## Rails File Petition Asking 15 Per Cent Freight Rate Boost

U.S. Interstate Commission Receive, Please Declaring Roads Face Serious Future If Denied

WASHINGTON, June 17 (UPI)—Inlanders of the United States today unanimously petitioned the Interstate commerce commission for a 15 per cent increase in air freight rates and charges.

M. A. Schriener, president and managing director, Pacific Air Lines Inc., a northern group, termed the present situation of the railroads as an emergency threatening serious impairment of their financial resources and making it necessary to assure the public a continuance of efficient and adequate service.

Embodiment 20 printed pages, the petition set forth in detail the plan of action to be taken by the railroads in view of the failure of the rate return of 2.24 per cent on property investments; protracted status of railroad bonds; dilute capital difficult; heavy competition from trucks and buses; and lack of wings for rail road workers.

In connection with wages, the petition said: "The policy of fixed prices for labor, controlled by management of most leading industries, is that the revival of industry must be based upon rates predicated, for the time being at least, upon the maintenance of existing wage rates." # SEARCHERS DRAG RESERVOIR BED FOR HESS' BODY

No Success Yet Reported In Hunt For Victim, of Tragedy.

## BOOKS BINDER WORKERS

Two Survivors Little Hurt by Experience

Although searchers in four boats dragged the bottom of Salmon Reservoir throughout Wednesday morning and afternoon, at the place where the body was found, Alvin Karpis, 45, of Tulsa, was drowned Tuesday afternoon when the boat he was in capsized as he and his men were fishing with Captain Harry Lewiss, the body had not yet been recovered.

### Books Are Used

Members of the searching party reported difficulty in systematically searching the reservoir bottom due to the fact that the men used long grappling hooks, caught, and to the depth of the water, estimated at 15 feet.

"If Alvin was drowned when the boat in which he and George Miller, who accompanied him, were making at the dam, were fishing, was swamped by high wave blown up by the strong wind. Then, as he tried to right the boat, he grabbed the sides of the overturned craft and drifted with it to the shore. He was drowning and when they were pulled from the water by members of a Sunday school group, and from the Twin Falls police and firemen, he was dead.

Twin Falls was unable to reach the boat after it capsized, and evidently was washed away.

**PRESIDENT HOOVER** did himself proud at Marion on the dedication of the Harding monument. A titchish proposition it was for the President of the United States and one which had been postponed and put off from time to time. Mr. Hoover himself an apprentice of Harding's, in fact was given his best start to the presidency by virtue of having been made a member of the Harding cabinet, the first political office he had ever held.

As an important factor in and a member of the Harding administration, it was Hoover's duty, long neglected, to make the dedicatory address, to salve over as far as possible the shortcomings of it, and to defend it as far as possible. This he did.

The Harding memorial dedication ceremony was an empty gesture, a duty rather than a pleasure for practically everyone involved; a delicate, unwanted and perhaps unnecessary event. It would have been better to have passed it up entirely, for it only tends to revive the unpleasant details of the Harding presidential career and his strange death.

## Presidential Reception Notably Cold in Ohio
