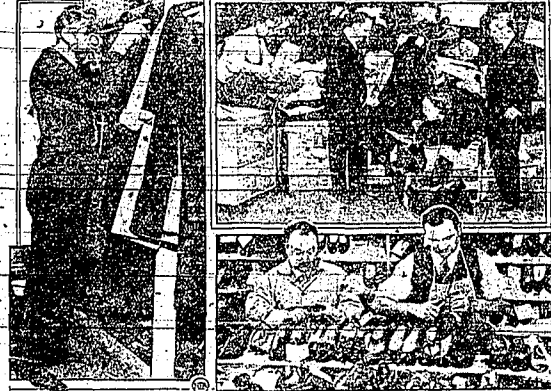

### FATHER KNICKERBOCKER'S LAST YEAR'S SUIT GOES TO NEEDY



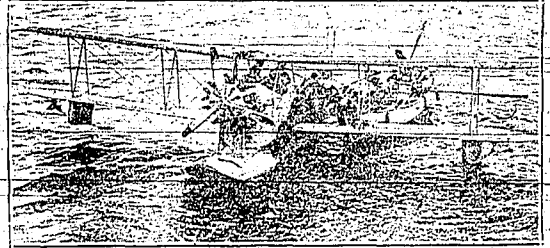

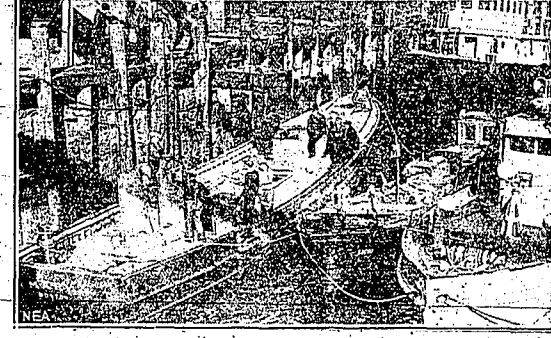

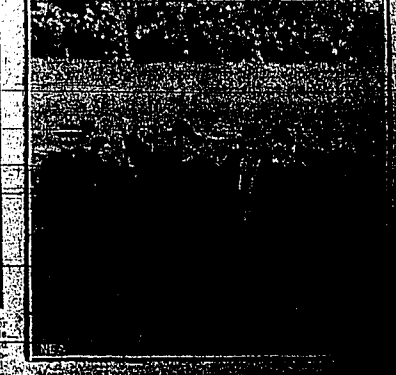

A COMMENDABLE PLAN

PROMISE of the Union Pacific railroad company to cooperate with the program of Governor Ross in finding markets for Idaho's surplus farm products, is reassuring.

Maybe the results of the plan will not be immediately felt, or they may even not accomplish all that is hoped, but at least utilization would be made of the facilities the shipping industry has in endeavoring to find new outlets for products of all descriptions.

It appears that from a purely selfish standpoint, railroad companies generally might well make this work one of their major promotion activities. In the past they have undertaken this method on a more or less consistent scale, but no one realizes just how far they might go in this regard with profit to themselves and their shipper-producers.

Certainly the campaigns which are carried on every year by the transportation companies to stimulate travel, are profitable efforts. Steamship companies paint the allurements of the Mediterranean, of Hawaii in the Winter time; the railroads publish booklets on the national parks, and on winter resorts, on dude ranches and on a variety of places to go. All this is merely to stimulate travel.

It is traditional that the passenger traffic of railroads is unprofitable, yet seemingly no expense is spared to induce further patronage.

Now the carriers' efforts might well be similarly directed to selling campaigns for transportation of goods. An advertising program, say by the Union Pacific on Idaho beans, or potatoes, efficiently conducted, would benefit the railroad as much as the grower, and would be just as reasonable and as legitimate as a magazine page advertisement, for instance, on the glories of Yellowstone park, intended entirely to lure eastern tourists to the west.

This newspaper, sympathetic to the efforts of Governor Ross in his idea to seek the help of the railroad companies in stimulating a demand for Idaho's products, urges the adoption of this advertising plan as a practical and feasible method of accomplishing the desires of the roads for more freight traffic, and of the producers for more outlets.

