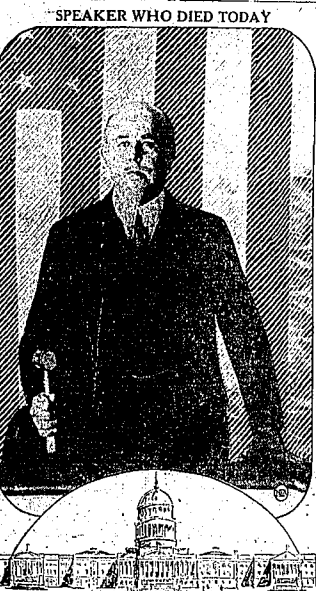

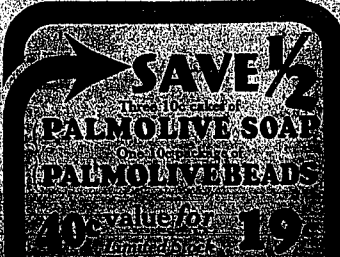



CENSUS BUREAU REPORTS FIGURES FOR TWIN FALLS MANUFACTURING

WASHINGTON, Apr. 9 (Special)—The census bureau today reported that the manufacturing industry in Twin Falls county has 21 manufacturing establishments employing 177 workers and paying an annual payroll of \$453,881.

Cost of materials, fuel and purchased electric current during the year, for operation of these manufacturing plants, was \$1,082,022, and the value of the products was estimated to be \$3,815,265.

Figures on City Industry—No figures were estimated for Twin Falls city, although estimates were made for manufacturing data at Boise and Postville. Twin Fall's 1929 census Twin Falls had a population of 10,000 people. As the census showed the population of Twin Falls city has increased the 10-

compared with 12,612 wage earners and products valued at \$60,256,239 reported for 1927, the last preceding census year.

Representatives of the Idaho state chamber of commerce also attended the meeting and the state organization pledged its support to the celebration in any way that it could be of service.

This was the first meeting that the executive committee had had with representatives of other towns and the members of the committee were highly gratified at the spirit of co-operation shown.

A. W. Jacobson, chairman, outlined briefly what the plan of celebration included and many valuable suggestions were made by the visiting representatives as the plan was unfolded. The general plan is to combine the canal dedication with a pioneer celebration which will center around the progress that has been made as a result of reclamation and the bringing of water.

The canal is practically finished to a point where it empties into Little Wood river where it will terminate. The entire length is approximately 70 miles. Fifty-eight miles are practically completed.

TWO AVIATORS ANNOUNCE PLAN FOR SEA FLIGHT

Confusion Follows as Both Want to Use Same Ship For Pacific Hop

TOKYO, Apr. 9 (AP)—Two different proposals for flights across the Pacific ocean were announced by three aviators within a short space of each other today, and when they learned that the same plane was to be used a controversy ensued.

The first announcement was made by Major P. N. Shumaker, aviation advisor to China, and Lieutenant Robert Short, who said they planned to take off April 15 from Osaka, Japan, in Lieut. Harold Bromley's plane "City of Tacoma II" on a flight to Seattle.

Shortly afterward, Thomas Ash of Seattle, arrived in Tokio after disembarking from the liner Hekua Maru and said he had the backing of a Seattle millionaire for a trans-Pacific flight, also in the "City of Tacoma II," starting from Japan to Noy.

Ash met Short, who accompanied Shumaker here, and learned that Short holds a power of attorney from Bromley to dispose of the airplane as he sees fit. The document is good until June 1. Ash said he has been attempting to sell the plane to the Chinese government.

Bromley started on a projected non-stop flight to the United States some time ago, but was forced back by engine trouble when 500 miles at sea. Since then the plane has been in storage at Tsuchikawa.

Short said that he had made a preliminary inspection of the plane and that it "might be capable of a non-stop flight to Seattle."

"However, I won't hazard an opinion until I test it during the next two weeks, as it needs overhauling," Short said.

Ash said that he had not been informed of the power of attorney, and wired Bromley now in the United States, for instructions.

GAS MAY OUST HANGMAN ROPE FOR MURDERERS

Arizona Sentiment Leans Toward Lethal Chamber to Replace Gallows

PHOENIX, Ariz., Apr. 9 (AP)—Growing sentiment in Arizona against the gallows, but in favor of capital punishment probably will result soon in adoption of lethal gas execution.

Governor George W. P. Hunt is the chief supporter of gas death. Should the governor succeed Arizona will join Nevada in "passless" execution. This is in sharp contrast to the practice of placing men half a century ago for comparatively minor crimes.

An effort by Governor Hunt in favor of the lethal gas chamber was frustrated this year when the legislature adopted a measure providing for it, but failed to include a referendum clause. In therefore, the act was unconstitutional and was vetoed "with profound respect" by the governor.

In his message to the 10th legislative assembly, Governor Hunt urged passage of a measure to amend and in vetoing the unconstitutional measure said:

"It is my belief that there will be sufficient public interest shown in this subject to cause the proposal to change the method of execution of condemned persons from hanging to lethal gas to be placed on the ballot at the next general election. Failing that, I am confident that the next legislature of Arizona will submit the question by a referendum."

