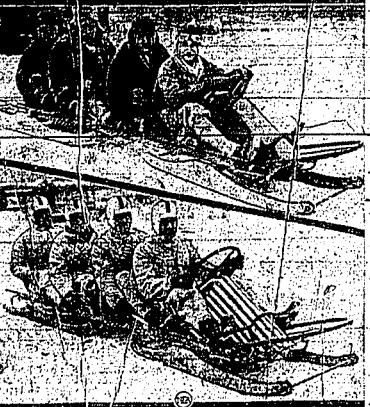

Capacity Crowd Expected To See Ex-Titlholder Fight Christner

CLAYLAND, O. (UP)—More than five years after losing the heavyweight title, Jack Dempsey remains today Pugilistic world's biggest attraction.

In one of boxing's worst financial years, Dempsey is heading attendance and gate receipts records throughout the country. He is expected to attract for money and crowds. In 17 exhibitions since August 19, Dempsey has attracted 61, 600,000, 188,274 persons and gate receipts of \$171,375.50.

Dempsey's share of the receipts amounted to about \$116,000. He usually nets 50 per cent of the net receipts.

Today Dempsey meets Meyer (140) Christner of Akron, O., in a round bout at Cleveland auditorium. Promoter Joe Louis expects a capacity crowd of 11,000 and receipts of about \$30,000. It will be the first time in about 17 1/2 years a boxing bout has sold out in Cleveland, except for the Cleveland News Christmas charity fund show of 1920.

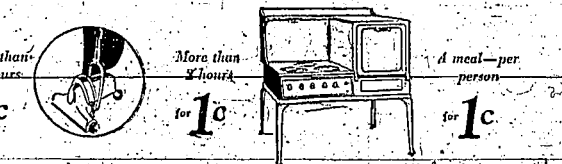

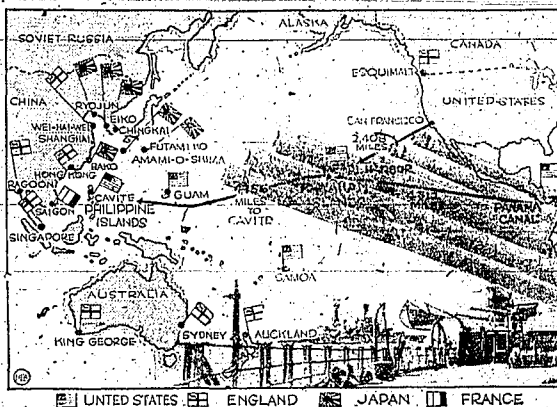

Pacific Ocean? It's War-Like Now!

Naval bases of the four great naval powers in the Pacific are shown on the map above.

In view of the present situation in China, it is interesting to remember that the two great United States bases in the Pacific, at Cavite and Pearl Harbor, are each equipped to handle complete battle fleets. China is a floating station, the United States is a floating base.

The Japanese bases are near the island empire itself and are easily defended.

The numerous British bases are either too far from the ocean or too far from the ocean to handle a large fleet, with the exception of Hongkong and Singapore.

The French base at Saigon is equipped to handle only small boats.

Of all the bases in the Pacific, Uncle Sam's Pearl Harbor, in Hawaii, is perhaps the best equipped and the best defended.

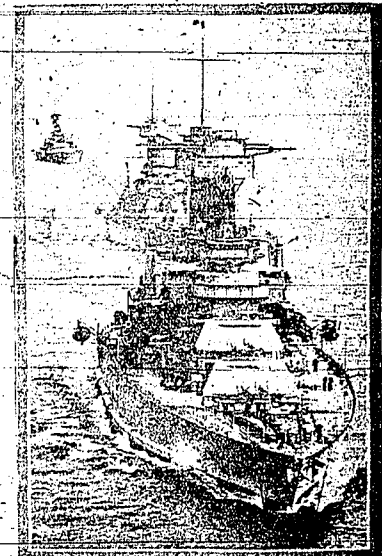
In addition to the distant Pacific bases shown on this map, the United States has naval stations on its own west coast, including those at Seattle, San Francisco and San Diego.

