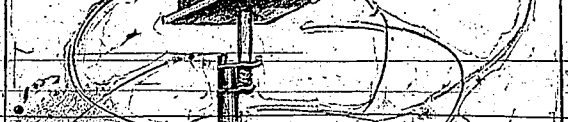
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DEMPESEY TO FACE KING LEVINSKY IN RING AT CHICAGO

Battle Will Do Much To Determine Former Champion's Chances

CHICAGO, (AP)—Jack Dempsey returned to Chicago today for the most important test of his comeback trail which is regarded as a golden chance for the former heavyweight champion.

Dempsey with three successive knockouts to his credit will meet King Levinsky, a heavy-weight, in a four round bout with ten ounce gloves at the Chicago stadium Thursday night.

The outcome of Levinsky's bout promises to give the public a definite line on Dempsey's chances to make it back into the heavyweight title ring.

Dempsey has appeared in 22 cities, boxed 21 opponents, and scored 23 knockouts since he started his comeback tour in Mexico Aug. 12.

In less than a month of fighting last night in Philadelphia, Dempsey added two knockouts to his record. He stopped George Kozlov and finished the Melanchuk, the Ukrainian, in one round and 12 seconds with a series of left and right to the head.

These two opponents, both of inferior fighting ability, proved nothing more about Dempsey than what was already known—that he has retained his punch and has a chance to step any lighter he can hit.

Dempsey's aggressive style and Levinsky's dangerous right hand promise to back Thursday night's scheduled 15 minutes of fighting with as much action as it is expected for 10 rounds with one ounce gloves.

The fact that Dempsey now has three losses doesn't take much of the kick out of his victory. He stopped a try hard punch in Kozlov (C. O. Crutcher) and a champion he has not since he reclaimed the recent prize in his four on the four at least once.

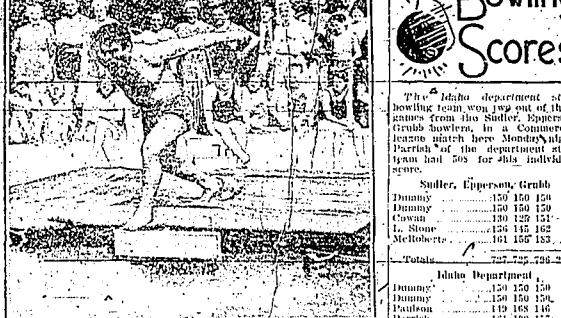

COACHES DIVIDED ON RULE CHANGES

Ingram of California Says Heart Is Taken Out of The Defense

SAN FRANCISCO, (AP)—Northern California football coaches were divided today in their opinion of the major changes proposed for the rules committee in New York.

William A. Ingram, chief California coach, said "Chief Noy" meant, contended they would take the heart out of the defense.

Other comments: Edward (Skip) Madden, St. Mary's, "The elimination of the change for a flying wedge from the kickoff is a good rule. The rule committee is not so far, though some of the changes will help."

George (Chet) Smith, Santa Clara, "A player can't use his hands on defense is out of luck, but the flying wedge has its value."

Howard (Red) Smith, San Francisco University, "The new substitution rule will help the little schools."

Frank Anderson, at Notre Dame, said the rule prohibiting use of arms and forearms on an opposing player's head, neck, or shoulders places a premium on the larger player and lessens the value of a small player who relies more on the strength in his arms than on his body in defensive play.

Bo Armstrong, University of Utah, "The new rules don't help me, although I don't believe football, even with the 120 rules, was a dangerous game."

Green, of the University of Wisconsin, "Abolishing the flying tackle and block will eliminate much clipping and will be a very good rule but it will not eliminate injuries."

Dick Hanley, Northwestern University, "No change must change down the chances of injuries. I will bet on where the rules will better the game."

