WESTERN CANADA WHEAT CROPS 70 PERCENT NORMAL

Immediate Rain Necessary To Prevent Further Harm to Cereals

FAR BELOW 1930 TOTAL

WINNIPEG, Man., June 18 (UP)—Immediate declaration of wheat crops in Saskatchewan has been prevented by more rain in several widespread areas, the second crop report of the Canadian government revealed today.

Western Canada's wheat crop is only 70 per cent of normal, 22 correspondents wrote the wheat board in 1930, the report showed 85 per cent as reported by 103 correspondents on the same date, 55 in 1929 and 89 in 1928.

Detroit Officials Charged with Criminal Negligence In Handling Funds

17 MILLIONS INVOLVED

Bolon Backs Mayor, Against Former Associates

DETROIT, June 18 (UP)—"With the Ford Motor company charged with criminal negligence in the handling of an employment relief fund, Senator James Couzens, one of the country's foremost, today was active in defending Mayor Murphy and the principle of government relief.

Couzens said that the Ford company had not only failed to disclose the details of the relief fund, but also had failed to disclose the names of the directors of the fund.

The Ford company's charge in a controversy rooted in the question of the relative merits of public and private charities was made by Louis Colombo, attorney for the company, and personal attorney for Henry Ford.

CHICAGO MOVIE. CENSOR TO TAME LOVE SEQUENCES

Former Actress Sees Little
To Change in Way Scenes
Are Portrayed

CONFERS WITH SIX MEN

Kissing May Be Shortened By
Her Order

CHICAGO, June 18 (UPI)—Hollywood's Frankie James, who until being a musical comedy star at censor Chicago, met six censors, finished her first week on the job today with the conviction that movie kisses need more refinement.

"The chief element is the least important thing about a film kiss," Miss James said. "It is the way the censors kiss last only a second but they're very sure they know. Other kisses last longer but look purely phony."

"New legislation for better, if not bigger, motion picture censors is to make them detest respect and efficiency, other words, go easy on the sex."

Major Apollonio, a blonde with a white shirt and still on the right side (theatrically), of 25 Miss James has been named to the board of censors by Mayor Antonio J. Cermak. Six men will do work under Miss James to guard Chicagoans against objectionable films.

She saw about 45 reels of motion picture films during the week of censorship. Miss James said "and there wasn't a thing really shocking."

For Shocking
"Motion pictures may be silly but they're not dirty," she said. "Probably some of them are ungraceful, would or should not be in pictures, contain anything that would actually shock father, mother and children."

"It's only human for all of us to like a little snip and zest in our lives. We would rather look at a wee bit, perhaps than at love scenes."

The worst type of picture, Miss James believed, is that which displays hardness, cruelty or violence. "Many gangster films are objectionable because they are cruel and display wanton murder," she said.

has been "actively up to the minute" due to telegraphic reports from the Bureau. "Volume of credit sales has decreased ten per cent in the last year, but the quality of current accounts has improved appreciably" according to Vesper report. The majority of banks reported in the survey had not actively in building trades, and steel construction, but "owing" in food groups, textiles, and other industries. Retail business volume by sections, as interpreted by Vesper from the survey, follows: Pacific (Atlantic) states: near 1929 volume; New England 5 to 10 per cent below 1929; southern in general 10 per cent drop from 1929; central, 20 per cent below normal; and north, slightly below last year; northwest coast, 10 per cent below 1929; southeast, gain in volume; Rocky Mountain, near normal; 1929-30 Pacific average below normal of 1929-30.

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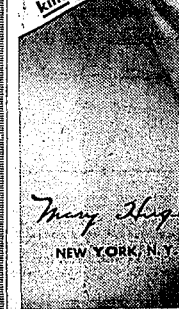

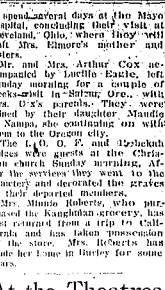

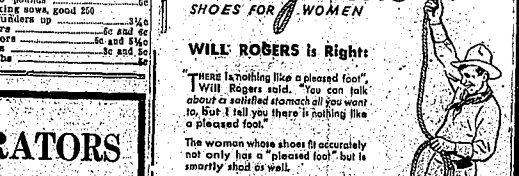

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THE PRESS ON HOOVER'S 20-YEAR PLAN

EDITORIAL comment on President Hoover's speech before the Indiana Republican Editorial association is varied.

