## MURDER TOTAL IN U. S. SHOWS BIG INCREASE

Thirty Year Survey Shows Slayings Doubled But Convictions Drop

**CHICAGO, DETROIT LEAD**

Southern Area Records Most Homicides

**NEW YORK, Apr. 9 (UPI)** — Homicides in cities of the United States have more than doubled in the last 30 years.

A survey of 31 cities with a total population of 28,000,000 increased from 5.1 per 100,000 persons in 1900 to 10.9 last year. "The Survey," an insurance trade publication, also lists 15 having the highest percentages.

Frederick L. Hoffman, who made the survey, finds that twelve out of the 15 are located in states having the highest percentages. Memphis, Tenn., heads the list with 18.2, which is an increase of over 500 per cent.

England Better.

The average for the entire country in 1929 was 8.1. Hoffman said, "approximately 17 times as many men are killed annually in England and Wales."

Chicago led the five largest cities in the United States with 10,000. The others were Detroit—13, Philadelphia 7.7; New York 7.5; and Pittsburgh 6.2.

Chicago has had a higher homicide rate for the past four years, but it has been decreasing.

The number of slayings per 100,000 population increased from 1900 to 1929, but the rate has been decreasing since 1925.

**ENGINEERS STAKE  
LIGHTNING BOLT**

Tricks Are Learned While  
Experimental To Fight  
Broken Insulators

TRAFFORD CITY, Pa. (UPI) — A 3,000,000-volt lightning bolt has been taken in the laboratory of the Pennsylvania Electric Co. and Manufacturing Company here, but the factory engineers have taught the lightning that a few tricks.

After being struck, the high-voltage flashes in efforts to develop insulators for sub-stations and power houses to prevent them from breaking again.

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**RAILROADS**

DECISION of the Oregon Short Line Railroad company to curtail its service on the Twin Falls-Wells road, and now on the Minidoka-Buhl branch; according to a news story in the Evening Times of yesterday, is deplored by the general public.

When the Rogerson-Wells cut-off was projected, it was the hope of this community that eventually Twin Falls would be on a main line, at least that the new outlet to the coast would stimulate traffic so that this region would be assured of even better service than it was then getting.

A round-house was erected here, heavy rails were laid, the community contributed thousands of dollars in cash for the purchase of right-of-ways and the completion of the railroad was hailed as a milestone in the progress of this section.

In contrast, the vision of a few years ago with the possibilities of today, with an order for discontinuance of passenger service at Hollister; the necessity of forcing lower freight rates over the cut-off only by order of the Interstate Commerce Commission; the replacing of passenger trains with gasoline trolleys; and now the going away with pullman service on the Buhl-Minidoka run, and the trimming of schedules and services to the barest necessities.

Now the Oregon Short Line railroad cannot be subjected to severe criticism, unless its actions are entirely unjustified. Naturally the patrons and public feel the re-enforcement policies are drastic. While every business has been slowed down, still all business does not in consequence throw up their hands, close their stores two or three days a week, use on light instead of two and become panic-stricken. The alert business concerns revamp their policies, put on a sales force, use all sorts of legitimate advertising, improve their service, adjust their prices and go after business.

The railroad has seen the coming of the automobile, stage line, truck line and airplane carrier service — has tried to fight them, and acknowledged defeat when it entered the stage business itself. There is a note in the statement of the officials announcing the latest curtailment of service, which is significant: "A change in train service has been in contemplation owing to the serious increase in travel," it says, "due, as far as can be determined, to the more frequent use of private automobiles, supplemented by busses, and with a view of economizing as far as possible."

Just how the railroad is going to get more passenger and other kinds of business is its own concern, but a clear analysis of the situation dictates that either the general public is going to have to voluntarily give the railroads more business, or else the carrier systems must go after it with a clear-cut publicity and advertising campaign, pointing out its claims to public support.

