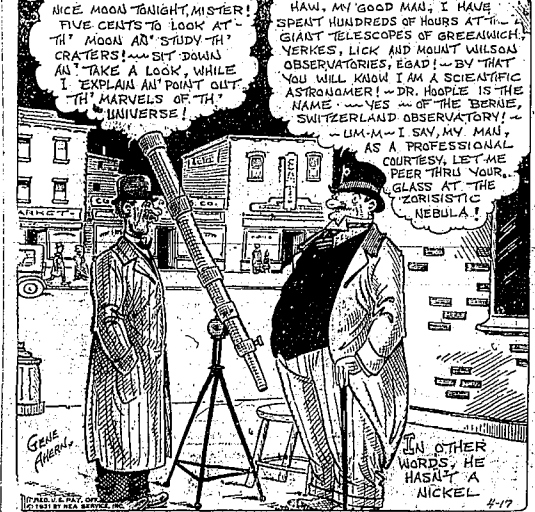

PERRINE EXPLAINS MIGHTY PROJECT

Plan - Would Irrigate Large Tract in Twin Falls and Owyhee Counties

BOISE, Apr. 17 (UP)—L. H. Perrine, Twin Falls engineer in charge of the project, was clearly visioned when he proposed to irrigate the site of the present project. Perrine has filed application with the state department of irrigation for 4000 second feet of water from Snake river which he proposes to irrigate the tract on the Bruncan plateau in western Twin Falls and northeastern Owyhee counties.

Perrine's plan calls for two canals, each 400 to 100 miles in length, will carry the water from the river to the project. Two diversion dams, each 200 feet long and 20 feet high, are included in the plan. It is proposed to construct storage reservoirs later, if approved.

One of the canals will lead from the river, carrying 2000 second feet of water across Salmon Falls river to the plateau, a distance of 115 miles through the present Twin Falls south side project.

The other dam, at the Gooding-Twin Falls county line, on the north bank of the river would divert 4000 second feet of water which it is proposed to carry across the river, through a canal 200 miles in length, over Bruncan flats, across Russian river by siphon and as far as Gooding.

A FEELEER

ATTORNEY General Mitchell is generally regarded in political circles as blazing the way for the 1932 Republican campaign in his treatment of the two prominent issues of anti-trust laws and prohibition in his Minneapolis speech Wednesday night.

His address, the first in a long time, stirred up highly political interest particularly because of recent expressions of views on the same subjects by Chairman John J. Raskob of the Democratic national committee, to which Mitchell's speech was taken as an answer.

The attorney general, who recently has instituted a series of suits against trade associations for alleged violations of the anti-trust laws, took particular pains to dissipate any idea he is a "trust-buster," and assured business that his department plans no "unwarranted attacks" on it during this time of depression.

In the same speech, which was a general report of his stewardship, he reiterated plainly that his policy of prohibition enforcement will be to worry only about the big commercial violators, the large "rum-rings" and "rackets," leaving the smaller violations of the law to state and local agencies. Philosophically he added:

"Wherever the local authorities are not dis-equipped to prevent them, there will be innumerable violations which the federal authorities are not equipped to deal with and never were intended to cope with.

In other words, if there is no local enforcement, there is nothing the government intends to do about which is a long way from the position taken by Republican administrations when the Volstead act was in its youth.

This discussion of prohibition was taken to indicate that Republicans plan to emphasize that the federal government does not intend to bother about the individual citizen who wants to take a drink, as a counter policy to the out-and-out anti-prohibition program of Raskob.

Mitchell's address took on a further political color by his praise of President Hoover and a defense of the President's appointments.

This may be taken as a sample of the sort of campaign speeches the country is in for between now and November, 1932, although the Mitchell speech can be considered as a "feeler."

Not only is the public confused as to issues, policies and their solution but manifestly party spokesmen are similarly at their wit's end.

"AN EYE FOR AN EYE"

The law of the savage is "an eye for an eye, a tooth for a tooth."

