SALT LAKE CITY, Mar. 10 (UP)—Decided opposition to the Garfield commission report received from Idaho and Utah senators today, when the report was introduced in the House of Representatives, was the first time since the report was introduced in the Senate that it has been so strongly opposed.

Little chance exists that they will fail to be re-elected, as the party for filling vacancies at the second and third polls has very meager possibility of an opposing ticket being written in on the ballots in large numbers of precincts.

SHIPPING INCOMES DR. GLENN FRANK, president of the University of Wisconsin, in a public address, broadcast Sunday evening gave a glowing interpretation of the present economic crisis in the United States and proposed remedies, as startling in their import as they were remarkable in revealing clear and logical thinking on the part of their intelligent spokesman.

Dr. Glenn Frank, former editor of Century magazine and, next to Dr. Robert M. Hutchins, president of the University of Chicago who is yet in his twenties, one of the youngest executives of a great institution of learning in the country, comes onto the scene with the enfrontery and presumptuousness more or less typical of the newer generation.

In a nut shell his solution of the Big Problem facing America is simply stated in his declaration that "The cure for our economic ills depends upon the shifting of a larger share of the national income into the pockets of the consuming millions."

In other words that when the great mass of the population has money to buy then there is industrial prosperity, agricultural prosperity and in fact national prosperity. He pleaded with his hearers "to think socially and to act nationally."

The speaker explained that he had been expounding this theory frequently of late and that he was amazed at the large numbers of leaders who were inclined to the belief that the shifting of the national income into the pockets of the millions offered a solution to the present distress.

Everyone is free to carry out Doctor Frank's suggestion to its ultimate conclusion; but it seems that all would arrive at one common point: that agricultural products and manufactured commodities should command prices commensurate with their costs; that no element of society can long profit at the expense of the other elements; and that the amassing of huge wealth in the hands of a few is at once fatal not only to society as a whole, but to the very ones who presume themselves fortunate in having amassed their millions.

Doctor Frank's proposal is not necessarily Socialistic, and if it were, it would perhaps not be accepted as such. He is fighting Communism. His theory simply goes back to the common yearning of individuals to have their fellowmen happy, contented, healthy, well-fed and profitably employed.

Cities provide huge community chests in an attempt to erase woe, oft-times of purely selfish grounds; employers attempt to raise the standard of living among their employes by salary standards, group insurance, accident and sickness liability, etc.; a Rocketteller or a Carnegie puts books into libraries, health in a Carnegie puts books into hospitals in order to improve the society from which additional profits will more logically come. It is considered good business, aside from its philanthropic aspects.

That then appears to be the Frank proposal: that somehow and in some way it is very true to the advantage of American business and of America itself, that the consuming millions—farmers, workers, the professional class, women, children, must have a larger share of the national income. Not, however in philanthropies and patriotes; but through the results of their labors and efforts, undoubtedly.

The suggestion of the University of Wisconsin president is not necessarily the solution but it is reviewed here because it is receiving national attention and because of open discussion of this engrossing subject is believed to be welcomed by Evening Times readers, who have displayed uncommon interest in a subject at once far away and close at home.

SPRING IS ABOUT HERE SIGNS of spring are many and varied, and most of them date back to prehistoric ages, when primitive man scanned the hillsides and the forest to see omens of the death of winter. But the best sign we know of is strictly modern and strictly American—the departure of the professional baseball players for the spring training camps.

Here is a harbinger that cannot be denied or overlooked. When those stories from the training camps begin appearing in the newspapers, set off with photographs of the athletes toiling under the hot sun, we know that spring is at hand. They may be snow where we live, and we may never see a game of professional baseball in our lives. But it does not matter. When the ball clubs go south, spring is at hand—or, if not at hand, just around the corner.
