Levinsky Shades Ex-Champion in Four Round Bout

Majority of Sports Writers Say 'Fish Peddler' Won

CHICAGO, (UP)—Jack Dempsey had the first advantage of his corner in the boxing bout which took place today, but he is not likely to retire. King Levinsky, Chicago younger, stunted the former heavyweight champion in a four-round exhibition bout last night at the Calumet stadium before 23,322 persons, a new indoor record. The gross receipts were \$14,997, of which Dempsey received \$12,000, and Levinsky about \$1,900. The bout was a working novelty for men at the rinkside on the outdoor. King Levinsky 18 years, Dempsey with 4 years. The United Press scored the bout even.

Dempsey Comments

"I know I looked bad last night," Dempsey told the United Press today. "But I expect to have to take a little the worst of it as I go along to get back into proper shape. I don't know whether I was or lost the fight, but if the newspapers say I lost, well, I guess I did. Levinsky is tough and has a dangerous right hand, but not one of his punches hurt me. We are going along just as we have for a month or six weeks longer. The bout isn't enough to determine whether I have a chance to bid for the title."

Dempsey, making his first appearance in a Chicago ring since he floored Gene Tunney for the celebrated "14 cent" in 1920, looked like a weak carbon copy of his opponent, who is a slighter build, a Carpenter and a fighter.

Legs Not Weak

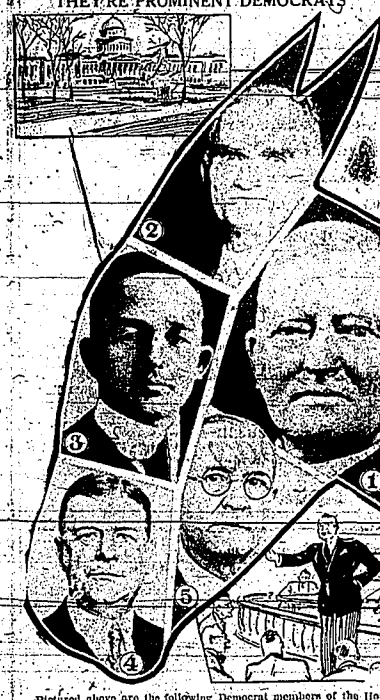

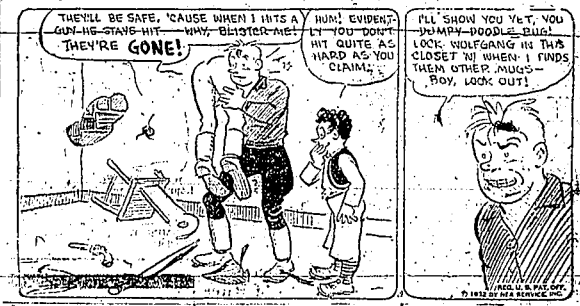
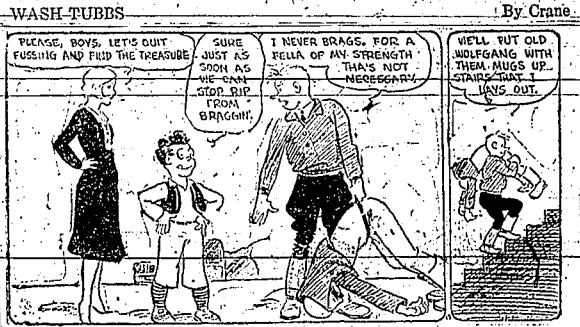

SMALL BONDS NEEDED

ONE of the most interesting suggestions made in connection with the anti-hoarding campaign is the proposal that the Reconstruction Finance Corporation offer a good block of its \$1,500,000,000 debentures in denominations small enough to attract the general public.

It is foolish to assail the practice of hoarding cash without realizing that it reflects a very widespread and deeply-rooted public distrust of many of the available mediums of investment. The best way to pull hoarded money back into circulation is to offer an investment about whose perfect safety there can be no possible argument.

Small-size bonds issued by the Corporation would provide such an investment; and it is easy to believe that, if they were made available, a perfect flood of hoarded money would come out to take advantage of the situation.

PROSPERING INDUSTRY

A SURVEY of the airplane industry in 1931 indicates that it withstood hard times about as well as any industry in the nation, despite the fact that only \$49,000,000 worth of airplanes were built as compared with planes worth twice that much in 1929.

