BOXING WORLD LOOKS ASKANCE AT STRIBLING

Showing In Last Days Of Training Leaves Doubt In Fans' Minds

MAY BE OVERTAILED Schmelling Seen As Favorite At Ring Time

CLEVELAND, O., June 29 (AP)—Young Stribling, jettie of Georgian racial origin, is the star of the boxing world in a freedom over what he will do when he faces Max Schmelling of Germany for the world's heavyweight title in the new Cleveland stadium Friday night.

One out of ten boxing men favor Stribling to win, but after seeing the contender's next to last workout last night, the logical question is: why?

Stribling's record reveals that he has always made his big chance in the post, and his training activities do not reveal him as an improved fighter.

He was awkward, inaccurate and slow in a round without last night against Frank Cawley, Frank Kille, and Gene Stanton.

One of the best answers to why Schmelling is favored is that Schmelling is decidedly unpopular in his own town and today, after his long and arduous training, he is being recognized as champion by winning on a foul from Jack Sharkey.

Not that Schmelling is a weakling, but the odds of their workmate, Sandusky, neither fighter is much of a hand, in only 30 seconds out of 14 rounds of sparring at his Camp Lake, Pa., training camp, did Schmelling look anything like the fighter who knocked out Johnny Hirsch, or stashed Pauline (Lizeman) to oblivion.

As far as condition is concerned, Schmelling appears to be in better shape and more ready for a long, hard scrap than Stribling.

Some of Stribling's wild rushes at the sparring partners seem to indicate that the Georgian plans to try to knock out the German as quickly as possible.

Boxing men figure the better the fight goes, the better a chance Schmelling has to win. The German has never been a fast starter.

But few think that Stribling will give Schmelling the opportunity to carry the fight into the last stages, which makes the whole controversy around what the weatherer does.

WATER SHORTAGE IS BIG PROBLEM IN UTAH DISTRICT

Rivers At Lowest Point In Years, Survey Report Shows

OTHER AREAS EFFECTED

Novada And Parts Of Idaho Running Short

SALT LAKE CITY, June 29 (AP)—Exact measurements and long time records only left little doubt that Utah faces one of the most serious water shortages in its history.

Present status of the situation was revealed by A. P. Partridge, district engineer of the water resources branch, United States geological survey.

Partridge said the Provo river at Vivian park had reached its lowest stage in the past 20 years.

The Weber river is lower, for this time, than at any time in the past 28 years.

More or less similar conditions obtain in Nevada, certain parts of Idaho and Pacific coast sections, Partridge pointed out.

Crisis at Hand

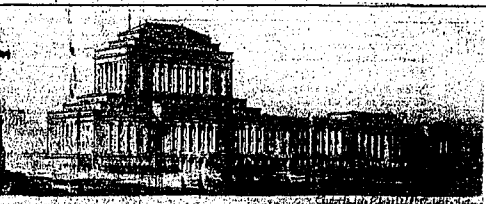
It was indicated previously that France may waive her insistence that she share equities with the bank for international settlements. The bank from Germany's \$65,000,000 mark (about \$116,275,000) unconditional annuities payable due Wednesday.

The bank agreement may bring about a compromise in the French and American viewpoints. One solution considered Saturday, it was understood was that the bank agree to advance for one year funds required to balance budgets of Yugoslavia, Roumania, and Greece, as a result of their failure to receive their conditional annuities payment.

No Budget Loss The French government is no longer bothered by its own budget deficits as a result of the loss of other or conditional or unconditional annuities. The budget will continue to show the usual deficit, but the payments received will advance a similar amount to the treasury budget, receiving the cash from last year next year.

The United Press learned that Mellon expressed his apprehensions to Washington's approval of the French reservation under which Germany will borrow both the unconditional annuity payments after having paid them to

RUSSIA'S alleged dumping of goods into the United States, as into other countries, is a result of her effort to sell enough to finance her own industrial development. She is strapping herself to do this. Exporting products, including foodstuffs, which she could well use.

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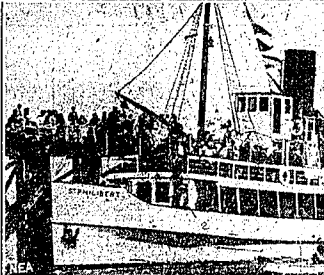