It is the spirit of revenge carried to the point of reprisal.

It survives in America in some of our laws. It many states, he who kills his fellow man must pay with his life if convicted of willful murder. This is nothing more than a primitive law translated into modern usage. Perhaps it is the best method of punishing murderers.

The state of Michigan just said: "No, it is not!" The people voted down a proposition to re-establish capital punishment.

This has brought to the front again the old question of whether the death penalty prevents murders. Statistics on the matter are controversial. The significant fact is this: England and other countries have proved a high percentage of convictions is a deterrent. Their few murders, compared with the number in the United States, proves it.

Figures show that the number of murders who actually pay the supreme penalty in this country each year is comparatively small. In fact the percentage of convictions for all classes of murder is much less than in England, for example.

To worry about capital punishment, then, at this time, would seem to be extending the issue. Before taking up the problem of "the kill or not to kill" in reprisal, as the savages did, it would be well to consider the more important problem of law enforcement and the certainty of some kind of punishment.

For we know realization by the slayer that he will probably be convicted, even though conviction may mean only imprisonment, strikes fear into his heart. That will prevent murders. That is the important result.

THE COUNTY FAIR

The holding of the Future Farmers fair here this week is a reminder that preparations have been underway for some time in connection with the Twin Falls county fair next fall—the biggest annual agricultural event which takes place in south central Idaho.

It will be reminded also that now is the time to prepare for the county fair. The seed being planted will produce the exhibits which will fill the production building at the fair. Fruit and bees and other county products during this part of the year will be a fair. A fair cannot be made in a week, but back of it lies months, maybe years of

careful preparation. And so it is with the Future Farmers fair and the Twin Falls county fair.

A highly competent county fair board has been named; H. W. Graves has been reappointed as secretary-manager; new enthusiasm is being brought into the fair and indications point to a most successful event. It is good that the Twin Falls county fair is a permanent institution, financially sound and publicly supported, making it the pride of the county.

The directors render a fine public service, without compensation but with high public appreciation. The fair deserves and commands widespread support this year and every year.

It's not too early to prepare for the sixteenth annual Twin Falls county fair!

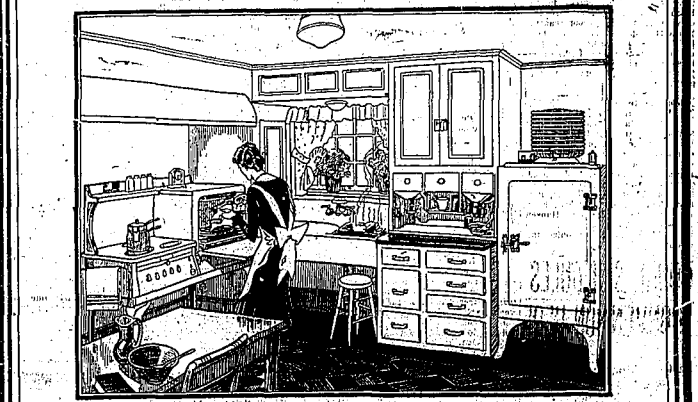



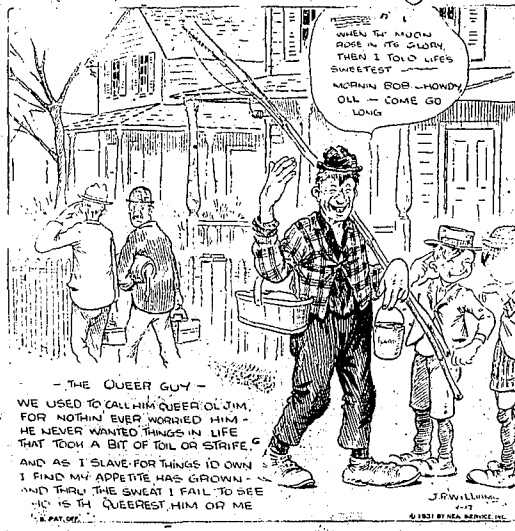
