BEAUTY OR INDUSTRY

EARLY as the season still is, the matter of summer automobile touring is already beginning to occupy people's minds. Those who are going to go touring are beginning to day-dream about the places that they will visit, and to wonder if they will be able, by good luck, to afford new cars in which to do the visiting.

In this latter connection, there is a remark in Charles J. Finger's recent book, "Adventure Under Samble Skies," that is very much to the point. Every town in America that hopes to attract tourists ought to heed it, and it is worth reprinting here.

Mr. Finger remarks that every town has its "boosters' club" that tries to attract the visitor; and he continues:

"But how do they set about attracting him? By making pictures of the beautiful places near their town? By seeing to it that natural beauties are undiscovered? Not a bit of it.

"In nine cases out of 10 they will tell you about the factories and the banks and the churches and the good water, and the schools in their community. Now to do that is every bit as silly as if a business house should advertise that it had safes and cash registers and typewriters and ledgers. Such things are necessities and rightly taken for granted. So are schools and good water and banks necessities, and it should be taken for granted that every community has them.

"But what the boosters might do is search out their beauty spots and clear ways to them. They should look to the beautification of their town, so that travelers might wish to stay there, as the city of Leamington in England has beautified its streets and made them gay with flowers and potted plants.

"To put matters in a nutshell, the active-minded people who would do the right thing by their town should give some consideration to the tourists' point of view. But that they do not.

"Neither we, nor you who read, were ever, or are ever, likely to visit a town because it has an overall factory in full blast, or because there is a coal dealer and a wall paper merchant in it, no matter how much of a citizen of credit and renown the advertiser might be."

Would that civic boosters might ponder deeply over this advice! It would make automobile touring in the United States infinitely more enjoyable.

A SCHOOL FOR POLITICIANS

ONE of the gravest of governmental ills is the holding of public office by men deficient in political training and experience. In American politics it is customary to presume that men who know how to get votes also know how to administer a city or state.

Voters have later found to their sorrow that this does not always hold.

In an effort to place capable men in office in Spain, a branch of the liberal-conservative coalition party there has established in Madrid a school for politicians for the instruction of aspiring city councilmen.

The problem of electing men qualified to hold public office is not as simple as it seems. It has concerned philosophers through the ages. Plato urged that men be prepared for it.

"The only one in this country, so far as we know, who has agitated for a school such as Plato urged, is Will Durant, the writer. He suggests that a school for political training, analogous to that just founded in Madrid, be established here, to be owned and operated by the government. He would call it a Civil Academy.

Graduates of the academy, the "equipped and winnowed best" of them, would be the men put up for public office. Then the voters could take their pick. That, in substance, is the scheme. How it would work out, no one can say.

But it seems very improbable that the results of such elections could be as sorry as some of those we have had in the past.

JIM THORPE—DITCH DIGGER

SOMEHOW you can't help admiring Jim Thorpe. Once the greatest athlete in the world, Jim was discovered the other day out in Los Angeles, a common laborer, swinging pick and shovel in a ditch.

In football, baseball, and track and field sports, none was greater than Thorpe in his day. Money came easy after he turned his talents to professional sport. But the money dwindled away.

Many men of the world of sports, when their heyday of quick, easy money passes, continue to seek money in some sort of chess racket or near-racket, rather than work. The habit of easy-money, easy-go is too hard to break. They never amount to anything, after that one brief moment of sporting triumph. They have forgotten, or have never learned, how to work.

But not Jim Thorpe. When need came, Jim rolled up his sleeves and took a pick in his hand. And he's been supporting a wife and two fine kids on his earnings. He doesn't earn much, but it's honest money.

Many opportunities must have come to Thorpe to get money in other ways, trading the last scraps of his

great name to some cheap racketeer, bootlegger, or film-flam promoter. But Jim digged with his hands instead.

A man who can do that must have stuff in him. Jim Thorpe deserves a break.
