# WHEAT SURPLUS STOCKS GET CUT DURING MARCH

Eleven Million Bushels Out of Storage Last Month Report States

71 MILLION NOW HELD

Interior Mills Get Credit for Consumption

WASHINGTON, May 1 (UP)—Stocks of wheat in interior mills and elevators on April 1 were estimated at 1,200,000 bushels, in a report issued today by the crop reporting bureau of the department of agriculture. This was 1,029,000 bushels less than stocks held at the same place a month earlier.

The reduction of stocks of wheat during March was said to be about equal to the average monthly output during the same month. March to June, inclusive, no data was available for past years on reduction by month.

The report said the reduction from March 1 to July 1 in 1929 was about 4,400,000 bushels and in 1930 was about 40,000,000 bushels.

Receipts from farmers during March in interior mills and elevators in recent years have averaged about 8.4 per cent of the total receipts for the year.

Heavy in March  
The report on farm stocks indicated that surplus stocks disappeared from farms during March, May, and June, 1930, compared with average disappearance of about 3,000,000 bushels.

The report said the figures show that consumption in millings by interior mills has been unusually heavy to account for the net disappearance of about 11,000,000 bushels from stocks as shown by the report. Plus the 200,000 bushels more or less received by these millers during the month of March.

Idaho is entirely too gun minded. It is an inheritance from the pioneers, when a firearm was as necessary on the Idaho frontier as bread and butter and clothing. But the pioneers were not only gun-minded, they were gun-wise as well. It were better if we were either less like them than we are, or more like them in the matter of shooting irons and their use.

An astonishing number of Idahoans who really know little about marksmanship own firearms. The theory that a pistol or rifle in the house is protection against a burglar is nearly as good for defense as the hands of a hefty citizen—and a baseball bat—even when loaded rarely brings unintended tragedy.

If accident and crimes of sudden passion are augmented in number by our habits of having a gun around for adult use, even more hazardous is the presence of lethal weapons to the younger generation. No normal boy can restrain his curiosity about a rifle or an automatic. From his earliest play life he is an "Indian" or "policeman" or "bandit," with wild shouts of "Bang! You're dead now!" employing whatever is handy as a gun.

The first duty of a father or mother in this connection is to keep firearms safely out of the reach of children. The next, if guns must be owned, is to teach some how to shoot. Gun wisdom for boys is as important as teaching them how to cross a street without being run down by traffic. Yet most fathers and mothers show no concern about it.

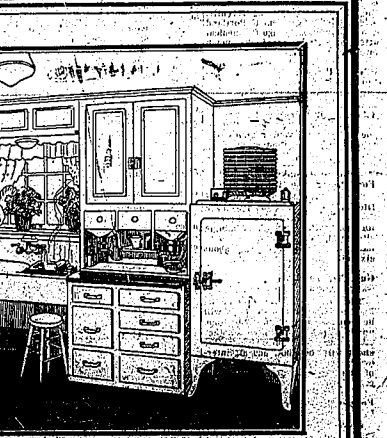

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### MR. BORAH AGAIN

WILLIAM EDGAR BORAH is in the papers again with an indictment of the federal bureaucratic system, based for the most part apparently, from facts supplied by Lawrence Sullivan in a series of articles appearing in the Atlantic Monthly.

However, Sullivan is not given credit for the "exposure" by Mr. Borah, who doubtless now sees an opportunity to capitalize on the spirit of unrest by denouncing what has long been denounced.

He has been in the Senate of the United States for some twenty-six years and has seen grow up the evils of which he now bitterly complains; he served through the lamentable Harding administration and certainly was not so dull as to be oblivious to what was going on; he heard Coolidge complain of the growth of bureaucratic government in his Memorial day address in 1926 wherein the President put into new words the very philosophy of Thomas Jefferson that the government would become weaker as it was farther and farther removed from the people; yet Mr. Borah made little attempt to right the wrongs inflicted by Republican bureaucracy.

In fact as chief advocate for Mr. Herbert Hoover in the eventful presidential campaign of 1928, he assured the American people of the necessity for making the then Secretary of Commerce the President of the United States, guaranteed his ability to provide a full dinner pail, continued prosperity, farm relief, prohibition enforcement, federal stability, and economical and efficient fiscal management of the government.

Now see what he got for his pains.

Sixteen million voters at that time disagreed with Mr. Borah, but now he virtuously says they were right and he was wrong.

Between campaigns Mr. Borah sometimes talks like a sensible statesman. At election times he reverts to hide-bound partisanship of a stripe incomprehensible to those large numbers of Americans who have long known what he is now talking about and who have and will continue to work untriedly to bring the government back to the people.



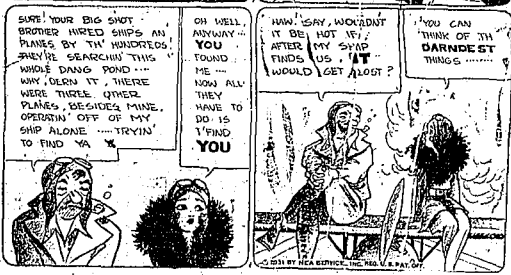
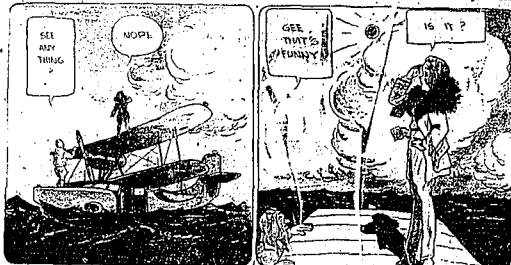

# KANSAS STARTS GREAT ELEVATOR EXPANSION PLAN

State Grain Bin Capacity to Be Raised 15 Million Bushels

Wichita, Kan., May 1.—The most ambitious grain elevator expansion program in the history of the westward movement was being carried out in Greater Kansas City today. Eight major projects were under construction or were about to start. They will increase the total capacity by 15,000,000 bushels, giving this market terminal the second largest storage capacity in the world, exceeded only by that of Minneapolis.

All the additions have been announced within the month, and will be completed in a few months for the initial movement of the 1931 wheat crop.

The Santa Fe railroad has announced it would add 4,000,000 bushels of bin space to its present capacity of 3,500,000 bushels a year. This will provide for the storage of 1,000,000 bushels of wheat, to be handled immediately on the expansion program.

The Kansas City elevator, which is being built by the Santa Fe, will add 1,000,000 bushels to the city's capacity. It will be the largest elevator in the world, and will be ready to handle its full capacity of 1,000,000 bushels in the fall.

The Missouri Pacific's new 2,000,000 bushel plant in the north-western part of the city will be ready to handle its full capacity of 2,000,000 bushels in the fall. It will be the largest elevator in the world, and will be ready to handle its full capacity of 2,000,000 bushels in the fall.

There are 14 public elevators in the Kansas City market, with a total capacity of 3,500,000 bushels, and 13 private elevators, with a total capacity of 2,000,000 bushels. Much of this capacity is packed with holdover wheat from the 1930 crop, most of which is owned by the federal government.