Already the road, through President Gray at the Pocatello conference Wednesday, indicated the company's interest to cooperate. Here is one way to start the ball rolling at once.

Failing the adoption of some such policy, the rail carriers will continue to lose out on much of the freight business, through the willingness of its newest competitor to practically adopt the method here outlined. Reference is made to the fact that in this community, there has grown up

a mounting volume of freight business by truck carriers, who go right to the producers' orchards or fields, buy the products, and transport these products to outside communities and states, finding their own markets and buyers!

Last fall a good proportion of the fruit crop here was so disposed of. Certainly the railroad companies are not unfamiliar with this situation. It is a growing business, almost entirely because it is one of service, one of the carrier finding the market and of them supplying it.

That is why trucks ran back and forth between here and California last fall, carrying butter and other dairy products to the coast and returning loaded with citrus fruits.

All the rail companies need do is to meet this new competition with similar services and they will continue to be the important and essential utilities they once were.

The Governor's idea will eventually be adopted with great enthusiasm. It has real possibilities and is a most constructive suggestion.

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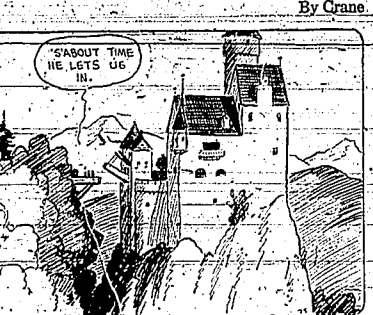

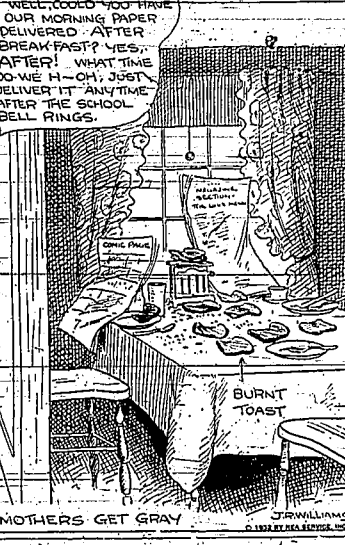

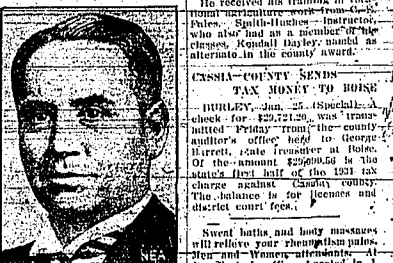

# Hawaii—Cross Roads of Pacific and Melting Pot of Many Races Under United States Flag

Hawaii, the famous "Meatling Pot of the Pacific," at last failed to melt.

The events that have followed the failure of a native to become as a result of an attack on the part of an American naval officer have raised this question.

Hawaii, with its rapidly growing population of nearly 300,000 people, is probably the most complex mixture of races to be found anywhere in the world. Its population is made up of native Hawaiians, of Portuguese, Japanese, Anglo-Saxons, Filipinos, Chinese, Porto Ricans and Koreans.

No nationality can claim more than a third of its total population, and the admixture of its inhabitants is the mixed blood of many races.

This strange racial mixture under Uncle Sam's flag is a result of the successive immigration of Hawaii a sugar and pineapple country which has resulted in the census as high as 310,000 in 1920.

To reach this figure, it has been necessary for the sugar planters to import great numbers of laborers from Japan, from China, from the Philippines, from Porto Rico, from Korea, and from other parts of the world where cheap native labor is plentiful.

Most of these laborers are here on a temporary basis, and under which they work for five years at stipulated wages for the contract period, and then return to their native lands, but many have remained in Hawaii and the seed life of Hawaii to their liking and remain to add to the constantly growing population of the territorial government.

Hawaii was annexed to the United States when its new republican government's petition for annexation was adopted by Congress and signed by President McKinley in 1898. A previous petition, in 1858, had been rejected by President Cleveland. Previously, Hawaii had been a kingdom.

