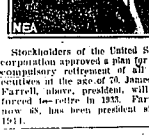

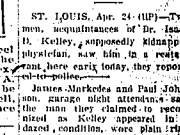

CANZONERI RISKS TITLE IN CLASH WITH JACK BERG

Battling Briton Favored To Take Crown From Tony In Chicago

CHICAGO, Apr. 24 (UP)—The flyweight championship, which changed hands twice last year on first round knockouts, will be at stake again today when Tony Canzoneri of New York meets Jack Berg of London in a 10-round bout at the Chicago stadium.

Actually two titles will be involved as Berg holds the junior heavyweight championship, and for the first time in ring history a title must be won and lost regardless of the victor.

The outcome pivots around Berg's ability to knock the lightweight limit of 125 pounds and retain the strength and stamina to keep up his tireless attack.

Berg was quoted as a 5 to 2 favorite today, technically because he whipped Canzoneri when neither held a title in New York in January last year. Few doubt that he is strong at the weight, Berg said in their first match Canzoneri had the pink-checked Englishman's arm in the opening round, but couldn't finish him and wound up at the end of 16 rounds a badly beaten fighter.

JUDGE JOHN E. DAVIES AS IT MUST TO EVERY MAN, DEATH

Respected and beloved by a wide circle of friends and admirers in this section, the fading out of this man's career seemed as well-ordered, as dignified, as serene as was his life and character.

In his hey-day he was a vigorous orator, a sturdy pioneer, a dynamic force in the community as a member of the bar, as a member of the political party of his affiliation, and as a citizen.

Withdrawn from public and infirmities, he gradually withdrew from the public scene, and his passing was as the sinking and the setting of the sun, even as his life had seen its zenith and its clouds.

Thus passes the procession of pioneers leaving a younger generation to record their eventful lives and to give pious expressions of appreciation for the works of their elders and the heritage that is ours.

LEISURE FOR EVERYBODY

The United States, says President Joseph Lee of the National Recreation Association, is now approaching an era of "leisure for everybody."

Mr. Lee made this remark as his organization's board of directors held their annual meeting in the cabinet room of the White House. He enlarged upon it as follows:

"Leisure for everybody, it condition we in America are now approaching; it is the most extraordinary change ever known to a nation. It means the coming of something unheard of in all history—the opportunity for every man to live."

"Perhaps it is just a little unfortunate that the United States, at the moment that Mr. Lee made this remark, held some 6,000,000 men who could not find work. A cynical person might be moved to inquire if we are to attain this 'leisure for everybody' goal through a constant increase in out-and-out unemployment.

However, social and economic changes require a long view. We are suffering today from a temporary setback, not a total collapse. Judging the case over a period of years, Mr. Lee is undoubtedly correct; and he points to one of the most profoundly important developments in the last thousand years of history.

Leisure for everybody means that more than just an increase in the attendance at baseball games, movie theaters, summer amusement parks and mountain resorts. It means something more than an increase in the stream of pleasure-seeking motorists on the highways. It means something more than an increased demand for luxuries, which industrialists like Henry Ford say will inevitably follow the shortening of working hours.

Of course, it will bring all of these things with it. Millions of people, beyond question, will waste their leisure woefully, to the despair of moralists. But back of this stands another, more significant fact. Work, for the average man, will become a means to an end and not an end in itself. A man will discover that it does not have to involve all of its energies to the earning of bread and butter. Scores of millions of horizons will expand.

This development will not be upon us tomorrow, and its fruits will not be fully visible for a long time. But it is coming. Sooner or later we shall find out how to use our labor-saving machinery to the best advantage. The drudgery that turns men and women old at 45 will disappear. And then everyone, and not just the fortunate few, will be able to have life and have it more abundantly. It will be possible, then, to start building a real civilization.

THE RADIO AND NEWSPAPERS

MEMBERS of the American Newspaper Publishers association meeting in New York have gone on record in favor of more rigid federal restriction of radio advertising, and adopted a resolution recommending that radio programs, appearing in newspapers, be handed as paid advertising.

In addition three resolutions were adopted relative to the problem of radio competition in advertising.

