NEW SCHEDULES DEMAND OUTLAY OF 105 MILLIONS

WASHINGTON, Mar. 26 (UP)—The greatest highway construction program in the history of the United States is being undertaken this spring.

Several states whose legislatures will meet in session have yet to complete bills on projects, but enough work already has been passed to afford employment to thousands who have spent jobless winters.

February was the busiest month in the history of the Public Roads Bureau. Night workers were assigned to care for the rush business in the one month \$25,000,000 worth of highway construction has been removed from the bureau's books.

Now, with good weather near hand, another big winter work program is to be inaugurated in the kind of work that provides pay for the unemployed.

The latest available figures show 2,425 miles of highway construction approved for a total outlay of \$105,532,285. This is to be added to the \$441 million authorized in 1930 and 1931.

Half of the money if approved by the Federal government will be assigned to projects that are approved, which would be matched by state funds to the extent of about 20 percent.

Increasing State Highway Aid—The Federal government has announced that it will increase its aid to the states for highway construction.

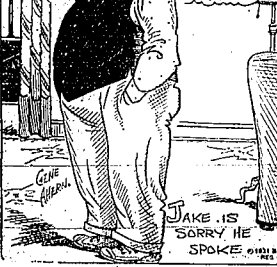

MUNICIPAL GAS COMPANY GIVES CITY LOW RATES

Texas City Enters Competition And Ousts For Consumers

CLAIM LOWEST IN WORLD

Piping Aided By Oil Firm From Neighborhood

AMARILLO, Tex., Mar. 28 (UP)—Amarillo has organized the own municipal gas company in competition with the Texas City and Gas Company, and as its chief advantage the city will have very low gas rates.

Domestic consumers will be sold at 2 1/2 cents per 1000 cubic feet, and large consumers will be sold at a low rate, some as low as approximately 40 per cent. lower than the present rate.

Work already has been by the Texas Petroleum Company in being gas to the city's gas, where it will be sold to Amarillo for five cents a 1000, being in competition with the city's gas.

At an added inducement, the Texas company donated 12000 feet of pipe to the city, and the municipal organization to begin with little distribution cost other than the cost of the pipe.

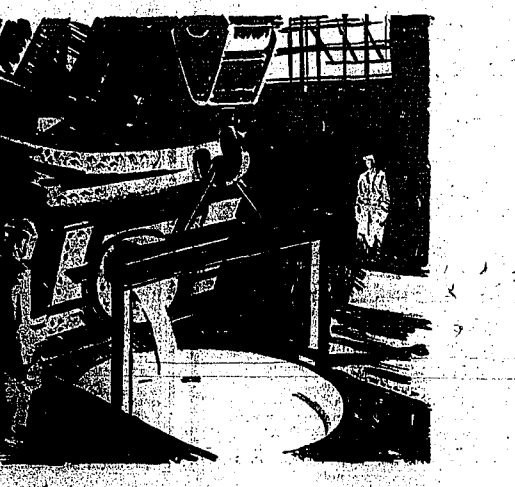

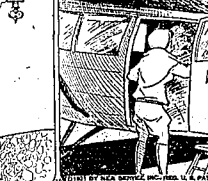

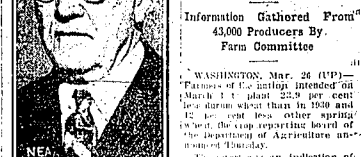

SPUD SHIPMENTS SET NEW RECORD AS PRICE RISES

Report Shows 1,223 Carloads
Of Potatoes Shipped
In Last Week

IDAHO FALLS—New shipment records were established by Idaho shippers for recent flurry of potato traffic. The volume of sales last week called out an exceptionally heavy supply of potatoes, not only from the larger producing areas but also from all of the outlying sections. The weakening of the market last week did not prevent movement from increasing to new high levels, because of the fact that practically all of the stock loaded were moving out of the state as previous orders.

Cartage trading was very heavy at local points last week, reaching a peak on Wednesday and Thursday. The peak of activity was followed closely by a sharp curtailment of the traffic, due to the fact that they would be best to move their property before buying further supplies, which was reported with the state on Saturday and Monday, although high rates continued fairly heavy with prices reasonably well maintained.

Idaho shipments last week were 1,223 carloads, the highest of the season. The former high mark was 1,115 carloads established during the week ending November 1. The per Spokane River valley loaded 710 cars of the total shipment, while the Snake River valley was credited with 484 loadings and 24 cars. The latter cars were loaded mostly in the Caldwell-Nampa section and around Salmon City, although an occasional car came from around Wallace. Small quantities of potatoes were added to the upper valley loadings by cars originating south of Pocatello. The heaviest loadings previously recorded in one day was 235 carloads, established twice during the 1927-1928 marketing season. On Friday of last week 211 cars were shipped out of the state, and this new mark was beaten on the following day when 278 cars were shipped. This record should stand for several years, provided winter's market, and do not over-plant again in the next few years.

High yields have been partly responsible for the heavy Idaho crop this season, but when the increase in 4,000 acres in 1929 to 17,000 acres last season is considered, the problem of overproduction is largely in the hands of the growers. SOLDER IS MADE STRONGER THAN METAL IT JOINS

PITTSBURGH (UPI)—A solder stronger than the metals it will join, has been developed by Peter Sotfel, president of the Pittsburgh Metals Purifying Corporation after three years of experiments and tests.

Sotfel claims the new solder will add to the safety of airplane and automobile construction and increase the demand for general aluminum products.

Tests, Sotfel says, have proved that his solder joins aluminum and other "white" metals more firmly than a single, whole piece.

White metals used in the manufacture of car handles and other parts of automobiles; the water magnesium and aluminum alloy products are all joined with the new solder as well as on aluminum. It is claimed.

Sotfel says he is prepared to place the solder on the market under a trade name.
