

EARTHQUAKE DEATH TOLL REACHES 1500

Rockne's Body Sent to South Bend

Flood Taking Heavy Toll in North Idaho and Coast Regions

Farmers fleeing homes in Lewiston Area; Trains Marooned, Log Jam Shatters Dam

LEWISTON, Apr. 1 (UP)—Farmers in this section were reported fleeing from their homes today as torrential rains swelled streams over their banks. Residents of the flat lands evacuated when Potlatch creek broke its banks and Clearwater river at Lewiston, was rising at an alarming rate this afternoon.

A passenger train en route from Lewiston to Spokane became marooned and a train from Spokane was forced to turn back at Moscow.

Dam Destroyed
A log boom released by flood waters, destroyed a dam at Orofino, crushed a railroad bridge and threatened another, according to reports. Seventeen other bridges lay ahead of the breaking log jam in Orofino creek.

The worst flood conditions in eight years prevailed today over the Pacific northwest.

At least three lives were lost, property damage was estimated at several million dollars, rivers surged, in angry torrents, streams overflowed lowlands, many persons were homeless and rail and automobile traffic was disrupted by steady rains that fell over a wide area during the past two days.

KENDRICK—About three feet of water covered lower Main street here. Families fled their homes to higher levels.

ELK RIVER—Milwaukee railroad tracks were inundated and the heavy rain had flooded basements, streets, drains and sewers.

LEWISTON—The Walla Walla (Wash.) Evening Bulletin published here today in the plant of the Lewiston Morning Tribune. Flood waters at Walla Walla made it impossible for the Bulletin press to be operated.

The focal point of the flood in Washington was at Walla Walla where the shock center condition in the city's history was experienced. Hundreds of homes were flooded by water that stood about three feet deep in the business and residential districts. Pavements were washed off parking auto traffic impossible.

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ROOSEVELT TAKES DRY REPEAL SIDE IN SIGNING BILL

"I believe," he added, "that the sentiment does exist throughout this state and that the greatest part of the sentiment is based on two rights, to eliminate the fundamental source of the greater part of modern organized crime, and secondly, to prohibit greater temperance."

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Debris Combed for Bodies; Rescuers and 300 Injured Face Peril of New Tremors

MANAGUA, Nicaragua, Apr. 1 (UP)—The once-flourishing city of Managua with its 35,000 population, lay in ruins today along the shores of its beautiful lake while new earthquakes shook the debris and added horror to the already indescribable scenes following yesterday's holocaust.

The new shocks were severe, and hampered workers digging in the ruins for injured and dead as well as exposing them to the danger of falling walls.

Relief supplies were pitifully inadequate. The water and food supply was dwindling.

A fleet of ships and airplanes converged on the stricken city from all sides, bringing food, clothing, shelter and badly needed medical supplies. Fire and quake held them at bay.

All reports from the city were that it was entirely destroyed, only a few buildings remaining standing, and most of those weakened and falling under the new attacks.

The death toll remained uncertain, with all estimates merely guesses in view of the slow progress of rescue work. Late estimates placed the dead at 1,500.

Irving A. Lindberg, collector general of customs and resident high commissioner, made a survey of the city last night and said that "many were killed and probably 3,000 injured."

"It is impossible to determine the number of casualties until the debris has been cleared," Lindberg said. "Many persons were believed buried under the shattered adobe houses."

Hardly a house in the city was left unharmed and the entire population and foreign legation was homeless. Damages will be around \$35,000,000.

The dead included Lieut. Commander Hugo F. J. Baske, of the United States Medical corps, Seattle, and Mrs. Joseph D. Murray, wife of a Concord, Mass., marine captain. Eight marines were injured and others suffered minor wounds in rescue work.

While the dead and wounded, particularly the Americans, were concentrated at the United States Marine barracks—which was turned into the main hospital—the emergency relief forces searched the ruins of the city all night. There were no lights except from torches and from the still burning buildings and the lack of water hampered efforts to halt the fire.

Marines had orders to shoot looters on sight. There were more than 400 wounded at the Marine barracks and the refuge families of Americans were concentrated at the Marine camp, where they were given shelter.

American Minister Anthony E. Hanna of Gillesville, Ohio, who returns today from San Salvador by airplane, will be in charge of the relief forces until the American Red Cross officials arrive here. The Red Cross Legation, which was destroyed during the earthquake, was killed.