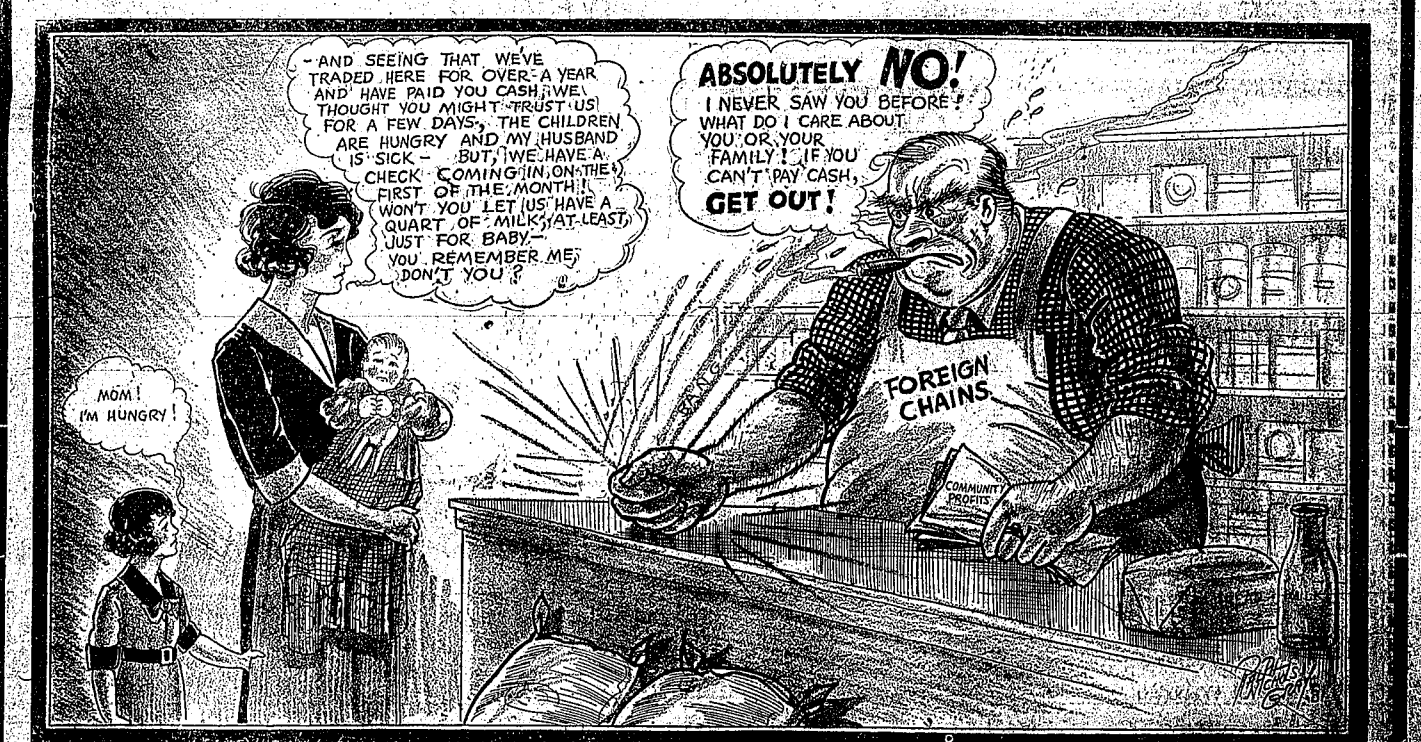

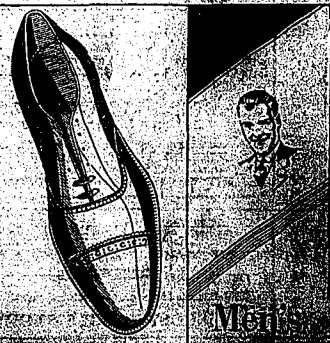

INCREASED USE OF WHEAT SEEN

Production Says Greater Crop Will Be Necessary In 20 Years

TOMPKA, Kan., Apr. 9 (UP)—Within two decades the United States will need its present volume of wheat production for domestic use, C. McGraw predicts in the April issue of *Crop and Farming*, an agricultural magazine.

He bases the forecast in an article entitled "Tomorrow's Agriculture and the Growth of Population," in which he sees an decline before 1929.

"Ten years from now," McGraw says, "there will be 45,000,000 more people to be fed in the United States, and an additional domestic market for 7,000,000 bushels of wheat by reason of population growth."

"Demand for nearly 1,000,000 extra bushels of wheat in addition to an increase in consumption resulting from new uses for cottonseed oil develop. Plans will be compelling the cases in the home consumption of meats, fruits, vegetables and other farm commodities."

The increasing demand for farm products will lead to greatly improved methods of production and high yielding, McGraw believes.

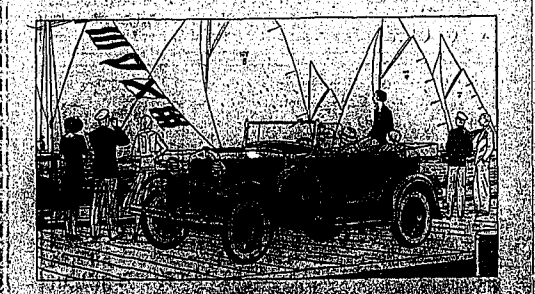