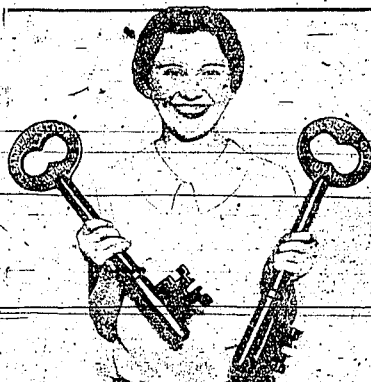

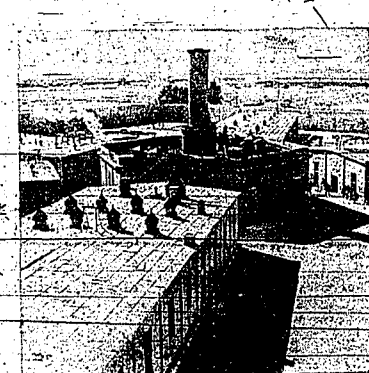

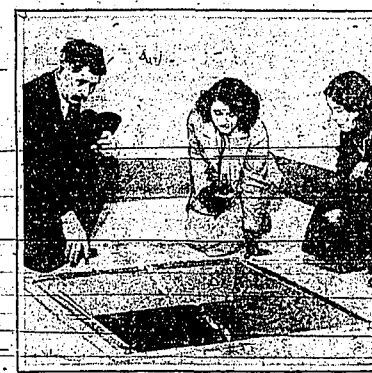

ANALYZING THE TAX DOLLAR

An analysis of the tax dollar paid in Twin Falls county, compiled from an actual assessment on an individual whose tax bill was \$100.05 on a piece of Twin Falls residence property, reveals some facts in regard to the moot subject of taxation which will perhaps be illuminating to those who have neglected to give this phase of the matter sufficient consideration.

Although figures are proverbially "dry," the ones given here are far from it for they hold the key to the situation in Twin Falls county.

"Where does the money go?" is the frequent query. Well, let's see what became of the \$100 paid by the individual referred to, or for that matter, what becomes of any \$100 taxes on property, situated in the same particular subdivisions as those of the taxpayer in question.

This is the way his \$100 in 1931 taxes was distributed:

Independent School Dis. No. 1	\$ 29.76
City of Twin Falls	29.52
Twin Falls County	16.48
Twin Falls Highway District	15.99
State of Idaho	7.99
American Falls Reservoir District	.31
Total	\$100.05

Bear in mind that the foregoing instance applies to property located only in the taxing units as indicated. To ascertain the proportion of each \$100 of taxes paid in, say the Murtaugh or Filer highway district, in a certain town, or any particular school district, it is necessary to analyze each of these separately, and the figures will not apply excepting as to property considered on an equal basis as to location within subdivisions.

For instance, each \$100 in taxes paid on a piece of farm property lying in the Buhl section, outside the incorporation of Buhl-but in the Buhl highway and Buhl school district shows the following approximate division, allowing for fractions:

Buhl Ind. School Dis. No. 3	\$ 34.12
Twin Falls County	26.92
Buhl Highway District	18.08
State of Idaho	18.05
American Falls Reservoir District	.708
Total	\$ 99.97

Now anyone can take his tax notice and analyze it similarly, to determine just how much he pays to each of the political sub-divisions in which his property is located.

The 1931 levies per each \$100 of assessed valuation for the state was 65 cents; for the county \$1.34, and for some of the other larger taxing units, they were: Twin Falls highway, \$1.30; Buhl highway, 90 cents; Filer highway, \$1.60; Murtaugh highway, \$1.50; Rock Creek highway, \$1.60. For the cities and villages, they were: Twin Falls, \$2.49; Buhl, \$3.60; Filer, \$2.85; Kimberly, \$2.70; Hansen, \$1.50, and Hollister, \$3.50. For the independent school districts they were: Twin Falls, \$2.42; Kimberly, \$2.05; Buhl, \$1.70; Filer, \$1.40; Filer rural high, 80 cents; Maroa, 80 cents; Hollister, \$2.50; Hollister rural high, \$1.00; Hansen, \$1.60; Murtaugh, \$2.20; Castleford, \$1.35. These levies are not to be confused with the amount of taxes paid; they are the amount of levies for each \$100 in valuation.

