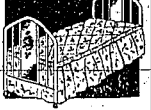

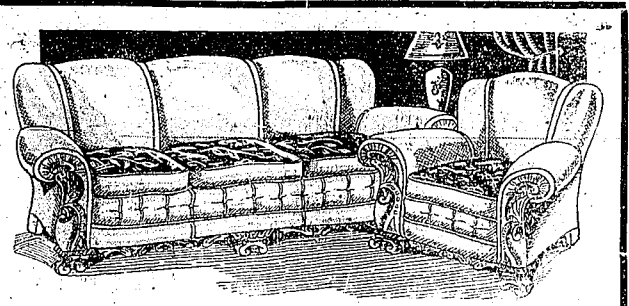

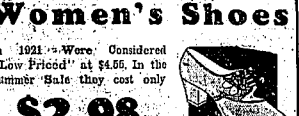

**ONE SUICIDE'S PHILOSOPHY**  
 THE cynical Broadway which accepted a youthful Kansas City boy as a talented caricaturist and cartoonist nearly a score of years ago, can now attempt explanation of its responsibility in connection with the suicide of Ralph Barton, whose outlandish drawings have provoked many a smile.  
 "Everyone who knew me and hears of this," Barton wrote just before he plied a .25-caliber automatic pistol to his temple and ended his life, "will have a different hypothesis to offer to explain why I did it. Practically all of the hypotheses will be dramatic and completely wrong."  
 He said that no one thing and no person, "except myself," were responsible for his suicide. "If gossip insists upon something more definite and thrilling as a reason, let them choose" by pending appointment to my desk or to the fact that it happened to be painfully short of cash at the moment."

But as he predicted, his many friends brushed aside the reasons he offered for his suicide and probably the most prevalent rumor was that Barton shot himself in his midtown penthouse because he had failed to win the love of Ruth Kresge, daughter of Sebastian S. Kresge of Detroit, millionaire chain store owner.

Another suicide theory was that Barton still loved Carlota Monterey, who divorced him five years ago and later became the third wife of Eugene O'Neill, the playwright. Barton himself wrote in his obituary that he had definitely "lost the only woman I ever loved," and said that she was the one person who could have saved him, "had I been savable."

Stills others attributed his death to an unsuccessful quest for happiness in marriage. Barton had been married and divorced four times.

Barton wrote that he suffered "definite symptoms of maniac-depressive insanity," which made it impossible to enjoy the simple pleasures of life, and that he had "run from wife to wife, from house to house and from country to country, in a ridiculous effort to escape from myself."

Barton said that although he had few difficulties and had led an exceptionally glamorous life—as life goes—"I am not more than my share of affection and appreciation," he had "suffered from melancholia for the past five years."  
 All of which, to that unsophisticated group of us who get our thrills out of riding over the rim-to-rim bridge, reading the latest serial story or pulling a trout out of a dashing mountain stream, does not seem quite understandable.

One can appreciate Barton's discomfiture over his dental appointment, not to say his vexatious problems incident to being four times married, and find solace in leading a simple life here in the wild and woolly west.

**WOMEN WAGE-EARNERS**

THE arrival of woman as a wage earner in all sorts of fields has led, man to a good deal of perplexity during the last few years. Nowhere is this perplexity deeper, and nowhere does it lead to any more peculiar reasoning than when the woman who holds a full-time job also happens to be married.  
 This perplexity has been bothering all kinds of employers lately. And a fair sample of the conclusion the perplexed employer often comes to is afforded in a large middle western city, where the board of education recently voted to discharge all married women from its teaching staff and hire single women instead.  
 If there is any reasonable theory back of such a decision, it probably is the theory that the married women are teaching just for the fun of it, or just to make a little pin money on the side. The single woman, not having anyone to support her—unless, perchance, she lives with her parents—thus has a more valid claim on the job than her married sister.

Unfortunately, this one board of education is not alone in this view. Other cities have taken the same view. Employers in some factories and offices have followed suit, and it is all rather silly.  
 If every married woman who held a job had a husband who also had a job, it wouldn't be quite so silly. But that is by no means the case.

There are today some six million men out of work in the United States. A good proportion are married and have families. And in thousands upon thousands of cases the only thing that has kept their families from absolute want has been the fact that the wives have been steadily employed.

Thousands of girls and women who do work in factories are doing it, not to earn pin money or to achieve a feeling of independence, but to support their families while their husbands remain unemployed.

The same thing is true of thousands of salesgirls, stenographers and office assistants. And exactly the same thing is true of many, many school teachers.  
 In normal times it may be no more than fair to give the preference to single women in passing out jobs. The times right now are far from normal. One would expect that it would be more sensible to replace the married wage-earners with married ones.  
 The move to oust the married women from her job is one of the silliest of all of the business depression's blunders.
