

U.S. EXCELS JAPAN IN AIR AND ON SEA, BUT ARMY IS SMALLER



These sketches show comparative strength of the armies, navies and air forces of the United States and Japan. The United States has an superior air force and a heavier navy, but the Japanese have a much larger standing army.

The comparative strengths of the American army and navy total about 1,123,000 men and 2,500 men compared with 150,000 men and 114,120 men in the Japanese air corps.

The Army's standing army is double that of the Japanese because it is in its battleships. Japan has only 19.

The Japanese standing army of 150,000 is America's next of 137,472, but the actual war strength of either nation is problematical in view of Japan's compulsory military training and the United States' National Guard and reserve power.









FIGURE IN MURDER TRIAL OF YOUNG SPORTSMEN





U. S. ARMY-NAVY PREPARE FOR HAWAII WAR GAMES




