## U.S. May Compromise With France on War Debt Payment Plans

### State Department Says Success Seems Assured; French Express Good Will in Note

WASHINGTON, June 26 (UP)—The United States today indicated its willingness to compromise with the French on the provisions of the Hoover debt suspension plan and will Ambassador Elgie in Paris and Secretary of Treasury Mellon are conducting negotiations to that end.

The state department issued a memorandum relative to the French reply to the Hoover proposals in which Secretary of State Stimson said France had "expressed a willingness to be guided by the opinion of my German payments for a year."

The American memorandum and the French note both were made public by the state department.

"There are suggestions in the French proposal which the United States will not accept," said the French note. "The French government is making the full measure of relief to debtor nations corresponding to the president's plan and will not discuss further discussion that will bring the full measure of relief to the financial cooperation in the French note, gives every hope of success."

The text of Stimson's statement is as follows:

"The French note shows a gratifying cordiality to the president's plan and a willingness to be guided by the opinion of my German payments for a year."

**AGENT REPORTS EXPERIMENTS ON BEANS PROGRESS**  
Six Farms Have Plots, Breeding and Selection Work Done by University

Bean experiments to determine the yielding ability and resistance to disease of the different selections of Great Northern beans are being carried on this year by the University of Idaho extension service at the experimental plots west of Twin Falls and in cooperation with the farmers in different parts of the county, County Agent Harvey S. Hahn reports.

The Arrate, Leahy and Universal Idaho selections, and certified and ordinary commercial Great Northern, are being grown side by side on the Simon farm, Miller's, the Fellouson farm, Kimberly's, the McQuinn farm, Piller's, the A. H. Jacobs farm, Givens and the Harvey farm. Buhf, Solecting and breeding work which has been carried out by the university extension service for the last four years is being continued on the Wall farm.

This year, with these twenty County Agent Hahn said, "we should be able to determine which is the best of the new" in the different localities of the county. Seedlings will be planted these farms when results are made available to the growers can see for themselves how these different selections compare.

County Agent Hahn said that the University of Idaho extension service is working on the selection of beans with the aid of the American legume society, the highest authority on beans, to produce a white bean which is the best of the best.

AGENT REPORTS EXPERIMENTS ON BEANS PROGRESS

Six Farms Have Plots, Breeding and Selection Work Done by University

Bean experiments to determine the yielding ability and resistance to disease of the different selections of Great Northern beans are being carried on this year by the University of Idaho extension service at the experimental plots west of Twin Falls and in cooperation with the farmers in different parts of the county, County Agent Harvey S. Hahn reports.

The Arrate, Leahy and Universal Idaho selections, and certified and ordinary commercial Great Northern, are being grown side by side on the Simon farm, Miller's, the Fellouson farm, Kimberly's, the McQuinn farm, Piller's, the A. H. Jacobs farm, Givens and the Harvey farm. Buhf, Solecting and breeding work which has been carried out by the university extension service for the last four years is being continued on the Wall farm.

This year, with these twenty County Agent Hahn said, "we should be able to determine which is the best of the new" in the different localities of the county. Seedlings will be planted these farms when results are made available to the growers can see for themselves how these different selections compare.