It's true it is that the popularity of automotive vehicles has taken some of the railroad's business, but on the other hand the freight business generated by the automobile industry is enormous. Consider that all new cars are generally shipped by rail, as is gasoline, oils and other petroleum products. Like many businesses, it is possible that one department of the railroad may not be as profitable as another (in this instance the passenger department vs. the freight department) but this section of south central Idaho is certainly a large user of the railway, as everyone knows who contemplates the huge tonnage of farm products which goes from here annually.

This great agricultural region is entitled to respectable service and should not be satisfied with anything but the very best the Oregon Short Line will furnish, both as regards passenger and freight. To deserve this, the public might logically be induced to give greater patronage to the railways. But little encouragement is afforded when the chief move that is made is price-cutting and curtailment.


If these things are absolutely necessary, then priorities of little avail but the public is entitled to some facts and figures in the matter. At least the railway owes this to the public, for if its arguments are convincing, they will clear up what at the present is an exceedingly hazy conception concerning what is ordinarily considered the most profitable branch line on the entire Union Pacific system.



# GAS MAY OUST HANGMAN ROPE FOR MURDERERS

Arizona Sentiment leans  
Toward Lethal Chamber  
to Replace Gallows

PHOENIX, April 9 (UPI)—Governor George W. Hunt is urging the legislature to adopt capital punishment for all crimes except treason and espionage. In his annual message to the legislature he said, "In my opinion, capital punishment is the best method of dealing with the most serious offenders."

Governor George W. P. Hunt is the chief supporter of gas死刑.

Should the governor succeed, Arizona would join 32 states in capitalless execution. This is in sharp contrast to the practice of placing condemned men in limited men half a century ago for comparatively minor crimes.

An effort by Governor Hunt to have the legislature adopt capital punishment this year when the legislature adopted a measure providing for it, but failed to include it in the bill. He has now reintroduced the bill, which he claims the act was unconstitutional and was voted "with profound regret."

In his message to the 10th legislative assembly, Governor Hunt urged passage of a gas death bill, which he said was an unconstitutionality measure and:

"I am hopeful that there will be enough public interest in this subject to cause the proposal to change the method of execution of condemned persons from hanging to gas to pass this session of the legislature at the next general election."

Huntington said, "I am confident that the next legislature of Arizona will settle the question by a referendum."

## Scripps Warns Against Increasing Production Without Population Gain

**NEW YORK,** Apr. 9 (UPI)—Potential per capita production "is increasing the propelling influence of science and the machine," but there is "no apparent method or technique available to offset this condition." Robert P. Scripps, head of the Scripps-Hoffmann Laboratories, said in an address before the Farm Crop Board of trade today.

And it is conceivable, he said, that the social forces at work between these as yet unaligned groups—the people of America and the business world—will be determined to attempt to do something constructive about it.

Scripps also said "we must with fullest freedom" before the body of industrialists and business men, present his discussions of the problem. He added: "I think my statement that 'the big business crowd' is in much disarray with our present economic get-up and are thus crippled and unable to determine to attempt to do something constructive about it."

"We are in potential parasite production and the concurrent stability of population," he said. "We do not want to go to industry," Scripps said. Since 1930, he pointed out, "the race of science has been an accelerating race to get ahead of population growth has decelerated."

### Untouched Resources

The solution of the depression question lies neither in the unicameralism of the foreigner nor in the problem of foreign trade, he said. "We do not want to be members of a protective tariff. The importance of the foreign trade taxes should logically be ours; our own industrial gravity is such that we bindly accept a tariff that which interferes with and unnaturally restricts such trade . . . but ours is not a tariff; ours is one vote on the basis of foreign trade alone."

The whole point, I am trying to insist is that we must look first inside our own borders and not something else beside our vacant land," he said. "I am not against reserves. If we are going to do our part in the world's production and commodity distribution as to provide the public benefit, we must do our

part in the basis of foreign trade."

**Increased Spending.** In the light of all of the facts presented by Mr. Scripps, that consumption seems inevitable; that unless we are willing to break up the market and the production of our products in foreign countries, our

cycles run in reverse; the only
