

CANADA'S TARIFF ACT PRONOUNCED BIG AID, REPRISAL

Smoot-Hawley Supporters Ogle Move As Needed Protection

WIDE EFFECT FORECAST

Decrease In International Trade Predicted

WASHINGTON, June 3 (UP)—The broad tariff revision by Canada, neighbor and best customer of the United States, has precipitated the tariff controversy more than any other development since passage of the Hawley-Smoot act a year ago.

Many other countries have raised their tariff since the Hawley-Smoot act became effective.

Tariff To Have Big Effect On U. S. Trade

NEW YORK, June 3 (UP)—A special dispatch from Washington told the Herald-Tribune today that the new Canadian tariff schedule will have a serious effect on U. S. trade.

The tariff would, it is believed, cut the value of U. S. exports to Canada by 25 to 30 percent.

Three possible results were forecast from the revision which affects the American furniture and manufacturer as so many points.

One was a sharp drop in the value of U. S. exports to Canada.

A third was a sharp drop in the value of U. S. trade with Canada.

St. Louis Increases Lead in National

NEW YORK, June 3 (UP)—The Cleveland Indians are on the warpath again. After losing the advantage they built up early in the season, the Indians have now had a winning streak of eight consecutive games. Although the cause behind the pace-setting Philadelphia Athletics, Cleveland promises to cause plenty of trouble for the American league pennant contenders if the team continues its present stride.

Cleveland made it eight in a row yesterday by knocking out the Boston Red Sox 12 to 13 in the eighth. Brooklyn continued its winning streak and advanced into the fifth position for fourth place by turning back the Chicago Cubs 7 to 6.

Philadelphia defeated Cincinnati 4 to 1 in the other major league contest.

Modernizing Aids Run Down Districts

JUST A NEAT LITTLE COTTAGE REBUILT FOR TWO

Four Walls and Roof Now Attractive Home

When the cottage in the illustration below was first built it was a good many years ago. It was considered to be one of the most attractive residences on the street. And the owners had taken pains to make the surroundings as pleasant as possible. The two window flower boxes on the front porch attest to this statement.

Basements Should Pay Their Own Way

When more home owners realize that 20 per cent of the cost of their dwelling is in the basement, there will be a general movement toward making it habitable. Within the last half dozen years there has been an increasing tendency to convert this otherwise waste space into recreation rooms of various kinds.

City's Old Sections Made Beauty Spots Under New Methods

One of the significant aspects of the House Modernization Movement is the cumulative effect of the effort. The modernizing of one home a starting point from which startling ramifications result.

NEWTON D. BAKER, famous lawyer, and Secretary of War in the cabinet of Woodrow Wilson, in vigorously indorsing the decision of the Supreme Court in the so-called Minnesota "rag" law case speaks eloquent words in defense of a free press.

Baker himself about a year ago represented two newspaper editors in a noted fight for this principle. Louis B. Seltzer, editor, and Carlton K. Matson, then chief editorial writer of the Cleveland Press, were charged with contempt of the court of Common Pleas Judge Frederick P. Walther because of an editorial criticizing a racetrack injunction order.

The court order purported to restrain the sheriff of Cuyahoga county from closing up a racetrack which was gambling in violation of a state law. The two editors were tried by the judge who had attacked and rejected the order to the effect that they should pay \$500 in fine each. The court of appeals, however, reversed the lower court's decision.

Baker wisely says in commenting upon the Supreme Court's decision in the Minnesota case:

The decision of the Supreme Court in the so-called Minnesota "rag" law case is a great charter of freedom for the newspapers of America.

If we are to have free government at all it must rest upon an informed and enlightened public opinion.

No group of official persons can be permitted to lay down in advance the limits of newspaper discussion.

If newspapers abuse their privileges they can be held accountable like anybody else, but all forms of censorship and anticipatory restraint are necessarily administered by or in the interest of the very officials whom it may be the highest public service and duty to criticize and expose.

Efforts to throttle the press are as futile as they are unwise. They lead merely to the secret circulation of criticism as a substitute for that more wholesome publicity, which, having to bear the light of day, is automatically restrained and corrected.

The Supreme Court of the United States has reaffirmed a doctrine and vindicated a liberty which has been ours since the Constitution of the United States was first adopted.

The Supreme Court could not rightly have done other than it did in the matter but it is reassuring and important that it took a definite stand in this case far-reaching in influence.

TWO KINDS OF EDUCATION

A GREAT deal of unnecessary furor seems to have been raised by the decision of Yale University to drop Latin and Greek from the list of required subjects for undergraduates. The decision is not as revolutionary as it sounds; it merely recognizes a trend that has been apparent in American universities for a good many years.

For a long time we have been demanding that education be "practical"; and Latin and Greek, undoubtedly, are not in that classification. No one will be a better bond salesman because of a familiarity with Virgil and Homer. They will not help a prospective attorney to master the intricacies of corporation law. In any age when a professor, in a leading college can hardly urge his young men to keep both eyes on the main chance and marry the boss's daughter, if possible, the study of humane letters is something that can easily be dispensed with.

Yet these subjects will remain on the curriculum, and such students as attend college in the hope of getting some genuine culture can still take them. These students will be in the minority, of course; in a country that rates its colleges and universities by the prowess of their football teams and the wealth of their graduates, nothing else could be expected. But there will always be a few of them, and they will be a wholesome leaven.

After all, why does a young man go to college? A desire for social prestige and a belief that a degree will boot his future earning power probably account for the majority of enrollments. But there are some who have other aims, and in every college in the land there are some professors who will greet them with open arms.

To these youngsters it will make no difference whether or not they "have to" study Latin and Greek. They want to study them; a desire to get acquainted with the mighty literature of those languages is one of the things that got them into college in the first place. They may not distinguish themselves in athletics, and after graduation they may not become either rich or famous, but their lives will be infinitely richer and fuller than the lives of those who found the ancient languages too impractical to bother with. As a matter of fact, we are offering two kinds of education today. One kind is for the grower, whose rough corners are rounded off and who is given a very nice, glossy polish. The other kind is for the real student. Yale's action simply recognizes, openly, the difference between the two.
