TWENTY STATES ARGUE DRY LAW

CHICAGO, May 13 (UPI)—The report of modification of state prohibition laws has been considered by twenty state legislatures this year, a survey by the Legislative Association revealed today.

Fifteen of the assemblies killed bills for liquor law modification and the remaining seven and House bills under consideration.

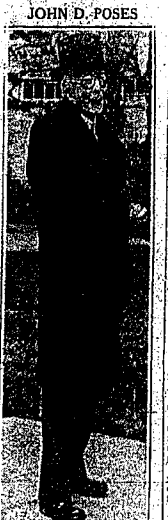
In nine states, the measure was killed on the floor or in committee. These were Iowa, Missouri, North Carolina, Ohio, Oklahoma, South Dakota, Utah, Vermont and Wisconsin.

In Indiana, Nebraska and Pennsylvania, the bills were passed in full. In Illinois, a report bill was passed by a substantial majority in the House but by a narrow margin in the Senate, but vetoed by Governor Louis L. Bruce.

The Iowa legislature which had liquor law repeal bills before them, are those of California, Colorado, Connecticut, Delaware, Michigan, New Jersey and Rhode Island.

The survey showed that five states have passed their state laws for prohibition enforcement. These are: New York, 1923; Nevada, 1925; Maine, 1927; Wisconsin, 1927; and Massachusetts, 1929.

Maryland has never adopted a state enforcement law.

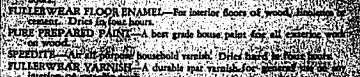

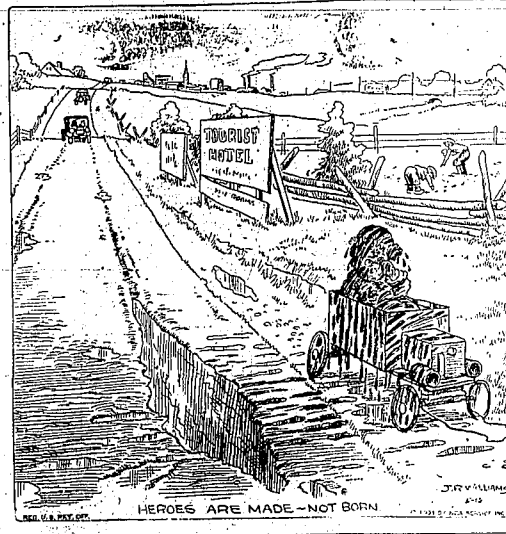