Hawaii's population, in round numbers, is divided as follows: Native Hawaiians, 90,000; mixed-bloods, 22,000; Chinese, 22,000; Japanese, 14,000; Portuguese, 32,000; Filipinos, 7,000; Porto Ricans, 8,000; Koreans, 2,500; Anglo-Saxons, including 15,000 soldiers, 40,000.

Honolulu, the commercial and political capital of the territory, is a modern city of 120,000 population on the island of Oahu. Its citizens include a majority of the Anglo-Saxons on the islands, a large share of the native and mixed Hawaiians, and thousands of the Asiatics who do most of the heavy work.

Race is always a big issue in elections and since the Hawaiians are 1/3 children, members of that race are usually given the more important posts in the local government.

One recent political applicant claimed Hawaiian, Portuguese, Filipino and Japanese blood—his principal qualifications for office. Juries are made up of men of many races.

Of the 250,000 or more natives on the islands, less than 50 percent are citizens, and few of those who are take the trouble to vote. This race gives the Hawaiian element of the islands the dominant voice in politics and administration of the Portuguese and Hawaiian elements is almost always successful.

Racial prejudices and hatreds are widespread in Hawaii, especially in the public school system, which includes Japanese and Filipinos, and by the numerous internecine wars which, in time, may bring about an entirely new race, not European and not Asiatic.

Regardless of their parentage, all children born in Hawaii are of course, American citizens, and this fact is expected to make the Japanese population a political power in the future.

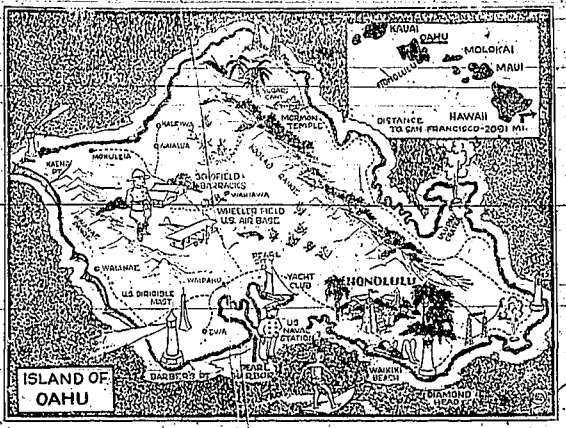

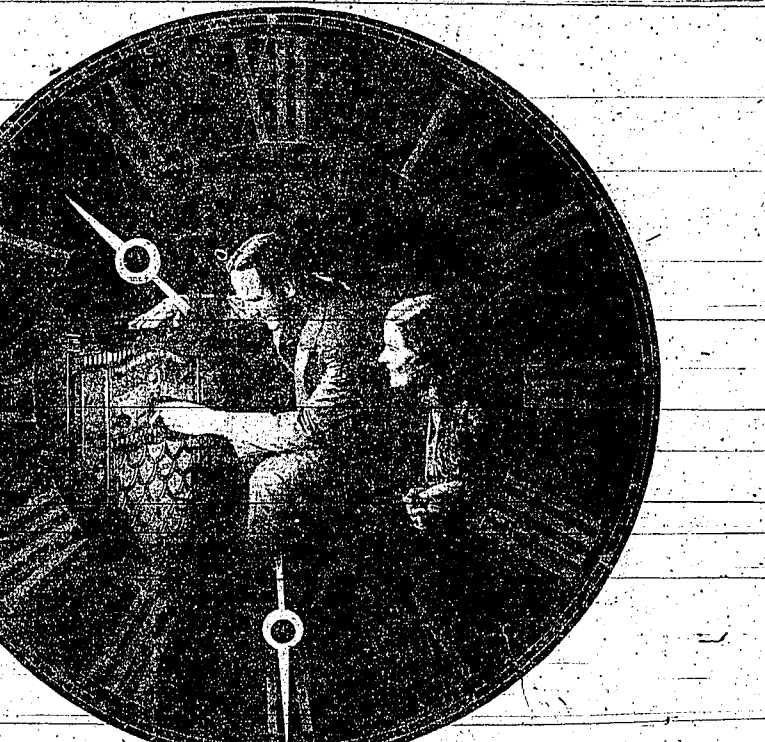