THE FLEET SAILS WEST



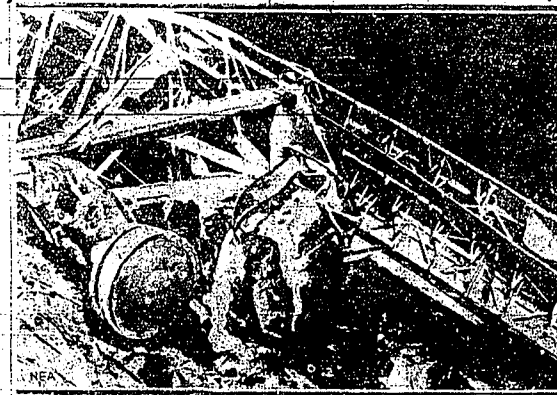

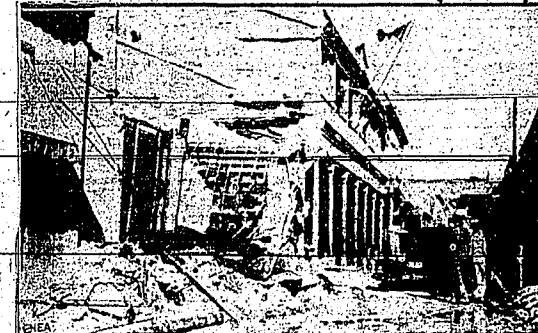

THE PROBLEM AT GENEVA

SO FAR, the proceedings of the disarmament conference at Geneva have hardly been of a kind to make a believer in world peace give three loud cheers.
 The thunder of the guns in the far east has sounded all too clearly in Geneva. The conference, despite its high importance, despite the millions of people who are hopefully looking to it for real results, has moments in which it looks almost farcical.

But all of this is not simply because an impish and sardonic fate has decided to drop a monkey wrench into the machinery. The reason lies farther back—and is more disturbing. The conferees are having difficulties, not because international affairs have taken a bad turn, but because the world at large, in trying to get rid of war, has tackled the job wrong-end to.

We are trying to insure world peace without giving up the practices that lead to war.

International co-operation, on really important matters, is still little more than a dream. Each nation continues to foster the old rivalries. Nationalism is exactly the sort of force it was prior to 1914. The course that led to war in 1914 is still being followed—and instead of finding a new course, we are trying to persuade ourselves that everything will be all right if only all hands will agree to reduce armies and navies!

And because we are trying to do the job in that way, the delegates at Geneva are having a heart-breakingly discouraging time.

It would be possible to start the job at the other end. If an honest effort could be made to straighten out the map of Europe; if attempts to get national advantages at the expense of one's neighbors could be abandoned; if some of the damaging restrictions on world trade could be removed; if the "advanced" nations could forget their scramble for special privileges in Africa, China and elsewhere—if all of those things could be done, the disarmament would be simple.

But we haven't done them and we haven't tried to; and, in consequence, our attempts to get a respectable disarmament treaty face very steep odds.

CANDIDATE DEFENBACH

ANNOUNCEMENT of the candidacy of Byron Defenbach for the Republican nomination for governor of Idaho will be of particular interest to his friends in the Levison region where he is well known as a former resident. Members of his party in this region gave Mr. Defenbach support in his vain endeavor to secure the nomination in 1930 and lost out only in the now famous machinations of the Idaho Falls convention.

In the last pre-convention campaign it was popularly declared that had the nomination at that time been by a direct vote of the party instead of by convention delegates, Mr. Defenbach would have been the Republican candidate by an overwhelming majority. Ample opportunity to test the truth of that assertion will be presented this May when all candidates will be selected under the provisions of the new state primary law.

At this time there is no declared opposition candidate to Mr. Defenbach within his own party and in view of the apparent lack of aspirants it is reasonable to assume that he has a very good chance of winning the nomination. Secretary of State Fred E. Lukens has been mentioned as a possible opponent but it is generally understood that he will not be a candidate for the governorship.

One of the most interesting angles of the situation will be the reaction of the old standpatters of the state Republican party, the "machine element" if you prefer, to Mr. Defenbach's candidacy. This faction has been badly riddled by political developments of the last two years, but it is by no means out of the picture, and surely is a powerful minority. Mr. Defenbach based his pre-convention campaign in 1930 on attacking this element and thereby not only split the party wide open but also incurred the whole-hearted animosity of the victorious faction. What will the members of the old guard do? Will they recant former vows of enmity, take their medicine like good soldiers and go over to Mr. Defenbach or remain at arm's length with daggers drawn?

It appears most likely that a goodly proportion of the irreconcilables will swallow their pride and silently acquiesce in, if not support, the nomination of Mr. Defenbach. His real battle will come in the fall election, not the primary. Governor Ross proved himself a potent candidate in 1930 and there is ample evidence to justify the assumption that he will be an even more formidable foe in 1932.

There are many auguries of a bright 1932, including a practically unlimited water supply for all southern Idaho, a favorable white-fly situation and consequently a good beef prospect, financial help through the Reconstruction Finance Corporation and other sources, an early spring, and better market prices for the products of this section.

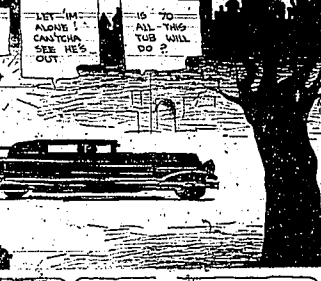

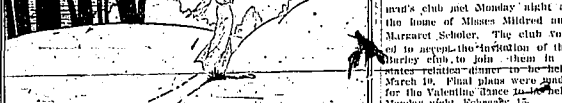

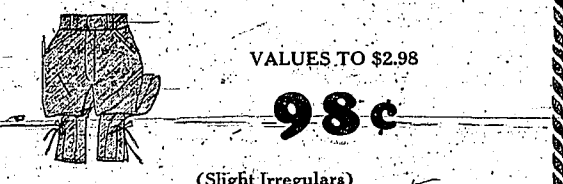
