YANKS CLOSE BEHIND Giants Near League Lead In National

NEW YORK, May 18. (AP)—A ten-game winning streak, the largest recorded by any major league club this season, was sold by the Philadelphia Athletics today as they must the Detroit Tigers, considered the class of the western teams of the American league, for the first time this year.

Against the other western clubs—Chicago, St. Louis and Cleveland—the Athletics entered the season with the 1926 and 1930 world baseball championships. They have won all eight of their games against western foes and should they continue their success against the Tigers, there will be many baseball fans who will believe that Philadelphia is "in" for the 1931 pennant.

Despite 10th win, the Athletics entered their tenth consecutive victory yesterday when they defeated Cleveland, 10 to 7. It was the tenth consecutive defeat for the Indians, as New York kept within two games of the league leaders by overwhelming Detroit, 20 to 8.

In the only other American league game the Chicago White Sox defeated Boston, 9 to 6, and advanced to fifth place in the standings.

The New York Giants advanced to within a half game of the National league lead when they defeated St. Louis, current pure record, 6 to 3.

Armand Williams again defeated the Chicago White Sox yesterday, 10 to 7, in the ninth inning, topped by Hays' single, gave Philadelphia a 5 to 2 victory over Chicago. Hays' slow scored himself with the winning run.

Brooklyn came to life and displayed the batting power expected of the team in winning Cincinnati, 14 to 4.
