Twin Falls Unites In Paying Honors To Memory of Dead

Impressive Ceremonies Mark Tribute To Heroes Who Died In Cause Of Humanity.

In Plainers' fields the poppies grow, between the crosses, row on row.
So in Twin Falls' own City of the Silent on the low hill to the east, flowers blossomed Saturday on the graves of war veterans and loved ones, while appropriate exercises were held to do honor to those for whom Memorial Day was set aside.
Flowers were gathered by Twin Falls citizens in a way, on into wreaths by ladies of the Grand Army of the Republic adorned many graves, while the flag for which they fought waved over all.

Twin Falls Memorial observance opened at 10 a. m., with services held at the memorial monument erected on the courthouse lawn by the Daughters of the American Revolution. Representatives of veterans' and auxiliary organizations placed wreaths at the base of the monument in token of their tribute to the heroic dead to whom the memorial was dedicated.

With veterans' organizations and auxiliaries, Boy Scouts and other groups in line, the Memorial Day parade led by a light school band, moved from the city park following the exercises on the courthouse lawn, proceeding on Broadway street and down Main avenue to Fourth street east. Marching groups there broke ranks and moved on through moving to the Twin Falls cemetery. Captain C. H. Kreuzel was marshal of the parade.

General Pershing Leads To Decoration of 30,000 Graves
PARIS, May 29 (UP)—Flowers were placed on the graves of 30,000 American soldiers in France during Memorial day ceremonies throughout the world yesterday.

Gen. John J. Pershing, who commanded the American expeditionary forces overseas during the war, with U. S. Ambassador Walter H. Page, headed thousands of veterans and 120 gold star mothers on a pilgrimage of the battle-field cemeteries.

They left Paris early in the afternoon for the war-torn fields of France, where thousands of white crosses mark the graves of the American dead.
General Pershing for the first time since 1919, led the coronation of American cemeteries, where 14,000 Americans who lost their lives in the Argonne battle, are buried.

SAN FRANCISCO, May 29 (UP)—The Lassen liner Harvard, carrying a merry holiday crowd from San Francisco to southern California, was grounded off Point Arguello today and the passengers were taken off in lifeboats.

It was reported, the lifeboats were lowered not far from the Harvard and awaiting the arrival of vessels steaming to their aid.

Subsequent radio messages said that some of the passengers had been landed on the rocky beach.

The radio from the Harvard was sending messages to Lassen officials right along. It was said, but officials of the company declined to make them public.

It was learned that the hold of the vessel was flooded to keep the Harvard on an even keel.

The decision to put the passengers in lifeboats was made after water started to flood the engine room and it seemed certain that the Harvard was doomed.

The radio messages indicated that the Harvard struck the point, but for hours before the seven United States destroyers could get there. Twenty-two lives were lost then.

U. S. GRAIN BUYING EXPERIMENT ENDS IN RED FIGURES

Reports Show Government Is \$90,000,000 Loser In Transaction

LEADERS NOT DAUNTED
Cut In New Wheat Crop May Even Matters

CHICAGO, May 29 (UP)—The government's wheat buying experiment, intended to stabilize the market and end officially with the government's decision to buy the wheat, ended with the market's close of trading in the 1930 crop, officials of the federal farm board, who started the stabilization activity, announced two months ago would withdraw the wheat and end May.

The United States is \$90,000,000 loser in actual cash and the carrying charges on it are said to be approximately \$100,000 a month.

Officials of the Grain Stabilization corporation are not, however, discouraged by the outlook, nor do they admit defeat in the experiment, which ended with the Galled Soldiers and his comrades weren't going to march.

Prices Rise
Several million bushels of wheat were sold in the Chicago market today, according to reports on May 29. The market closed near 94 cents. A 1/4 cent advance in the wheat price, which was the 1930 crop, had held steady by government buying.

Whether the government would buy anything on its stored grain depends on the general market, other farmers of the wheat, which is expected that if there was a reduction in the crop this year, the government would be able to buy up the surplus, which is now being stored in the government's warehouses.

MEMORIAL DAY'S CHALLENGE A year ago in this column on the occasion of Memorial day, the burden of the editorial was a plea that Americans give their allegiance to their President as they never had given it before.

The appeal now should be for them to give allegiance to their nation as they never have given it before. Beset by distress in government, in economics, and in conditions generally, it appears that the best manner in which loyal Americans can help to repay the debt owed that army of heroic dead whom the nation pauses today to honor, is to keep preserved the ideals of liberty, the avenues of livelihood, and the traditional strength of the government of the United States of America "that these men shall not have died in vain."

The enemies of good government in the United States are Communists, gangsters, the lawless, the immoral, the ignorant, and the viciously selfish. This nation is a democracy if it is anything. It is a human government, not a mechanized industrial plant. It is builded for men and was founded on the principle of supplying man's highest goal in self-government.

It should be kept in these paths by sound public opinion, by broad sympathetic understanding, by alert leadership, and finally by a public fully as alert, supporting sound, capable leaders, in their honest efforts to govern wisely and efficiently.

It was through the trials and deaths of the honored soldier and sailor dead for whom the nation bows in humble reverence today, that we are permitted to be here, to carry on and keep aloft the flag of human freedom in thought, in word, in action.

Individuals have that responsibility now as never before.

CANDIDATES WELL CHOSEN THERE can be little disagreement with the choice of the four famous Americans whose busts were unveiled in New York University's Hall of Fame the other day.

These four—as you probably know—were President James Monroe; James A. McNeil Whistler, the artist; Matthew Fontaine Maury, the oceanographer; and Walt Whitman, the poet.

Whitman and Maury belong there beyond any question; Whitman as one of the greatest of all poets and Maury as an extremely useful scientist whose work has been invaluable to sailors for generations. Whistler, while not among the greatest of artists, left work that will endure for many years; and Monroe, at the very least, will be remembered as long as the Monroe Doctrine lasts.

The names of these four will live for a long time. Their inclusion in the Hall of Fame was very fitting.

Chapman Eulogizes American Tradition

PHILIP—In a public Memorial address delivered at the General Assembly of the General Federation of Women's Clubs at exercises conducted under the auspices of the National Association, the speaker reviewed the history of American republicanism and the growing tributes to the sacrifices made on the altar of freedom.

Mr. Chapman stressed that not only praise, but appreciation and understanding of the American heroic deed from Washington down to the present day, is the first government in the history of nations," he said "based upon and dedicated to the interpretation of the rights of the individual citizen; where the rights of one nation do not interfere with the rights of another; and also of a Union which, he emphasized the history of the United States national patriotism and expressed appreciation for the preservation of our nation despite civil war.

Stressing the necessity following the juggle of man's progress that ways will be found to meet the needs of the future, he said, "We are now in the throes of a high sense of patriotism and preparedness, as long as we live in a world as we find it, at the same time standing our ground, we must continue to set a high example of righteousness, fairness and justice."

In conclusion, he said, "Let us protect and preserve and perpetuate the national institutions, the individualism which have come to us from the brave and glorious hands of these heroic men who died for their country."