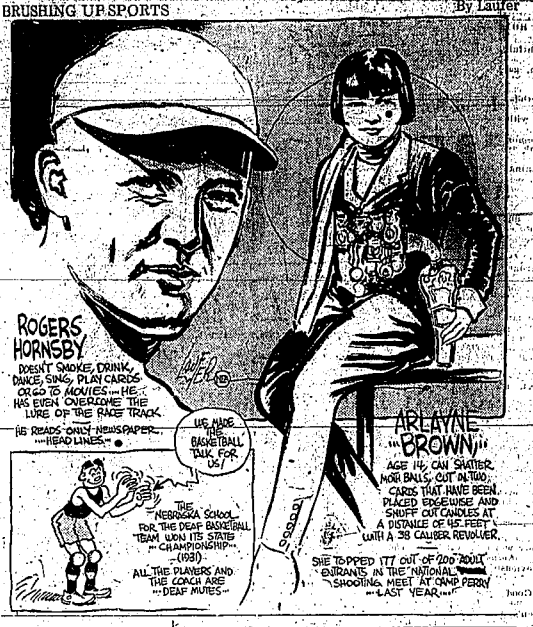

KNUTE ROCKNE

A STUNNED nation is today attempting to recover from the shock of the tragic news given to the public in the afternoon papers of Tuesday revealing the sad passing of no less a personage than Knute Rockne and his companions in one of the worst accidents of the air; and on its heels the terrible loss of life and property in the neighboring republic of Nicaragua.

Distressing information indeed for newspapers to herald.

While these two great news events are not comparable, the only comparison the Nicaraguan catastrophe gives the air tragedy is to lessen the horror of the latter.

Gone is Knute Rockne, the ideal of the athletic world. Known all over the country for his mighty mastery of the gridiron, he was at once the idol of young America and the epitome of what lies ahead for the great sportsman.

But he died at the height of his career; he had tasted the glory of success. Once more he proved that in America was unequalled opportunity for the immigrant lad. And as he had thrilled America with his daring accomplishments, so he died spectacularly in supreme tragedy.

Not only is his passing a blow to athletics, but what of aviation? It received another black-cy. And the movies? Rockne had been caught in the maelstrom of that engaging enterprise and was hurrying to sign a contract for his appearance on the screen. The movies then, has its loss to bear in the tragic event.

We glory and marvel in our modernity—the greatness of air transportation; the talkies; our supermen in airplanes with a hundred thousand persons in a stadium watching 22 men perform while additional hundreds of thousands keep intent ears to receiving sets—all these things the very acme of modern civilization—and here we have a man entwined in these same forces, a benefactor of the advantages and yet the victim of the defects of this modern age, proving the futility of our advancing civilization to stay the hand of fate—to eliminate the ever-present element of danger which faces each of us, or to give success, glory, victory, achievement, without also ushering in death, destruction, misery and tears.

Rockne and his men made great names for themselves. It is a pity that he was the chance victim of fate. For his passing is deplored as universally as it is sincerely.

In death, as in life, Rockne leaves a thrilling memory.

MAKER SNAPPY

IN THIS busy workaday world the great cry is for service, efficiency, quickness, shortness, brevity, economy.

A person contemplating a trip to New York, scans the map and decides to go by air. A farmer looks at a large unplowed field and determines he had better buy a tractor and do the job right now. Another wants to get to the coast by car, and for no reason at all gets up early and drives clear into the night, wiring back that he made 600 miles the first day in 12 hours running time.

We are an impatient people. We pick up a book and because it appears too thick or too heavy, we pass it up for a lighter volume. Watch a person choosing a story in a magazine. Invariably he will turn to see how long it is, and if it looks forboding, he will likely read the "short short" story. One magazine prints at the head of each article or story, the reading time in minutes. Small, compact, "reader's digest" types of magazine are quite the vogue, and newspapers—

One newspaper has set a length of three to four inches as the appropriate length for most "local" news stories; a solid column of type, in order to insure reading its "broken-up," with attention-compelling heads; few stories as possible are "broken-over"; inside or back pages; and above all their content must move swiftly, else the reader shifts to something more interesting than the hum-drum daily news.

We want our services and commodities quick and snappy. "Serve yourself," groceries, quick lunches, fast buses, hold-the-line long distance telephone service, quick shoe and hat repairing, pressing while you wait, right next at the barber shop, quick printing, short sermons—these are the attributes of the present generation.

We all lose something in the rush—in the go-to-bed-to-get-up-habit. The whole idea back of it all is to conserve time, to thereby live longer by doing more things and seeing to it that there is a being more things while we do live; but there is a question sometimes whether in our haste there is not also waste, creating nervousness and such a variety of conflicting emotions and reactions that the busiest of possibly make a fudge-podge of our existence.

IDAHO PRODUCE SHIPMENTS SHOW GAIN FOR 1930

Potatoes, Apples, Prunes Lead; Pears Showing Good Increase

546 CAR GAIN IN PEPPERS

Flour Ranks Third in State Origin Shipments

The annual report of the fruit and vegetable division of the Idaho bureau of agricultural statistics shows that Idaho more than held her own in the marketing of Idaho produce during 1930, shipping a total of 32,416 cars as against 32,314 cars in 1929. Potatoes, apples and prunes made up 91 per cent of the total shipments. There were 21,952 cars of potatoes, 6776 cars of apples and 1962 cars of prunes and 395 cars of pears. Raisins and peaches ranked fourth and fifth, respectively, with 1274 cars and 1201 cars, respectively. Apples and prunes ranked sixth and seventh, respectively, with 1100 cars and 1000 cars, respectively. The total value of Idaho produce shipments for 1930 was \$1,200,000,000, an increase of 169 cars over 1929 and 241 cars over 1928.

