NEW YORK, Apr. 20 (AP)—"I wish Ferrell of Cleveland held a wide angle over his rivals today in the first major league hurling duel.

The 26-year-old right hander threw in his fourth victory of the year—and the fifth of his lifetime—by leading the St. Louis Browns to a 9 to 0 triumph.

Ferrell's masterpiece was the first major league game since May 3, 1923, when Carl Hubbell pitched the New York Giants to a 11 to 0 decision over Pittsburgh.

Ferrell himself pitched nine innings to his feat, and told the United Press that the highest praise he could receive was "pitching a no-hit game."

He received the game as proof of his ability to pitch a no-hit game, he said. "My idea is to go just in there and beat the other pitcher."

MEN AND MACHINES. DURING the next decade the United States is probably going to realize that its greatest problem is making its humanitarian accomplishments jibe with its technical and mechanical advances.

He begins by describing the factory purely as a mechanical thing, a device for turning raw ore into finished machines that roll away under their own power. His prose grows almost lyric as he tells of the marvelously-planned machinery, the perfectly-timed system for doing a dozen things at once, the almost-miraculously skillful engines by which modern America does its work.

What part of his article is nothing less than a rhapsody? Admiration is evident in every line. Then, abruptly, he switches to the human side. He records conversations that he has had with workers. He gives glimpses into their homes, shows stretches of their lives, tells how the whole business affects them.

Where everything in the first part bespeaks admiration, the second part is pitched in a different key. Workers complain of uncertainty; at any time a man is apt to find himself out of a job. The work is hard and exhausting. And always there is the cry for speed, speed, so that a worker loses home at night fagged out, unable to do anything with his leisure. There is no security, there is no contentment. A man is always under a strain.

Now it is possible, of course, that the workers Mr. Wilson talked with were unusual specimens. Manufacturers of automobiles will undoubtedly protest that working conditions in their plants are constantly being improved, are better than the average, are as humane as is possible under the circumstances.

The point is that a man of liberal outlook, visiting a huge American factory, has unreserved admiration for the purely mechanical side of things but has grave doubts where the human side is involved. Our machines, in other words, are nearly perfect; conditions for the men who serve the machines, on the other hand, are very far from perfection.

The development in these parallel fields has not been even. We are suffering badly from this unevenness today. During the next few years we shall discover that this is a problem of major importance.

PRESIDENTIAL TREES

A TREE planted by President Hoover has now taken its place on the White House grounds along with other plants. Mr. Hoover, who planted it on the other day, has received a certificate of membership in the tree planting army enrolled by the American Tree Association.

Many presidents have planted trees on the White House grounds. Not far from Mr. Hoover's tree is one planted by President Roosevelt. A little distance away is one set out by President Wilson. Within view is one planted by President McKinley. Farther away is one planted by President Hayes.

There is something appealing about this presidential tree-planting. A tree is a living memorial; more important, somehow, than a granite shaft or a bronze tablet. We hope the custom is continued.

SO COMPLICATED AND EXPENSIVE

REMAINING the guilt or innocence of persons accused of crime seems to be a complicated and expensive business.

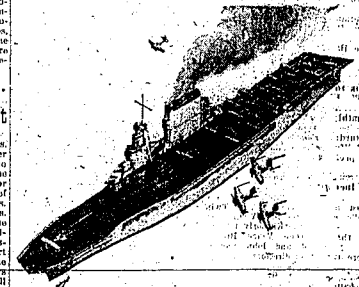

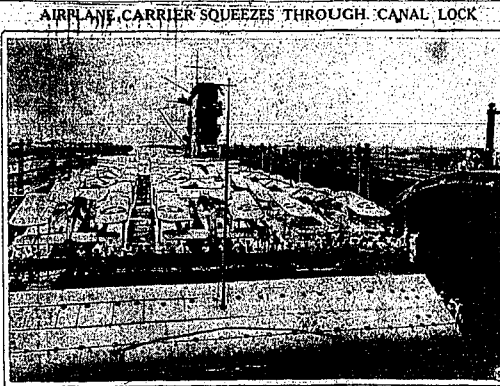

CONVICTS SUBMIT TO EXPERIMENTS IN SHEEP GLANDS

Physician Reports Headway in Disease Fight by Implantation

SAN FRANCISCO, Apr. 29 (UP)—The results of 12 years' work of scientific experiments, in which the glands of convicts were removed as possible agents of malnutrition for the society that reeducated them were today before the California Medical association in convention here.

As described by Dr. L. L. Stanley, British physician of San Francisco the experiment had been made of at least four widespread ailments responded to the implantation of sheep glands.

Diseases Alleviated.—The diseases are diabetes, rheumatism and arthritis, of several kinds. Dr. Stanley said.

The glandular treatment has been made among some 600 convicts, members of the prison population.

Dr. Stanley said the method has been to grind up the glandular substance and implant it into the patient's body.

After 12 years' work, Dr. Stanley said, it may be said that the glandular treatment has a qualitative effect and has a qualitative quality in several conditions.
