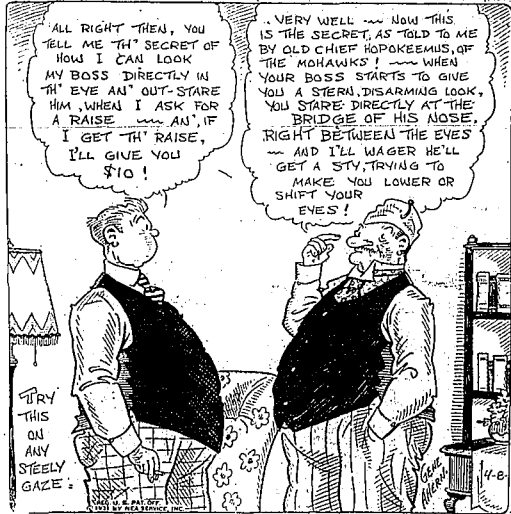

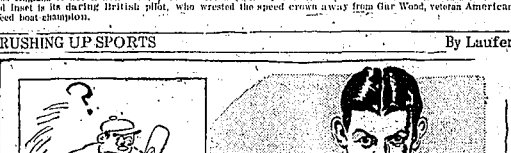

THE OIL SCANDAL

ANOTHER and may it be hoped, final chapter to the inglorious Fall case has been reached with the affirmation by the appellate court in the District of Columbia of the conviction of the former secretary of the Interior and Henry M. Blackmer of bribery. Both are under sentence to serve a year in prison and to pay a fine of \$100,000 for their indiscretions during the lamentable Harding administration.

In addition to the time, Blackmer has invoked the wrath of the courts for his contemptuous actions since conviction, actions in defiance of the government of the United States, constituting a brazen attitude unexampled in the history of the country. He says the court's opinion, a United Press dispatch, records:

"It ill becomes the appellant (Blackmer) after he has persistently manifested an intent to evade his public duty and embarrass the government, to say his conduct was not contemptuous of the court because other evidence was available to the government."

Associate Justice Josiah A. Van Orsdal wrote the opinion holding the jail sentence and fine imposed on Fall. He gave an evaluation of former Secretary of the Navy Denby who figured in the oil cases because of his part in the transfer of the naval oil reserve area to the Interior department presided over by Fall.

"Denby was passive throughout," the opinion states, "and signed the contracts and lease under misapprehension and without full knowledge of their contents."

Counsel for Fall based their principal objection to the jail sentence and fine upon admission of testimony regarding the Sinclair transaction involving Teapot Dome and upon exceptions to the charge given the jury by Supreme Court Justice Hays, but Van Orsdal held the admission of evidence to have been justified and the jury charge fair.

"The whole record of this case," he said, "is so replete with Fall's concurrent handling of the California (Elk Hills) and Wyoming (Teapot Dome) leases coupled with the fact that the moneys received by him in each case were used for a similar purpose that all doubt as to the propriety of admitting this evidence is removed. The record clearly shows that while there is no relation between Sinclair and Dohney, the defendant (Fall) was carrying along the respective transactions simultaneously and with common motive in mind."

And the end is not yet, we fear.

THE SPEAKER OF THE HOUSE

THE unanimous hope is that Speaker Nicholas Longworth will recover from his serious illness at Alton, S. C.

Though by day Longworth always has been a Republican, such a strong one that he refused to follow his famous father-in-law, the late President Theodore Roosevelt, out of the party in 1912, by night he has been the great playboy of the capital, known in every circle as the "prince of good fellows" a jovial companion who cares not what a man's day-time politics are so long as he is a square shooter.

Wherever there was laughter after dark in Washington, Longworth was likely to be in the center. Most likely his arm would be around his best friend in congress, Rep. John N. Garner, Texas, Democratic leader and the likely choice of the Democrats for speaker should they gain control of the almost evenly divided House of Representatives.

His friendship with Garner, this comradeship of a conservative Republican, a rich man's son, graduate of Harvard, the outstanding aristocrat in politics who violated all of the rules of the political primer by wearing spats and glasses, who played the violin, piano and pipe organ on the one hand and on the other of the quiet, plain little Democrat from the plains of Texas typifies the spirit of Longworth.

Washington thinks of Longworth, not as the solemn presiding officer of the house, but as the epicurean in dress and suit. He is seen, say at Frank Hogan's party on Sheridan Circle, buttonholing by H. L. Mencken, kindred souls, singing "Down Where the Wurzburg flows."

Then you see him, at gridiron dinners, sitting near the President just beneath the flaming sign of the gridiron.

And after the dinner you see him at the Corby mansion on Chevy Chase circle. There are calls for "Nick! Nick!" No one except club reporters call him Mr. Speaker. Longworth hesitates. It is part of his life. He moves slowly toward the huge pipe organ in the music room. Then the deep tones of Handel's "Largo" ring out and the laughter is silenced. He moves over to the piano and gives once more his famous recitation which his punctuates by sitting down on the piano keys at intervals.

He is human; he is loved. That is why all America trusts his present illness is only transitory.

Rebels in Uprising On Madeira Island

LISBON, Portugal, Apr. 8 (UP)—A group of 500 rebels, equipped with arms and troops, and accompanied by four hydroplanes and artillery, were on their way today to take possession of the military revolt on Madeira Island.

The government, having declared a state of war by sea, also dispatched a new high commissioner, Fernando Borges, who is accompanied by 1,000 troops on the Pedro Gomez. Borges will succeed Silva. Lead, the commissioner of the town, was reported by rebels after the military garrison revolted and seized the port.

A cruiser also was ordered to the island to aid in combating the warships which were described as a movement instigated by political despots, including Gen. Gomes Diaz, governor of Porto Guimaraes and Sebastian Costa. It was hoped that the new commissioner would be able to bring speedy settlement of the incident.