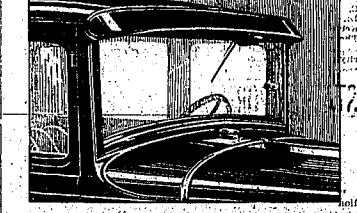

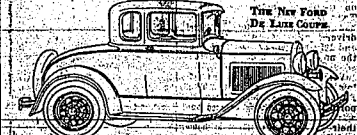

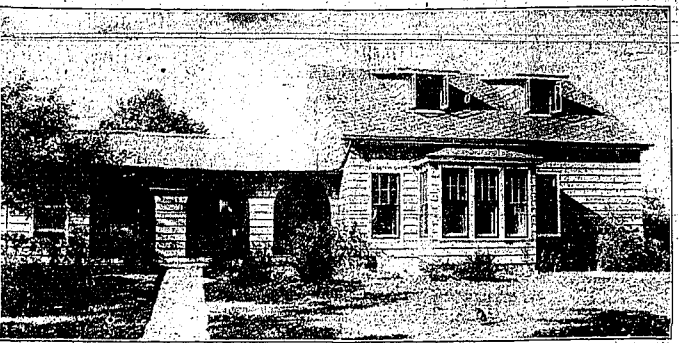

GREATEST CARE USED TO GUARD U. S. NAVY ACTS

Adds From Open Reviews Public Knows Little of Secrets DIVISIONS ARE SEPARATE Branches Kept Ignorant of Moves Made by Others

WASHINGTON, Apr. 1 (UP)—The fleet gathers for annual maneuvers, naval conference, ponder its tactical questions of tomorrow, numerous air plays die and soon afterward a demonstration, as President Hooper has been told, is being held in the United States navy comes into the public eye. But beyond those superficial glimpses, the public never sees, stores if seldom hears. The story that many know is one of increasing training and preparation, of constant vigilance throughout the world, of never-ending efforts to add the greatest forces with the resources of science.

Experimental Laboratory
In Washington, for instance, the navy department maintains an experimental laboratory. There are more than 200 trained scientists in the utmost secrecy. Some of them test test tubes, examine electrical apparatus, or other material remote from guns and armor plate.

The experimental work is organized into divisions. Radio, underwater sound, metallurgy, physical chemistry, heat and light, the dynamometer and so on, are all closely worked. That one division knows the nature of the experiments being carried out by another is not the case.

Occasionally the navy announces its successful experiments. For example, the development of the marvel of the radio sea-broadcasting net compact enough to be carried in an airplane, yet so powerful that its signals can be picked up over a distance greater than that of the average land station.

An Occasional Leak
Once in a while too, there is a leak. The navy recently was much annoyed by the publication of one of its top secret inventions, the submarine airplane. This plane, said to be capable of a high speed, is so small that it can be folded and carried in a tube on the deck of a submarine.

Constant rumors of other startling experiments circulate through navy circles. It is known that scientists in the laboratory here have devoted much time to study of the powerful gamma rays given off by radium, and that a possible test of this work may have on the navy's nature revealed.

It is reported the division of physical chemistry has the most advanced experiments of the utmost importance.

Their families sat weeping in the streets, chanting prayers. None of them slept and few had food or shelter.

The capital was almost cut off from communication with the outside world. The telegraph and railroad communication was completely interrupted. Operators worked in their cottages in the city until the walls of the building began falling. Then they moved to the outskirts of the city and continued their work.

Water Main Break
The scene of greatest calamity was in the central part of the city. Fire swept the wreckage where hundreds of houses were shattering at the time of the quake.

The water mains broke and jets of water issued from the cracks in the streets and sidewalks. The quick action of workers at the power plant in cutting off electrical power was believed to have saved the lives of many persons who were struck by high tension wires which fell in the streets.

DEATH TOLLS GIVEN
MANAGUA, Canal Zone, Apr. 1 (UP)—Reports to the United States naval headquarters here, estimated the death toll at 1,500 and said the total number of injured was 2,500.

The relief work was being organized rapidly by the United States Army and Navy. The Panama Red Cross issued a call for volunteers for a relief expedition to Managua.

Carrier Dispatched
An emergency meeting of United States Army and Navy officials and officials of the Canal Zone Red Cross made plans for special relief work at once.

REPORT NEW QUAKES
WASHINGTON, Apr. 1 (UP)—The navy department was advised by radio from Managua today that earthquake tremors are still continuing in the stricken city. This condition, the report said, made relief work extremely hazardous.

Most of Managua was still under the heavy debris and Army engineers from the contingent that was arriving in Managua today began canal route have taken over fire-lighting operations. They also are supplying medical assistance in addition to that given by the military.

The navy report said it was impossible to make a accurate count of the dead. The wounded still are being collected from the ruins and cared for by marines and engineers.
