IDAHO FALLS, Jan. 20 (UP)—Shipments out of Idaho and Colorado, packed on the Idaho potato, amounting to a very large accumulation of supplies in the principal Idaho markets during the week.

For example, C. H. Hines, vice president of the A. S. Department of the United States and Canada, said that the truck shipments in Idaho last Monday were 450 cars as compared with 200 cars in the preceding Monday.

Weather a Factor

Last week potato shipments from the upper part of the Snake river valley were somewhat restricted by unfavorable hauling conditions and warehouse at points were inactive or working on part-time basis.

 SINKING OF BRESLAU
 On Jan. 20, 1918, the German warship Breslau was sunk and the Baltic cruiser Goeben was damaged in a battle with British naval forces at the entrance to the Bosphorus in the eastern Mediterranean.
 The Goeben was run aground after being badly damaged, and it remained to free itself and escape into the Dardanelles.
 The Goeben ship had escaped from Admiral Troubridge at the beginning of the war, and were sent to Turkey. The Turks named the Goeben, the Sultan Selim, and the Breslau, the Midulla.
 H. M. S. Tabard attacked the Breslau and the Goeben, both returned the British ships' fire. The Breslau was then joined by H. M. S. Thetis. H. M. S. Thetis was heavily hit, and sank.
 Steaming away, the Breslau escaped unharmed, apparently striking a mine. Two of these mines later were three more explosions. She hoisted one and sank. On seeing the Breslau sink, the Goeben circled her, and then steamed off to the south.

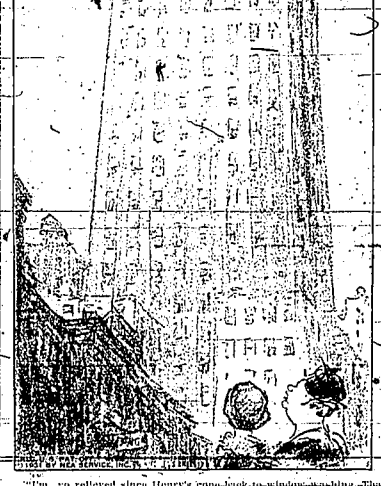
