Game Close Until Near End But Locals Win By Score Of 51-33

Before an enthusiastic crowd of basketball fans, McMillan's "Friendly" Twin Falls five defeated the visiting Ricks college team on the high school floor here Wednesday evening.

Throughout a thrilling first half neither team could gain a lead, although the Twin Falls five held what advantage there was and led at the end of the period, 15-13. Rapid passing, often intercepted, featured the play of both teams during this half.

The second half found the Twin Falls team "shuttling" as they start to maintain its lead, but after a few minutes the local five had again taken a lead, this time of a margin of eight. It was not until the final quarter, however, that sufficient pointing was added to the Friendly Five score to practically assure the victory. With but a minute to play both teams acted in several substitutes, but the result was unaltered by play of the fresh material.

The Twin Falls team, composed of former high school and college stars, showed up well against the college five, which is rated as one of the strongest groups of ball men that show up at most high school games here.

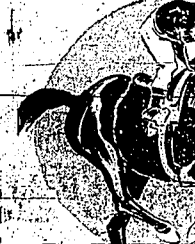

Bout Between Battalino And Miller 'No Contest'

CINCINNATI, Ohio, Jan. 28 (UP)—The aftermath of the ill-fated world's featherweight title "no contest" bout between Champion (Nat) Battalino, Hartford, Conn., and Freddie Miller, Cincinnati, resulted in a formal "no contest" decision by the boxing commission, after Freddie Lou Thurman had walked out of the ring with both men on their feet fighting.

Battalino, who appeared to have waded his battle with strength to make the featherweight limit of 126 pounds, sustained today the weak "no contest" verdict by strength like I always do after I get into following the action in the ring. "But I still thought I would hit strong enough to win," Miller hit me a body blow in the third round. It hurt. It felt low. Then when I was knocked down later my eyes went black and everything turned black. The Miller looked as big as a heavyweight. I seemed in a daze."

Battalino was deprived of all claim to the featherweight title when he weighed 127 1/2, three and three-quarters pounds over the divisional weight limit. 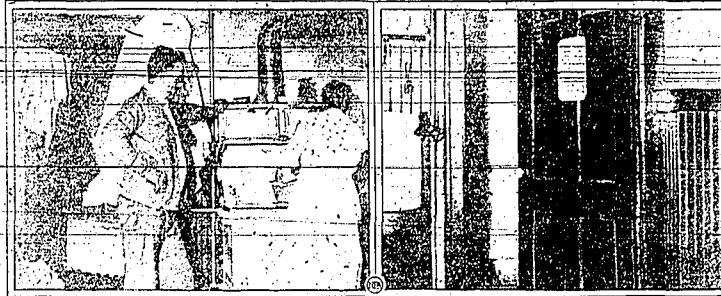

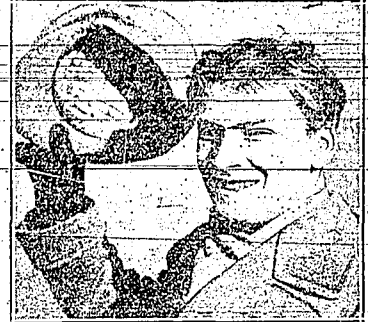

Here are first pictures of the interior of the fabulously rich tomb of six ancient Mexican chieftains at Monte Alban near Oaxaca, Mexico, 200 miles southeast of Mexico City. The tomb (right) in richly that of King Tut in Egypt and is one of the most important discoveries made on this continent. The chieftains are believed to have been killed in battle in the 15th century.



A decorated skull, believed by archeologists to have been that of a warrior of an opposing tribe killed in battle by one of the six chieftains whose tomb was opened. The skull was decorated with curved sea shells plucked in the eye sockets, a piece of flint in the nose cavity, and discharges as it was also decorated with turquoise.

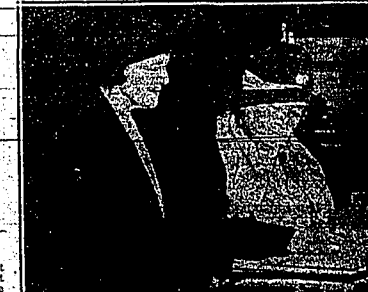

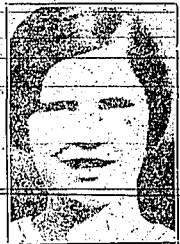

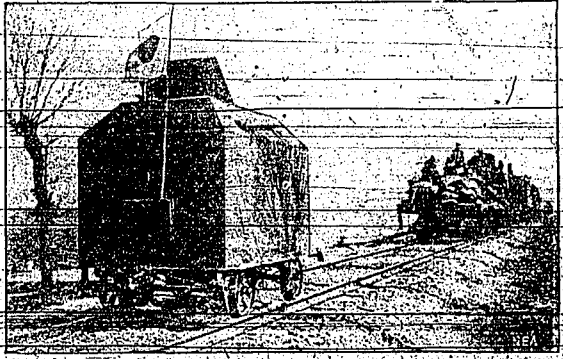

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BURLEY AUDITOR DISTRIBUTES TAX FUNDS TO UNITS

School and Highway Districts, and Municipalities Get Shares of Money

BURLEY, (Special)—Receipts from the Cassia county auditor to the following taxing districts, following collection of first installment of 1931 taxes, including also delinquent collections for past months, were distributed today, coming through the county as follows:

Burley Ind. School District No. 1, \$10,258.00; Oakley Ind. School District No. 2, \$6,194.88; Idaho Ind. School District No. 3, \$3,047.44; Rural High School District No. 1, \$2,126.80; Burley Irrigation District, \$14,851; Oakley Irrigation District, \$3,116.17; River Highway District, \$3,702.88; Burley Highway District, \$21,683.51; Aldon Highway District, \$22,077. Village of Oakley, \$27,731.21; Village of Arco, \$147,000; City of Burley, \$12,021.14; Village of Aldon, \$1,000.

The county received the sum of \$66,776 as 1 1/2 per cent collection fee on taxes collected for all districts except independent schools, whose taxes are collected free by the county. Money was enacted by the 1925 legislature, prior to which time collections were required to pay a four per cent collection charge. (Collections fees are deducted and transferred to the county general fund, before the remittances are made.)
