

MINIDOKA TURKEY POOL ORGANIZING

Last Shipment of Season Will Be Received January 12 at Rupert.

HOMICIDE TRIAL AT IDAHO FALLS PROGRESSES.

The next shipment of turkeys from the Minidoka Turkey pool will be received on Tuesday, January 12, at the Newmark warehouse. This will probably be the last shipment of the pool this season. Turkeys are shipped from the Idaho Egg Producers association, members of which are the Northwest Turkey Growers association.

Plates received from the Idaho Egg Producers association, the total amount being \$1,710.65. Prices ranged from 25¢ from prime birds to 29¢ for conical birds, the average price paid after deducting discounts amounting to 27.55 cents per pound. The price paid in New York was 23.30 cents per pound, and the December Christmas price shows that there were 1923 prime birds, in the shipment, 546 choice and 69 conical, or a total of 2538 turkeys.

The total weight was 13,000 pounds, an average of 13 pounds per turkey. Prices have not yet been received for the December shipment.

operation to protect American rights against future development.

Congressional reaction was favorable, but some members, however, doubted whether the action would be effective.

Chairman, Board of the National War District Relations Committee, said:

"The above power must be presented by the Japanese invasion of Manchuria, or we shall be compelled to prohibit the very rights which Japan has been doing, but if that treaty were respected and the Japanese government signatory to it, it would solve the Manchurian problem."

Senator Moses, Repp., N. H.:

"To invoke the China-power treaty is one thing; to invoke action under it is another."

"The administration now, I am afraid, has not realized that they would not succeed as in the possibilities should Japan ignore the warning. There is no thought of battle, but of a boycott. The United States has no thought of withdrawing its ambassador from Tokyo. High officials feel that channels of peaceful diplomacy must be kept open."


