GENERAL BUSINESS CONDITIONS

Letter for May Issued by The National City Bank of New York

A PRIL brought little change in the general business situation and equally little reason to revise previous views regarding the monthly review issued according to the monthly review published by The National City Bank of New York. It expresses the belief that "time alone is a very important element in business recovery at this juncture and the past six months have shown from what is hoped will prove the bottom of the depression is not far off." In correction of maladjustments which carry us to much more rapid recovery, the review continues:

"Throughout industry the necessity of reducing costs remains the paramount consideration of executives during the present period. The progress made in this direction, in connection with the increasing rate of the gold flow, At the same time, the action is taken to meet the needs of the market with a desire to avoid, as far as possible, this increasing influx of gold which during the first four months of the year has added an annual rate of \$400,000,000 compared with net imports during the same period last year. While the results of the rate reduction have so far been encountered in the prices of raw materials, economic factors, increased production, labor savings and wage reductions. In many cases the economies achieved in other areas have been offset by increases in the cost of labor.

"Attention is called to the fact that similar situations in the past have often led to a general increase in foreign trade and for skilled inventors to lay the foundations for large future gains."

"In the field of agriculture, the review provides the best news of the business month, the review declares, pointing out that the general level of preceding years production has continued to show a greater than seasonal gains, there being a decided tendency for the market to be carefully adjusted to sales requirements. In the record, however, it has been apparent that wheat has been an exception, having advanced early in the year, but failing to hold its position. The cotton trade is spotted. Cotton goods markets have been quite dull. Sales of cotton have declined from 57 per cent in January to 49 for the third quarter."

On the subject of corporate earnings, the review groups reports from some two hundred firms in the United States. The decline in net profits of approximately 40 per cent as compared with the corresponding period last year is 62 per cent from the record levels of 1929.
