NEW LOW WHEAT PRICE PREDICTED FOR U. S. MARKET

Question of Disposition of Grain Held by Government Causes Anxiety

BORAH SUGGESTS FLOUR Idaho Shipment to Would Make Shipments to China

WASHINGTON, Mar. 24 (UP)—Secretary of Agriculture Hyde yesterday announced that he is writing as vigorously as he can to urge the government to dispose of its surplus wheat as soon as possible.

Washington, Mar. 24 (UP)—A steady decline toward the normal price levels today appeared inevitable for American wheat.

The board's handsome, good natured chairman, James C. Stone, said that the board is anxious to get beyond the announcement by which the board made known its decision to allow wheat to be purchased after July 1.

Minimum of Burden—The chairman said that wheat will be handled in such a way as to impose the minimum of burden upon the farmer and the consumer.

A general understanding of the government wheat situation was reached in the board's meeting today.

"If this condition is permitted to continue, it will not only depress the market but it will greatly embarrass the farmer in the matter of credit with the loan banks."

The world price has reached at least \$1.50 a bushel, and then only a slight increase has been noted.

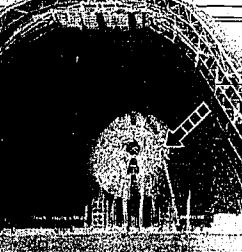

SAN JUAN, Porto Rico, Mar. 24 (UP)—Economic advancement can be made the bulwark of liberty and freedom itself, President Hoover told the people of Porto Rico Tuesday morning.

Hoover was delivering his formal speech before the legislature after a brief visit to the island's largest city and just before returning to Ponce, P. R., to embark on a fact-finding tour of the Virgin Islands.

"We wish to see every Porto Rican with the same opportunity in life which we believe every American citizen is entitled to," he said.

"Economic advancement is not necessarily the foundation of a nation's moral and spiritual advancement."

Hoover said that the United States is interested in the economic advancement of every nation, but that it is particularly interested in the advancement of the Porto Rican people.

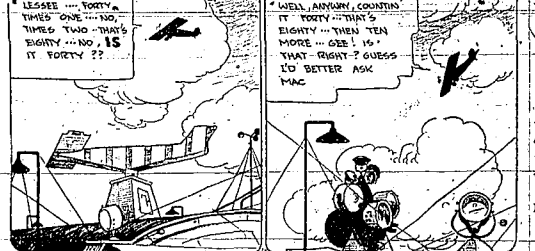
