### France Unwilling To Halt Payment Of German Cash

Crisis is Reached As Mellon and Edge Agree To Adjourn Sessions; Cable Asks U. S. Instructions

PARIS, June 30 (UP)—A deadlock was feared today in the Franco-American conversations looking to an agreement on President Hoover's war debt and reparations holiday plan.

Andrew W. Mellon, secretary of the treasury, said the conversations had been adjourned until tomorrow.

A crisis was indicated, and it was understood that he had been requested to enable Washington for further instructions.

Negotiations were said to be most cordial, but the French apparently have made it clear that they are not willing to yield to a compromise on their reparation to the Hoover plan. The French accepted the Hoover plan as a temporary measure, with the reservation that Germany pay its reparations until the year of grace to be granted under Hoover's project.

### NEBRASKA FIGHTS 'HOPPER SWARMS'

Farm Crops Ruined Under Attack of Millions Of Insects

LINCOLN, Neb., June 30 (UP)—Great swarms of grasshoppers today worked their way through north central Nebraska, ruining farm crops to an extent that cattle was ordered for the section.

Wheat, oats and alfalfa fields, corn pastures, were reported left barren by the millions of insects. Farmers appealed to Gov. Charles Dyer for aid, so acute was the situation.

State and federal authorities were asked to supply funds for purchase and distribution of insect poison. The state set aside \$1500 for preventive work. Congressman Edgar Howard of Columbus, appealed to the department of agriculture in Washington, D. C. for further aid.

Not since 1874, when an army of grasshoppers literally devoured the whole section, has damage been so widespread in the north central section of the state, he said.

Halfway trains were forced to travel on delayed schedules throughout the section. Tracks were made slippery by the crushed bodies of the swarming pest. All trains used sand to prevent the wheels from spinning off the rails.

Clothes, left lying on the ground or even stretched over a line, were gnawed into small pieces by the insects, it was reported.

Straw, and hay, which were scattered, together with the fact that winter was mild in this section, is responsible for the pestilence, experts said.

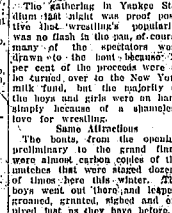

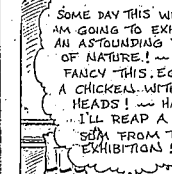

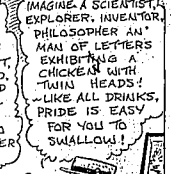

# NEW LINDBERGH AIRSHIP IS FASTER THAN OLD PLANE

### Cruising Radius Of Latest Model Smaller Than "B. Louis"

### HOLDS 425 HORSEPOWER

### Can Maintain Speed Of 170 Miles Per Hour

WASHINGTON, June 29 — The Lockheed "Spirit" monoplane, to be used by Charles and Anne Lindbergh in their Pacific flight, has far greater power and speed than the smaller "Spirit of St. Louis," which blazed an air trail from New York to Paris.

The "Spirit of St. Louis" is a biplane, where it attracts a never-ending stream of interested on-lookers. So great was the attraction, in fact, that the plane had to be hung at the very entrance to the airport from the building reserved for other planes of historic value.

First of type — The Lockheed "Spirit" plane, already used by the Lindberghs in their second trans-continental flight in 1929, was the first of the type manufactured by the Lockheed division of the Lockheed Aircraft Corporation. Power — Lindbergh's new plane is powered with a Wasp engine, which develops 425 horsepower at 2,600 revolutions per minute. The old one was motored with a Wright engine that developed 223 horsepower at 2,600 revolutions per minute.

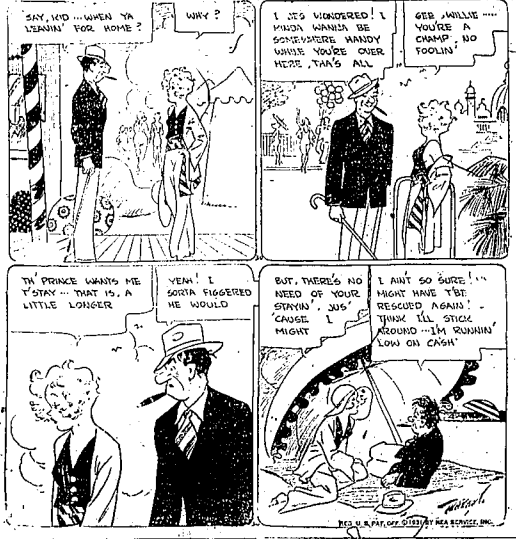