A few of the reactions are noted here, including that from the New York Times, which follows:

If Americans like a public man who is not afraid, they also like one who is not discouraged or despondent. For this reason the address will fall like a word of good cheer upon the ears of the country. . . . What Mr. Hoover has to say about the tariff, . . . is neither enlightening or helpful. . . . His address so plainly inclines to hope rather than fear that it will tend to quicken the hopes and banish the fears of a great number of his fellow countrymen.

New York Herald-Tribune: He drew the lines so clearly and presented the issue (the government's position in times of depression) so convincingly as to make it possible for all to see the depression in its proper perspective.

New York World-Telegram: With President Hoover's dream of prosperity we have complete sympathy. . . . But a dream is not a plan. . . . The President's theory has been tried and has failed in this depression. It is time to try something else—prescription, plan or what you will, but something besides futile hope for the best.

Chicago Daily News: What Mr. Hoover . . . outlines is, perhaps, the magnitude of a twenty year task, rather than a plan for its accomplishment. But the task, itself, is an assurance that the necessary energy will be generated and that the plan will be formulated. Prosperity should return in the effort. The President expects; and with reason, that the spirit of the American people will rise to the challenge of the task, under a government which holds steady the structure of their political and economic life, safeguards opportunity for all and keeps open the roads of progress.

POWER OF CONSERVATISM

IT IS a fairly safe bet that some of the most radical speaking and planning of the coming decade is going to be indulged in by the country's most fervent conservatives.

This may not sound like good sense, but it is entirely logical. A little consideration of the problems of the day makes it clear.

Governor Ritchie of Maryland, for instance, remarks that "you cannot have from five to eight million people waiting work and unable to get it without knowing that this constitutes a challenge to our social order and that it is the strongest argument for communism unless it is solved."

And Dean Wallace B. Donham of the Harvard School of Business Administration says bluntly: "Capitalism is on trial and upon this trial may depend the whole future of western civilization. The justification of capitalism is efficiency. Our present situation is a major breakdown."

"Two prominent men thus state the issue. What is going to happen?"

"Obviously, it is the iron-rusted conservative who has the greatest stake in the existing social and economic order. It is he who can be counted on to take the strongest measures to prevent a change in the direction of communism or socialism."

How is he going to do it? Not, in the long run, by chanting over and over again the wearisome refrain that "conditions are fundamentally sound." Not by calling out the police to club the heads of dissatisfied men who can't get the jobs they want. Not by insisting that business always has and always must run in cycles.

He will do it, eventually, by making such changes in the machinery of production and distribution as will ensure to the ordinary man a chance to have steady work at good pay throughout his lifetime. He will do it that way because there is no other way on earth of doing it.

To do that will take some very radical measures. The intelligent conservative will not shrink from them. He will adopt them because he will realize that there is no other way of saving the form of society he wishes to preserve.

It seems a radical, as a matter of fact, to require and qualify his conservatism. If he doesn't think he is anxious to conserve as very aptly as he can, he had better get out from under him.

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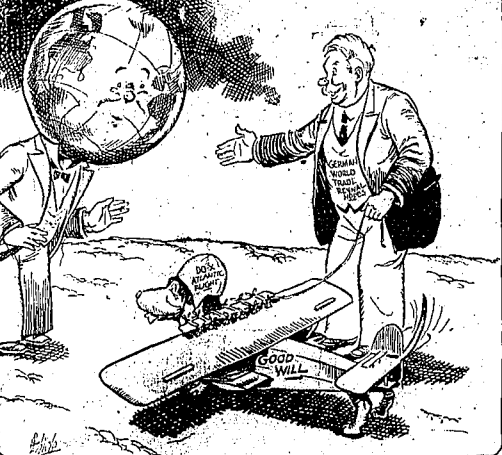

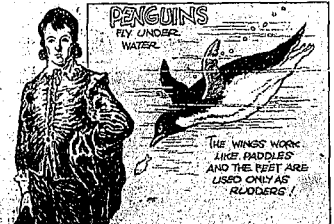
