New Quakes and Epidemic Peri-Face Rescue Crews Searching Managua Ruins

City Total Loss and May Be Abandoned; Dead Hurried Into Trench Graves to Halt Pestilence

MANAGUA, Nicaragua, Apr. 2 (UP)—The destruction of Managua, shaken into ruins by two days of intermittent earthquakes, which continued hourly last night, was recited today as complete. The city may be abandoned permanently. President Gen. Jose Maria Mora announced that plans are being considered by the cabinet for evacuation of Managua and removal of the national capital to Granada or Leon, rather than face the colossal task of rebuilding the city. He said a definite decision would be made in the next few weeks.

Meanwhile, the work of relief, the great task of removal and burial of the dead and the problem of providing food for the medical attention for the wounded continued under supervision of the United States Marine force which has been on almost continuous duty since the first quake.

Thousands of persons already have left the decimated ruins of the capital, which is a scattered mass of burned and crumbled buildings in one case, or a total ruin in another case. The people are fleeing to the other cities of the country, and on foot, the refugees have traveled for miles to escape the epidemic which has broken out in almost all of the cities. The American relief force is removing the dead, and otherwise as rapidly as possible.

The fire which swept back and forth across the city on Thursday was believed under control, although it still smoldered in some sections of the ruins, and might revive with a fresh wind.

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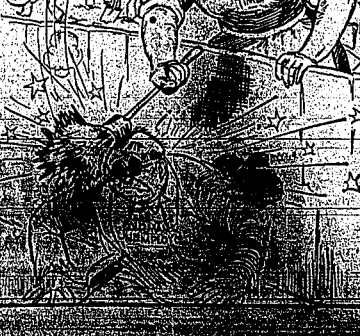
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PRACTICE TILTS WEARING FINISH FOR COAST CLUBS

FEAR AND WORLD PEACE

The mind of the militarist works in a peculiar manner. The ordinary mortal cannot hope to understand it, as he can do as watch and pray, that some day enlightenment will come to him.

General Ludendorff the other day expressed himself, on more, on the cause of the World War, and he revealed his sincere belief that war came because Germany was not sufficiently prepared.

To be sure, Germany's war strength in 1914 numbered 5,000,000 soldiers. But universal conscription, says the general, existed in Germany "only on paper." This imposing array of soldiery constituted only 54 per cent of Germany's potential man power.

Furthermore, the general says, other nations knew that Germany was neglecting her defenses; knew that she had nowhere near as large an army as she might have had. This, he says, induced France and Russia to provoke an attack on her, in the hope that they might catch her napping. Germany's military weakness, in fact, was a cause of the war, in that it led Germany's enemies to jump on her.

Thus we are left to draw the amazing conclusion that if Germany's army in 1914 had only been composed of eight or nine million men, instead of a measly five, the peace of the world would have remained unbroken.

Aburd as all of this is, General Ludendorff is merely expressing the stock argument of the militarists. Make your military establishment so over whelmingly strong that no one will even dream of making war on you, and you are safe; that is the credo. General Ludendorff has simply expressed it in its most extreme form.

The argument does not go over as well now as it did a generation ago. A world impelled by fear to keep the peace does not look attractive nowadays, and there are more people than there used to be, suspect that such a peace would be unstable. Fear, a usable force in world affairs, is selling at a new low.

We have not yet carried this new attitude far enough, however. In domestic affairs we still lean on the power of fear. We plan to keep crime down by making people afraid to break the law. We plan to keep the public officials honest by holding over them the fear of being caught cheating. We try to make our neighbors, think and talk as the majority thinks and acts for fear of a hostile public sentiment.

Will a time come when we take as sensible an attitude toward the use of fear in these fields as we are now beginning to take in the field of international relations? If and when it does we shall have an infinitely better society.

The small boy for all that we see so much of him, is usually a mystery. We talk a great deal about him; we have traditions that begin "small boys like me" and "small boys always want—" but half of the time we are wrong, and we seldom take any pains to get ourselves right.

The Boys' Club Federation of America recently set out to get the right slant on boyhood's ideals, boyhood's games and boyhood's habits. It questioned a great many thousand boys, scattered through more than 125 cities in all parts of the country; and it learned some interesting things.

To begin with, baseball is not quite as popular among city boys as it used to be. This is not because of any defect in the game itself. It is simply that the growth of cities has left fewer and fewer places where boys can play ball. Besides, the equipment is expensive.

In cities where boys' clubs or other organizations have provided athletic fields, baseball is as popular as ever. But in most cities the supply of playgrounds is woefully inadequate; and in such cases the lads play "soft ball," because less equipment and a smaller field are involved.

Boys' ambitions for the future are slowly changing, too. Years ago the average city youngster wanted to become a policeman or a fireman, so that he could wear a bright new uniform. Now the average youngster aspires to become an aviator. In the football season he is apt to think that he would like to follow in Krate Rockne's footsteps, and in the summer he may yearn to be another Babe Ruth or Hank Williams; but day in and day out it is the aviator who is his particular ideal—and Lindbergh is still the American boy's favorite hero.

Boys' reading habits seem to have changed for the better. The old yellowback thriller is still read, but it is not nearly as popular as it was a generation ago. Today's boy reads boys' magazines. It is interesting to note that he still reads the Alger books. Mark Twain's tales are favorites, and Ralph Henry Barbour is widely read.

Now all of this is a little more important than we suppose. Boys have a way of following their own bent in games and day-dreams. The most we can do is to see that the influences which guide their choices in these matters are wholesome. And by studying what they are playing and what they are dreaming about, we can tell whether they are succeeding. It is hard to thank boys for checking up on the matter occasionally, but the problems and games of today's boys may be reflected in the actions of the adult world tomorrow.
