

ONE DEAD, ONE HURT IN CAR ACCIDENTS

Hit and Run Autoist Vanishes Into Night After Striking Man

Wallace W. Pulsipher is Critically Injured While Walking on Road Near South Park Addition

For the second time in less than three weeks, a hit-and-run automobile driver figured in a serious accident here when Wallace W. Pulsipher, 30, Twin Falls farmer, was struck and possibly fatally injured by a machine which failed to stop after running him down.

Monday night, April 13, Pulsipher, a 5-foot-11-inch, 140-pound man, was walking on the highway near South Park addition, and although a fairly good description of the occupants of the death car was obtained, they have not been apprehended.

Officers held title of their capturing the driver of the hearse which ran down Pulsipher on the road about a half-mile south of South Park addition at the 11 o'clock Wednesday night.

75 FIRE FIGHTERS OVERCOME DURING \$5,000,000 BLAZE

BUFFALO, N. Y., May 7 (UP)—Seventy-five firemen were overcome by smoke in fighting a \$5,000,000 fire which, early today, destroyed a five-story, gray-iron armory and a church in the Buffalo Hill section.

Numerous houses in the area of the fire were damaged and 25,000 pounds of small ammunition stored in the armory, were set off by the flames. Police kept the crowd at bay for away from the scene as possible because of the flying bullets and hot debris, other than those suffered by firemen, were reported.

Steam Roads Make Plan To Commerce Commission for Rate Cuts

AUTO TRADE DECREASES Firms Say Reduction Must Come to Meet Crisis

WASHINGTON, May 7 (UP)—Railroad operators, watching their sources of income more closely than ever in the days of slim revenues, are becoming aware of increasing losses of business to competing motor truck lines.

The natural tendency of shippers to exercise every possible economy at this time was cited by the commission from the interstate commerce commission to reduce rates to a competitive basis.

The petition on file with the commission today, were daily the cases where previous rate structure investigations and orders had made interstate commerce commission authorization necessary before a reduction could be made. In many cases the railroads have been able to reduce their tariffs without asking the commission's permission.

Truck Business Hurts

At present much emphasis is being placed by the railroads on motor truck competition in the southwest. The danger cannot be over emphasized, they assert. Particularly is this true in oil shipments, they state, because producers are seeking to recall their reserves of every economy in distribution. One of the present low price of their product.

The commission's attitude since motor-truck competition began to make itself felt in recent years, has been favorable to establish the merit of competitive schedules. Yesterday the commission approved reduced rates on rail shipments of quantities from assembly plants in the southwest.

Four Complete Loss

The situation has become alarming from the railroads' point of view, it was said. The defendants fear complete loss of their automobile traffic for hauls up to 200 miles where reductions are made in the carload rates.

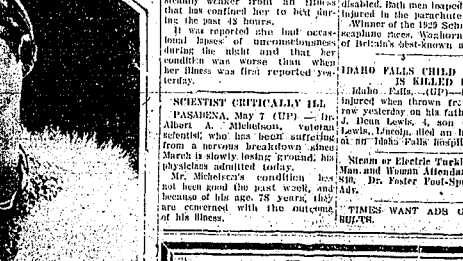

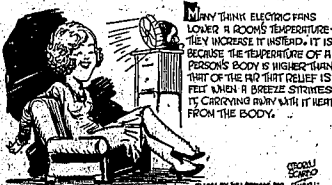
