinations have assets of more than a billion dollars each. Second to the Bell System is the Metropolitan Life Insurance company with assets of \$3,010,560,051. Other leaders are the Chase National Bank with assets of \$2,697,328,856; United States Steel Corp. with assets of \$2,286,183,655; Southern Pacific with assets of \$2,279,770,643; Prudential Insurance Co. with assets of \$2,266,768,637 and the Pennsylvania Railroad with assets of \$2,078,388,584.

Also included in the list in order of their size are the Guaranty Trust Co., National City Bank of New York, New York Central Railroad, Standard Oil Co. of New Jersey, New York Life Insurance Co., Canadian Pacific Railroad, General Motors Corp., Atchafalaya, Topoka & Santa Fe Railway, Continental Illinois Bank & Trust Co., United States Electric Power Corp., Union Pacific Railroad, Equitable Life Insurance Co., Transamerica Corp., Consolidated Gas Co. of New York, Commonwealth & Southern Corp., Baltimore & Ohio Railroad and the Cities Service Co.

MR. LEGGE RETIRING

CHAIRMAN LEGGE'S retirement as chairman of the Federal Farm Board does not mean a failure by Legge, but a failure of the principle on which the board operates.

Mr. Legge accepted the post at a great financial sacrifice and he has labored diligently. The financial problem in America, however, cannot be solved by heavy governmental purchases of grain in the Chicago wheat pit, nor by a timid policy of encouraging formation of co-operative associations. If the Government is to aid agriculture, it must give direct, stimulating assistance. This the Government, under the aloof ultra-conservative policy of the Republican Administration, will not consent to do.

The Farm Board has spent millions, and it has had a revolving fund of half a billion. It has, perhaps, cost practically as much, by its operations, as the loans to the war veterans against which Mr. Mellon stands against, would cost.

Mr. Legge is a colder but wiser man. If the Government wants to help the farmer, let it reduce the robor tariff, so that the farmer may enjoy reciprocal markets with the rest of the world, and may buy necessities without paying tribute to the tariff barons. —Chatanooga News.

BEANS AND TARIFF

WHILE congress was on its last legs Congressman Addison T. Smith presented to the Ways and Means Committee of the House arguments in favor of an embargo on dried beans, which, notwithstanding the tariff of 3c per pound, are being imported into the United States in large quantities, we learn from a communication forwarded this office by Mr. Smith.

The Committee decided that on account of the few remaining days of the session, the various embargo bills, applicable to oil, lumber and agricultural products, should be deferred until the next Congress, which is even less interesting.

Imports during the last five years of dried beans into this country appear to have been unaffected by the tariff.

The record of imports of dried beans into the United States for the period according to the congressman's figures shows that in 1926 the total, in bags, was 426,827; in 1927, 720,949; in 1928, 2,960,202; in 1929, 1,564,925; and in 1930, 1,792,635, despite the fact that the rate of duty was raised during the first half of the year from one and three-fourths cents a pound to three cents a pound.

It appears the solution to maintaining a good bean price, is not dependent upon the tariff.

"There ought to be a law" is a statement so often heard that it is little wonder that Congress and state legislative bodies are flooded with bills having no merit whatever. If people would more often repeat the phrase, "There ought to be less laws and more respect for those we have," something might be accomplished. A law to regulate about everything under the sun can be found somewhere now—but few things are regulated because of that legislation.
