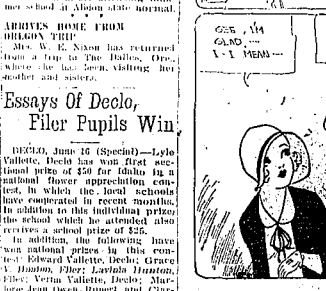
First Step of Course
The first step of course is to finish the attic by covering bare rafters and studding. Most lumber dealers, contractors and architects recommend that this be done with insulating board. By using Celotex for example, which has a pleasing soft color, it is unnecessary to use any additional interior finish. If a plaster surface is desired, Celotex can be substituted for insulation board.

Insulation For Comfort
Insulation board, either as a base for plastering or as interior finish, is applied because without it attics are hot in summer and cold in winter. By shutting out the heat of the summer and the cold of the winter, the attic reasonably cool even in the hottest weather. In winter, insulation prevents the escape of heat from the heating furnace and thus keeps the heat in the house. Flushing the floor

GENERAL BUSINESS CONDITIONS
From the Monthly Bank Letter for June issued by The National City Bank of New York

THE month of May marked the usual passing of business from a period of Spring expansion into one of irregular contraction, according to the monthly review published by The National City Bank of New York. Tapering down of basic industrial activity is reported. After making allowances for seasonal influences, however, the opinion is expressed that the month has nearly if not quite held its own. In some lines, including textiles and automobile production, the upward tendency characteristic of Spring was maintained longer than usual and these gains on the month's balance sheet offset declines in the metal, industries, building, and elsewhere.

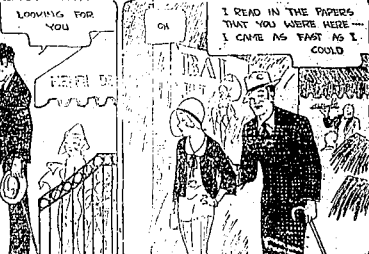
"The automobile and tire industries have experienced the Spring of a more sustained public demand for their products, but seasonal recession is now under way in the former."

"A further moderate decline in steel mill operations has occurred, and latest figures have shown the industry at 87 per cent of capacity, compared with 91 per cent at the beginning of the month. No early gains are in prospect and a reduction of automobile takings in June is to be expected."

"Building contracts awarded during May, up to the twenty-second, fell below the same margin as in April, when the total in dollars was 30 per cent less."

"An encouraging factor is the large total of permits issued in April, notwithstanding the fact that they are usually found new papers. Recent price declines, with the serious difficulties that they create, usually have been due to fresh allocations, which, however, are mainly responsible for the lowered foundation of stock prices."

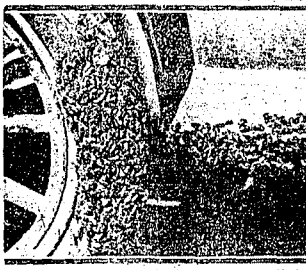
