

Levinsky Shades Ex-Champion in Four Round Bout

Majority of Sports Writers Say 'Fish Peddler' Won

CHICAGO, (UP)—Jack Dempsey had the first advantage of his corner in the boxing bout which took place today, but he is not likely to retire. King Levinsky, Chicago younger, stunted the former heavyweight champion in a four-round exhibition bout last night at the Calumet stadium before 23,322 persons, a new indoor record. The gross receipts were \$14,997, of which Dempsey received \$12,000, and Levinsky about \$1,900. The bout was a working novelty for men at the rinkside on the outdoor. King Levinsky 38 years, Dempsey 34 with 4 years. The United Press scored the bout even.

Dempsey Comments

"I know I looked bad last night," Dempsey told the United Press today. "But I expect to have to take a little the worst of it as I go along to get back into proper shape. I don't know whether I was or lost the fight, but if the newspapers say I lost, well, I guess I did. Levinsky is tough and has a dangerous right hand, but not one of his punches hurt me. We are going along just as we have for a month or six weeks longer. The bout isn't enough to determine whether I have a chance to bid for the title."

Dempsey, making his first appearance in a Chicago ring since he floored Gene Tunney for the celebrated "14 cent" in 1919, looked like a weak carbon copy of his former foe. He was slumped, wilted, Carpenter and Ferguson.

"One hundred and seven? In that right?" he asked the old man.


"Yes, that's right."


