BOARD APPROVES BIG DECREASES IN WHEAT ACRES

Federal Men Successful In Influencing Farmers to Curtail Planting

IDAHO DROPS 24 PER CENT

WASHINGTON, Mar. 27 (UP)—The Federal Farm board has made substantial progress in its campaign to persuade farmers to plant less wheat than was shown Friday.

The department of agriculture reported that intended plantings of durum wheat as of March 17 were 23 per cent less than last year.

Proportionally other kinds of spring wheat were 13 per cent less.

The Farm board has consistently held the only way the American farmer can secure permanent relief is to eliminate their surplus production.

Last year the board lowered the wheat market by \$100,000,000.

It was reported that the acreage of wheat in 1931 was 1,000,000 acres less than in 1930.

The intended acreage of spring wheat other than durum is reported at 13,250,000 acres.

The greatest decrease was 35 per cent of the 1930 acreage.

The intended decrease in Idaho is 24 per cent.

The intended decrease in Washington is 15 per cent.

The intended decrease in Oregon is 10 per cent.

The intended decrease in Montana is 8 per cent.

The intended decrease in North Dakota is 6 per cent.

The intended decrease in South Dakota is 4 per cent.

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
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
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
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
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
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
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
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DEMPSEY OFFERS TO GO THROUGH WITH WILLS FIGHT

Former Champ Says He Would Fulfill Contract if Money Is Produced

CHICAGO, Mar. 27 (AP)—Jack Dempsey won an instructional bout Friday in the south of the Chicago Coliseum in which he received \$200,000 damages from him for alleged breach of contract to fight Harry Wills.

CHICAGO, Mar. 27, 1931.—A sudden offer to meet Harry Wills under the terms of a contract made in 1928 was interpreted Friday by many to mean that Jack Dempsey still has the nerve to fight again.

A week ago Dempsey made an "offer" formal announcement that he had definitely "wiped out" the ring, but he showed his true feelings when he allowed his contract to be broken.

Weight of trial "The fight with Wills, anywhere, any place, anywhere."

Wearing of the long, tedious court battle over the alleged breach of contract, Dempsey clearly showed he is ready to fight again if the stakes be high enough.

"Are you serious, Jack?" he was asked.

"Yes sir, I mean it," he replied.

"Are you ready to fight Wills, any time they get the money?"

"Certainly, ready."

Mr. E. (Bill) Clements, who is manager of Dempsey for \$500,000 over the Wills contract, returned he was ready to put the match on even 10 years later.

Arthur Hirsch, Dempsey's attorney, said: "We are ready to arrange with the contract as long as they show us the order of their money and do not offer us any money."

Frank Mullins, manager of Wills, was on the stand which Dempsey made his unexpected offer.

Mullins said the Negro heavyweight still is ready to meet Dempsey.

Judge J. S. Comerford, who presiding in the case, argued that a Dempsey-Wills bout would settle the boxing world.

Parade scene Dempsey again was ready to fulfill his part of the contract. He said he would raise the \$1,000,000.

"This whole thing has no future," he said.


