GREENWOOD, Miss., Jan. 21 (UP)—Doat guard boats from Chicago carried over 800,000 acres of flooded northern Mississippi today removing refuse and carrying food and medical supplies. Red Cross workers loaded some of the boats with medicine and doctors to be taken to Crowley, a small isolated town in Quitman county, where diseases were reported breaking out among the 1,400 refugees there.

In response to questions, he said that every year flying the American flag, with the exception of the Dollar flag, operates 600 and 600,000 tons of tonnage. O'Connor also revealed that the prohibition laws had caused the shipping board to turn \$3,000 worth of liquor stores labeled as "medical stores" over to the United States when they were first purchased by the Chapman interests.

BILL TO ASSIST NEEDY GETS OK OF COMMITTEE

\$376,000,000 Measure To Be Reported Favorably To Senate

WASHINGTON, Jan. 21 (UP)—Action in direct defiance of prohibition policy, the Senate manufacturing committee today voted to report favorably a bill providing \$376,000,000 of federal funds for the distillate unemployed. The bill, which the committee voted was the measure approved by Senators LaFollette, Holloman, Wisconsin, and Coolidge, Democrat, Colorado, it would make \$125,000,000 available before July 1 and the remainder during the next fiscal year. The money would be allocated to the states to provide for the unemployed.

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NEW YORK GETS BIG LOAN FROM BANKING FIRMS

LOWER RENTS IN SIGHT FOR BRITISH POOR

House of Commons Will Hear
Additional Rent Control
Plans

LONDON, (UPI)—Thousands of poor families will be helped, it is expected, if the national government keeps its promise to introduce additional rent restriction legislation soon.

Six and a quarter million houses in England and Wales already are under rent restriction. The controlled houses include many occupied by middle class families.

Although the government has given no definite indication of its new scheme, Prime Minister MacDonald told members of the House of Commons that the government believed that the commission which considered the question last year had the right idea.

Commission's Report

If the commission's report forms the basis of the legislation, rents of all London houses of a rateable value of 75, or under, will be restricted to 50 per cent of the pre-war rent. Houses of a rateable value of 75 and under elsewhere in England and Wales, and of a rateable value of \$23 and under in Scotland, will be restricted to 50 per cent of the pre-war rent.

Rateable value is the yearly income value on which municipal taxation is based. It is calculated about one-half of the rental.

Under the present regulations, the controlled householder, in addition to not being able to increase the rent more than 50 per cent above pre-war rates, cannot dispose of his tenant without a court order, or unless he finds other premises acceptable to the tenant. The tenant has the right to sublet rooms without the landlord's permission. This has led to abuses, the tenant in many cases making several hundred per cent profit by subletting rooms.

Present Regulations

Under the present regulations, whenever a tenant voluntarily increases the rent more than 50 per cent above the pre-war rent.

It is expected that the new legislation will provide that all these cheaper houses shall be controlled and a change of ownership will not result in a rent increase.

It is reported that the slightly more expensive houses, with a rateable value between \$50 and \$75 in London, \$10 and \$105 elsewhere in England and Wales, and \$20 and \$135 in Scotland, will continue to be controlled. In that case, when one of the tenants leaves, his occupancy of the house will become decontrolled automatically and the landlord can increase the rent.

A certain number of still more expensive houses are also controlled at present and the rent whenever a tenant voluntarily increases the rent more than 50 per cent above the pre-war rent.