To begin with, all the ships that were built last year were sold—which was decidedly not the case in 1929. Production was off, but it was accurately geared to consumption, which is the important thing. Furthermore, the excess stocks built up in 1929 were largely disposed of.

In addition, the air transport business showed striking gains. More lines were in operation last year, more miles were flown and more passengers were carried than that ever before.

Aviation, evidently, has become a firmly established business. Its position now is far stronger than it was before the depression began.

CLEARING THE WAY

THE average citizen, who knows practically nothing of the intricacies of high finance and who counts himself wealthy whenever his bank account gets as high as \$200, probably finds it hard to get excited about the congressional bill to expand Federal Reserve credit facilities.

He is willing to take it on faith that this is an important measure. But he can't see just how it is going to help him, and now and then he probably feels that the government might well worry more about his individual plight and less about the plight of the banks—which, he thinks, are swollen plutocratic institutions anyhow.

An examination of the things this bill will do, however, might give him a new point of view. In the end it is more likely to put money in his pocket than any other single congressional enactment.

To begin with, the bill would create new credit by making many new kinds of commercial paper eligible for discount at Federal Reserve banks. Even more important is the fact that it would permit government securities to be used as a basis for the issuance of new currency.

Under present laws, only gold or commercial paper can be used for that purpose. The depression, by contracting the flow of commercial paper, has operated in a very direct way to cut down the emission of new currency. Under the new law, it will be possible to put around \$1,000,000,000 in new money into circulation—which, in turn, will provide facilities for credit to the extent of at least \$10,000,000,000.

It will mean, in short a change from a period of "easy money." Industrialists who are postponing expensive projects will be able to get the money for them. Farmers and the small business man who have been unable to borrow the money they need should be able to get it. New orders, new business, new jobs will be the result.

Will this mean an immediate return to prosperity? Perhaps not. But it will clear the way for such a return. It will provide the only possible basis on which such a return can be made.

It is a fake issue of a newspaper called the HERALD of Good-TIMES and is issued by a Republican Citizen's Committee at Philadelphia, opposed to Prohibition. The sheet imitates a metropolitan newspaper and its contents, all imaginary, presumes that the President issued a message for prohibition repeal. It then prints fictional interviews and reactions from over the country, such as the resignation of Fess, and various other pretended statements from heads of big organizations, politicians and leaders. The issue, which is being advertised for sale in quantity lots at cheap prices, is manifestly intended to coerce the President, by indicating the committee's idea of what the public reaction would be should Mr. Hoover actually recommend that the issue of prohibition by federal statute be submitted for decision by referendum.

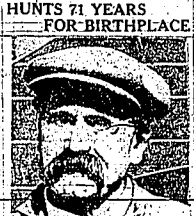

The sanitary enamel lined cans to which many foods are now sold have proved an attractive to the housewife that both grocers and housewives sometimes ask why all foods are not put up in them.

For a large proportion of all canned foods this enamel lining is unnecessary. Its sole object is to preserve the color of the foods and make the opened cans and their contents more attractive to the eye.

Tin Can Clean
A tin can is made almost wholly from two of the cleanest of metals steel and tin. A tin can is a sheet of tin steel coated with a thin layer of tin, and sometimes lined with a lacquer made of the purest and most carefully selected glass, and baked at high heat. This is sanitary enamel lining.

SOMETHING good's baking in the oven... like cinnamon, molasses, sweet-spic-it smells like gingerbread. Put crushed pineapple in the cake, or 2-grade 1 has the sweetest crust, but they're both delicious and the number is plainly stamped in the tops of the cans.

Pineapple Gingerbread: Melt together two tablespoons butter, one-half cup brown sugar, add the liquid contents of a 1 1/2-lb. can of Hawaiian crushed pineapple, and pour into a buttered cake pan. Pour over it batter made as follows: Beat one egg, add one-fourth cup sugar, one-half cup molasses, and one-third cup melted butter. Add alternately one-third cup hot water and the following stiff dry ingredients: one and one-fourth cups flour, two teaspoons baking powder, one-fourth cup crushed soda, one-half teaspoon cinnamon, one teaspoon salt, and one-half teaspoon salt. Bake about one hour. Use a moderate oven, turn-out upside-down and serve with whipped cream.