The rate of tax in each of the incorporated places in the county per \$100 of taxable valuation, not including special improvement taxes is as follows: Hollister, \$10.29; Filer, \$8.64; Buhl, \$8.19; Twin Falls, \$8.11; Kimberly, \$8.04; Hansen, \$6.39. In each instance these include the combined levies of the state, county, highway district, school district and city or village; the variation being accounted for by the differences of levies in highway districts, school districts, and cities.

The point to remember is that there is more to your tax problem than lies in the control of your county government. During the past week emphasis has been placed on the taxes assessed and collected by the county itself, in contrast to those of the reservoir district, the school district, the cities, the highway districts and the state, over which the county commissioners have positively no control.

Now since Twin Falls is the largest city in the county, (its assessed valuation being about five times as great as the next highest, which is Buhl) and because the assessed valuations in the Twin Falls highway district and school district are also much larger than any of the others, for the purposes of illustration, the analysis of the \$100 paid on Twin Falls city property will be continued here as an example.

We have found that of the \$100 paid, \$16.48 or 16.48 per cent of the entire cost was to meet the county assessment. Let us now dissect this figure,

keeping in mind that we are still dealing with 1931 taxes and will continue to do so:

It is made up of the following charges:

Note Redemption	\$ 7.74
General School tax	7.62
County-hospital, health unit, etc.	3.07
County Fair	.12
Current Expense	4.92
Total (allowing for fractions)	\$16.47

From this we at once eliminate the \$7.62 item, as it is mandatory upon county officials by state law that a minimum of \$15 be assessed for each child of school age in the county, this tax producing the General School fund which is distributed according to methods laid down by the law. Although levied by the county board, this tax is beyond their control, just as the amount of the state levy is beyond their reach.

The result is as follows:

Total amount county levies	\$ 16.47
Less mandatory school tax, per state laws	7.62
Net amount of county assessment	\$ 8.85

This leaves then, the items of county fair, which last year cost the taxpayer in question 12 cents out of each \$100 paid; note redemption 74 cents, this amount going to meet obligations of the county; the item of \$3.07 for the county hospital, etc.; and finally the current expense item of \$4.92. These total just \$8.85 cents, which also equals just 8.85 per cent of the taxes in the example being used. The other \$91.15 or 91.15 per cent is beyond the reach of your county officials. They can only set an example for the rest of the taxing units.

Subtracting the charges for miscellaneous expenses from the total, leaves the net amount of the current charges:

Amount levied by county board	\$ 8.85
Less Fair, Hospital, Note Redemp.	3.93
Net amount for county current exp.	\$ 4.92

It is the current expense fund of the county which has come in for a good deal of study recently. This is the \$4.92 cent item, which if eliminated entirely would cut just that much off the \$100 taxes of Mr. Twin Falls Residence Owner. Of course it is obvious that the current expense cost cannot be eliminated, only reduced, and it is the current expense item primarily which Saturday felt the blow of the commissioners' axe.

The reason the current expense levy cannot be reduced very much is because it includes the following items of cost: All salaries of county officials and their deputies, jail, district and probate court, widows pensions, expense of indigents, fuel, light, telephone, telegraph, water, supplies, printing, records, janitor, mileage, probation officer, pensions for blind, national guard, Children's Home Finding society, surety bonds, insurance, office equipment and fixtures, elections, law library, auditing, county physician, county agent, weed department. In fact every county expense not covered under the headings of county hospital, county fair, general school and note redemption.

From the foregoing summaries, it is intended that taxpayers will have a better realization of the distribution of their tax costs, and they are given purely as a matter of information, to emphasize facts sometimes lost sight of-but of vital importance.

It is manifest, however, that a \$100 tax bill cannot be greatly reduced if the burden of the reduction is confined to whittling on the \$8.85 item controlled by the commissioners. They are doing their bit, but the futility of expecting the cutting of county expenses to solve the problem or even of making a good start in that regard, is apparent to all who will give the subject serious thought.
