U.S. May Compromise With France on War Debt Payment Plans

State Department Says Success Seems Assured; French Express Good Will in Note

WASHINGTON, June 26 (UP)—The United States today indicated its willingness to compromise with the French on the \$10,000,000,000 war debt payment plan and will announce the results of the negotiations to the public.

The state department issued a memorandum relative to the French reply to the Hoover proposals in which Secretary of State Stimson said France had "expressed a willingness to be guided by the opinion of my German payments for a year."

The American memorandum and the French note both were made public by the state department.

"There are suggestions in the French proposal which the United States will not accept," Stimson said. "The French government is making the full measure of relief to the debtors corresponding to the president's plan and will not discuss further discussion that will bring the full measure of agreement which the fine evidence of cooperation in the French note gives every hope of success."

The text of Stimson's statement is as follows:

"The French note shows a gratifying cordiality to the president's plan and a willingness to be guided by the opinion of my German payments for a year."

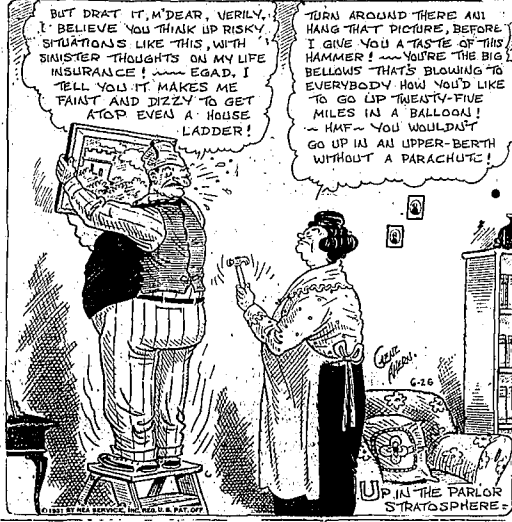

CELEBRATING THE FOURTH
Every year firecrackers, skyrocket, eyes and legs and arms are offered up, with a joyful noise, as our sacrifice on the altar of freedom. It seems to be an accepted fact that the Fourth of July must have its casualties just as Valley Forge and Gettysburg had theirs. The bombs bursting in air and the rockets' red glare have become a part of a grand old custom.
Last year there were 12 deaths in the United States that were due to fireworks. But there were hundreds of celebrants who were injured because of the misdirected revival of the spirit of '76.
The attempt to license the sale and use of the picturesque explosives has helped greatly in decreasing the mortality rate but the death parade is still much too long.

Deep within every small boy there is a desire to let off steam, to make a noise so big that all the neighbors will come running. The Fourth of July gives boys a chance to touch a match to a round red firecracker and run.
But when the smashing sound that is going to bring release to their bottled energy doesn't come, youngsters inevitably creep back to investigate. And a boy's curiosity and the spark in the fuse that connects with the powder under the bright red paper have a habit of getting together at the same time.

Boys aren't the only ones who foster the desire for a mighty sound. Their fathers have it, too. With a gasp of surprise and a shouting "Tommy how it went!" they nonchalantly light a giant cracker. And fathers aren't immune from disaster.
When there is something definite and necessary to be gained in the risk of life certainly no one should hesitate. A life laid down in the promotion of some principle that is of service to humanity, is never lost. One that is sacrificed carelessly is really never lived.
Life presents enough necessary hazards.

Somehow, activated by the spirit of independence, people take graver risks in motoring, swimming and setting off explosives on Independence Day than on any other day. This spirit has been increasing. There were more casualties last year than either of the two preceding years.
If the twentieth century death parade is going to depress we must realize that though the victory is won, and the flag floats high, life still needs a safeguard. We must learn to celebrate more carefully.

THE SUBMARINE'S FUNCTION.
THE difficulties that have beset the submarine Nautilus on its voyage across the Atlantic indicate that mankind is still a long way from equaling the imaginary submarine of Jules Verne.
Verne's famous submarine, in addition to having living quarters as palatial as those on an ocean liner, was the last word in sturdiness. The ship in which Sir Ernest Wilkins hopes to go to the North Pole seems to fall considerably short of that mark. Extensive repairs are necessary before the craft has even reached the base of her Arctic voyage.
In plain truth, a submarine is an exceedingly delicate mechanism. It is extremely valuable in war, of course; but one wonders if any submarine will ever prove really worth-while for any purpose except that of war-time destruction.

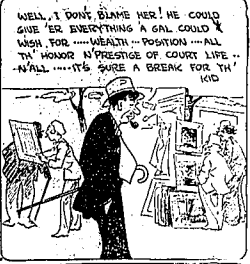
