FASCIST FIRING SQUAD EXECUTES CITIZEN OF U. S.

Confession of Plot Against Mussolini Results In Death Penalty

ROME, May 29 (UP)—Michele Schifano, naturalized citizen of the United States, convicted of plotting to assassinate Premier Benito Mussolini, was executed at midnight today.

The confessed anarchist, 32 years old, held under a firing squad at 4:47 a. m. He was convicted of the plot against Mussolini before the government tribunal of the state yesterday.

The confession was given to the tribunal immediately was sentenced to die by firing squad. The execution took place in the courtyard of the military barracks in the vicinity of the Vatican. The firing squad was composed of 12 fascist militiamen and two civilian judges.

BOARD CONSIDERS ADDED CAPACITY FOR COUNTY JAIL

Sherriff Reports Overcrowded Condition of Battelle Present Problem

Twin Falls county's jail on the fourth floor of the courthouse is taxed beyond its capacity and needs added accommodations for about ten prisoners, Sheriff E. F. Prater said at a meeting of county commissioners Friday.

During the past winter and spring the sheriff pointed out the jail has frequently been overcrowded. With accommodations for about 40 prisoners, the number has often been more than that, he said. At one time there were 42 persons held in the jail. The addition of six persons arrested Thursday evening for same offenses swelled the number of prisoners to 48.

"The business depression has greatly increased the number of minor crimes, Sheriff Prater remarked. "Overcrowded jails have been the result. We should be able to accommodate about 100 more prisoners to meet the increase in population of our jurisdiction."

The installation of outside beds for bunks which would hold up against the wall water in use would aid materially in solving the problem, the sheriff said. The commissioners agreed to investigate conditions in the jail and to attempt to work out a course of remedial work for the county's unwilling guests.

CONVICED AUTO THIEVES DENIED SECOND HEARING

Changes in Angling Laws Pointed Out

New features of the Idaho state fish and game laws which the average fisherman is not acquainted with were pointed out by the Southern Idaho Fish and Game section.

It is now unlawful to transport live minnows from one watershed to another, from one creek to another, or from any state into Idaho, the association points out. Live minnows may be transported at any time.

It is unlawful to use spaw of any fish for bait, except that extra eggs may be used if attached to a hook and line on a joint pole. It is unlawful to throw fish of any kind into the water for the purpose of attracting fish to any section of a stream.

All streams in Twin Falls county will be open for fishing beginning Saturday, May 30, except trout creeks proper from six o'clock to six o'clock in the morning. Trout creeks in Hagerman also remain closed.
