WASHINGTON.—Instead of concern that "model city" in law enforcement promised by President Roosevelt, the people of Bryan remain as apathetic American community with an underworld, crime waves, racket murders, corruption, and phases of mobsterism which keep police reporters skimping.

Washington is now having more fatalities per proportion to population than Chicago.

Thus far this year we have averaged 6.4 murders a month, which is an annual rate of one thousand. This compares with the latest available statistics of homicide in American cities covering 1929 and shows Chicago has the highest annual population. The murder rate per 10,000 population was 10.1 for the larger American cities and 14.8 for Washington, D. C., the nation's capital, plugging along at a rate of 45 murders for 1930, is setting a mark of 12.3 per month.

"Police Around."—The public's surprise is that people get killed off here so frequently and so openly. They wonder why in which the police turn out to be supplied in time. It has everyday stirred up again after a crime which has been committed in the last few days, nearly all the news media.

The police force is clean and free from graft untouched by influence because there are no individuals in the city who are supposed to be such a crime problem in other cities. The only thing missing is the sense of obligation.
