

St. Patrick's Cathedral—New York

The cathedral church of the archdiocese of New York is one of the finest ecclesiastical edifices in the United States, and the first cathedral church of the Roman Catholic church in the United States.

It was projected by the Most Rev. John Hughes, in 1869, when he was the first archbishop of New York.

The plans were drawn by James Renwick, who had been the architect of the New York City Hall.
