## Cars Interfered With Removal of Snow From Gutters, Says Sanderson

During the "present" season, when Twin Falls is experiencing considerably more rainfall than snowfall, the cars on the streets of cities instead of placing them in garages are likely to be fined for violation of the city's rules concerning prohibited parking in the downtown area for more than one hour from 2 a. m. to 6 p. m.

This warning was voiced at the regular weekly meeting of the Twin Falls city council Monday evening, in connection with a discussion of city street Commissioner T. Sanderson told the council employees in his department would have trouble getting their cars parked across streets from melting snow, provided it were possible to drive graders about the streets during the spring. It was further pointed out that auto drivers who were caught away from "cups," when autos are parked in the street all night, however, would meet with a fine, he said. Cooperation of the police department in enforcing the ordinance against all-night parking was asked.

Regular monthly reports, including those of the fire chief, water department, dairy chief, meat market, police and library, were received by the council.

A warrant for \$137.50, payable to the Association, was issued by the county commissioners for January salaries of municipal employes earning more than \$75 per month, was issued.
