CHICAGO, Apr. 8 (UPI)—William Hale Thompson, master politician who served three terms as mayor of Chicago, has been turned out of office by the German masses. In Cook, former Bohemian immigrant, whose career began in the coal mining country of Illinois.

Thompson's amazing victory over the polls by a majority of almost 100,000 was "Big Bill's" first taste of defeat during his spectacular career.