One resolution indorses in principle a proposed amendment to the federal radio bill which would prohibit broadcasting companies from accepting advertising which comes under the "lottery" designation and forbidden in newspapers.

A second resolution is concerned with relations between radio companies, press associations and newspapers in dissemination of news. It calls for appointment of a committee to confer with press associations on regulation of news given to broadcasters. This regulation contains the recommendation that radio programs be carried as paid advertisements in the press.

The third resolution calls upon the directors of the association to investigate the legality of broadcast advertising under exclusive government franchises of wave lengths in competition with other advertising media not enjoying similar governmental protection.

The privileges now enjoyed by federal-controlled broadcasting stations of giving publicity to lotteries, games of chance, etc., denied and prohibited to federal-controlled newspapers are most offensive to publishers, whose newspapers must conform to federal

Taking Stock of Last Year's Labor Shows Way to New Improvement

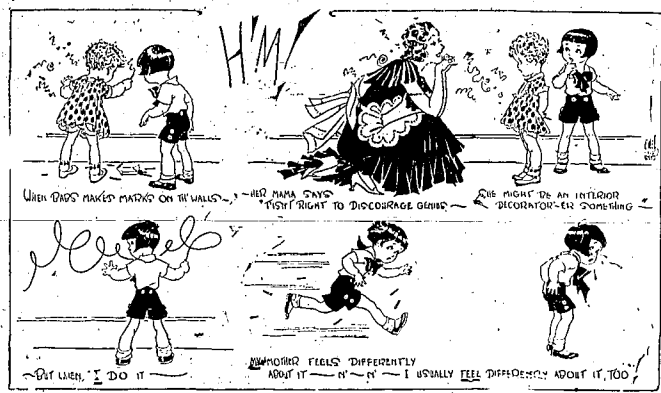

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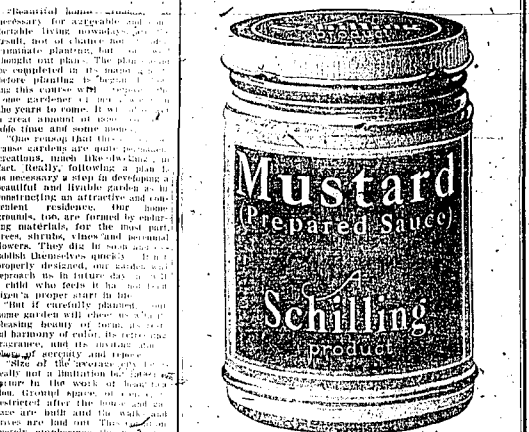

- Chocolate Fudge Frosting With Marshmallows**
- 1 cup ground chocolate
 - 1/2 cup powdered sugar
 - 1/2 cup milk
 - 1/2 teaspoon vanilla
 - 1/2 teaspoon butter
 - 1/2 cup marshmallows
- Mix powdered sugar and chocolate. Add small amount hot milk. Beat until smooth. Add butter, vanilla and salt. Beat until thick. Add marshmallows and stir until right consistency to spread. Add hot butter and beat until thick. Add vanilla and salt. Beat until thick. Spread on cake and cover with marshmallows. Bake sugar brown. Marshmallows on hot cake may be cut easily.

- Marshmallow Mint Sauce**
- 1/2 cup water
 - 1/2 cup marshmallows
 - 1/2 cup peppermint oil

- Chocolate Lightening Icing**
- 1/2 cups powdered sugar
 - 1/2 cups hot coffee
 - 1/2 tablespoons brown chocolate
 - 1/2 tablespoons melted butter
- Mix ingredients in order given. Beat until smooth and spread on cake. Hot hot milk or cream may be added instead of coffee.

- Fudge Cake Filling**
- 1/2 cup ground chocolate
 - 1/2 cup rich milk
 - 1/2 cups sugar
 - 1/2 teaspoon vanilla
 - 1/2 tablespoons lemon
- Mix all ingredients and let stand 10 minutes. Beat until mixture is firm. Roll until a soft ball is formed in cold water. Roll until candy spread between cakes.

