Chairman Shouse Takes Hit
At Administration for
"Straddle Policy"

SCOFFS EDUCATION PLEA

Claims Work for Legge Was
Futile Effort

WASHINGTON, Mar. 13 (UPI)—Albert E. Shouse, chairman of the Democratic National Executive committee, today flatly criticized what he described as an attempt by the Hoover administration to "straddle" policy—neither here nor there—by trying to indecisive political strategy.

Recalling the apparent contradiction in the administration's stand, Shouse called attention to what he termed instances of straddling in the past.

He said that while Chairman Fred of the National committee was announcing a call to the states to support the administration and its efforts to unaniomously endorse and affirm the policies of the Hoover administration, General Edward F. Legge, chairman of advertising, "was coming down advertising a 'vacation from politics.'

He remarked upon the singular contradiction in the stand of Charles L. Lewis of the Farm Bureau, who had heard "after a year's futile endeavor" with the appointment of Legge as chairman of the advertising committee, "to encourage the farmers that crops are good and prices high."




