DETECTIVES HUNT PERPETRATORS OF GIANT BOMB PLOT

Authorities Believe They Are Tightening Net Around Culprits

FIVE MEN THOUGHT TO BE INVESTIGATORS

Communist or Anti-Fascist At Bottom of Horrible Scheme

NEW YORK, Jan. 1 (UP)—Authorities here today believed they were tightening the net on a plot to blow up the coastwise shipping lanes across the country by distorting the packages of powerful bombs from New York and Boston. Three lives have been claimed by the bombs and there is a possibility that many more will be lost in the months or years. The authorities here, working in close cooperation with the FBI, have identified a group of men who are believed to be the perpetrators of the plot.

NATIONALITY SEAR

Delivery of bomb packages to Detroit and Youngstown had served to identify the individuals who were believed to be the perpetrators of the plot. The packages were found in Detroit, Youngstown, and other cities. The individuals involved are believed to be of various nationalities, including Italian, German, and American.

Hope To Track Men



DAIRY INDUSTRY CONDITIONS GOOD
O. T. Koster, Creamery Manager, Looks To Future "With Optimism"

Conditions in the dairy industry at the close of the year 1931 compared to a year previous are considerably better, therefore I look forward to the coming year with confidence.
Holdings of dairy products, which always accumulate during the heavier producing months of the year, are being marketed at a price which is a fair return on the cost of production, were they not, they would be a waste of money. This year, especially butter which showed a marked increase in price, was sold at \$2.00 per cwt. and \$8.012, 000 pounds respectively. Consumption of all dairy products "exclusively" made has also been much heavier than last year due in part to educational campaigns carried on in the local cities of such products.
Butter prices have again shown the year's gain in price. However, it is formed by several dairymen in this section, that with present feed prices, where a minimum of commercial dairy feeds are purchased, butter can be produced at a profit, with a herd of good producing cows.