- Hard Sauce**
- 1/2 tablespoons soft butter
 - 1 egg white (unbeaten)
 - 1/2 teaspoon vanilla
 - 1/2 teaspoon confectioner's sugar
- Beat butter, egg, lemon juice and egg white together. Add sugar gradually and beat until stiff. Add vanilla and cream. Add frosting. To make chocolate hard sauce, in the

Remember the wonderful cakes that emerged from the picnic baskets after you had rammed all day to some favorite spot for a "day in the country" - Sure - and the big old recipe in grandma's "pantry" if you were a HEAL, kid, you sneaked it when your house was quiet and got contrast the biggest slice you could carry away - and was it good?

It is no wonder that cake has come to have such an important place in our thoughts of good food. And in it small wonder that this is one of the first things a parent "gives his" for.

In case the cake is to be baked in a long tin, it is advisable to line the bottom of the pan smoothly with light-weight paper.

If else there is to be added, the eggs should be beaten together without being separated, and added to the cream shortening and sugar.

While In Quarters

Baking a cake is divided into quarters! During the first quarter the cake, during the second, the cake, during the third it begins to brown all spots, and in

the fourth it browns evenly. Call it done when it springs to a light touch, when it shrinks from the side of the pan or when it ceases to hiss or steam.

The right oven temperature depends upon the cake. Fruit or rich, wedding cake, demanding two hours or more for making could for a slow oven, about 225 degrees. Brown or Angel cake calls for a higher oven, about 300 degrees. Loaf cakes need a moderate oven, about 375 degrees, while layer and cup cakes call for a hot oven, about 475 degrees.

ON GREENS

There is a wealth of flavor in salads made of green or simple vegetables. It will be lost, though, if you cover them with a thick, heavy dressing. The flavors of such salads suggest a dressing - the French Dressing - Bachelor Club Dressing, or Vinaigrette Dressing.

To make Vinaigrette Dressing: Put one tablespoonful of salt, one teaspoonful of sugar, one-quarter teaspoon of pepper, a little paprika, twelve tablespoonfuls of Weston Oil, three tablespoonfuls of vinegar into a bowl. Beat with a fork until thoroughly blended. Stir in two tablespoonfuls of chopped dill pickle, and one teaspoonful of chopped parsley.

Rose Hedge is Beautifying Factor for Any Property

NAME SPECIMENS OF HARDY KINDS FOR HOME USES

Double and Single Row Types Are Offered by Florists For Cultivation

Among the numbers of those plants which are valuable for making hedges, perhaps the best known for this purpose are the Hybrid Rose hedges which are perfectly hardy and most easy in landscape work. Their foliage is leathery, dark green, and their heavy wood and sturdy formation make them especially suitable for hedging.

P. D. Greenleaf has characters of very double red flowers, and the pink form (Pine Grosvenor) bears "fingers" clusters of clear night shell pink bloom. Both of these grow to a height of four feet and may be left to grow naturally or kept clipped.

Other Roses which are best for an untrimmed hedge are the Polyantha, every tip of which is laden with pink double blooms, and Blue Double de Cochon, with fragrant, semi-double white flowers.

The Polyanthas are now being used extensively for hedges, for in addition to providing good looking, hedge material they brighten the garden with a continuous sparkling show of flowers. Some of the best of the Polyanthas are—Cragston Rose, its beautiful spray of semi-double flowers a silvery crimson; Edmond, bearing brilliant velvety red blooms; Richard Zettina and Mrs. Wm. G. Knapp, white; and Golden Salmon, the newest, probably a beautiful red-salmon overlaid with a sheen of rose and gold.

Even some of the Hybrid Teas may be used in making a Rose hedge. Escalier bears an abundance of scarlet flowers—the whole stems are strong, branching bushes which grow to a height of three feet. Another vigorous, free-flowering Hybrid Tea is K. of K. which has shining, red, fragrant, semi-double blooms.

For a close hedge the plants should be placed in a single row in a well prepared trench about 18 to 21 inches apart. If Roses are planted 12 to 15 inches for the Hybrid Teas, and 18 to 24 inches for the Polyanthas. If a more open hedge is desired the plants may be set farther apart in the row.

Cream sugar and shortening well and add vanilla. Sift flour, baking powder and salt together and add alternately with milk. When smooth fold in stiffly beaten egg whites.
