## Twin Falls Attorney Becomes Candidate For Senatorial Post

Orr Chapman Issues Formal Statement As Democratic Aspirant For Nomination In Primary Election May 24

Announcement is made today by Orr Chapman, Twin Falls attorney and prominent Idaho Democrat of his candidacy for the Democratic nomination for United States senator in the primaries May 24.

He is the fourth to so declare himself, and although it has previously been known that he would be a candidate, his formal entry into the race did not take place until his pronouncement today. In his statement he recites the issues upon which he will make his campaign and declares himself on important problems of the hour.

Prominent Democratic citizens, among them the late George E. Clark and O'Leary, and previous to the first of the year, associated for 12 years with Judge J. R. Boothwell in the law office of the two men, are now in the Democratic circles, in state come mittlemen from Twin Falls county, was a member of the legislature in 1929, is an orator of more than local repute and has a statewide reputation as a fearless and courageous advocate of Jeffersonian principles.

For the nomination he will be opposed by Mayor James P. Pope of Boise; Lt.-Gov. G. P. Miller, Mono County, who has already announced his intentions of filing for the post.

**Life Long Ambition**

Chapman, during the past seven years, has been a member of the board of managers of numerous county central committees and from many political as well as non-political organizations, has announced his candidacy thus far.

JAMES P. KEATING, Harrison; Elmer Taylor, Coeur d'Alene; Oliver Smith, Weiser; Karl Johnson, Jerome; and others are the names most frequently heard in discussions of Republican prospects.

Lukens' Uncertain

Fred R. Lukens, present secretary of state, has indicated his desire to be a candidate for re-election. T. H. Shirets, Lukens' assistant, might be a candidate in case his chief resigns.

Among the Democrats, Frank Keenan, Boise, is a possibility, although he has given no indication of his intentions. Occasional another name is heard, but the Democratic race is still slow in taking shape.

In the senatorial race, four Democrats and one Republican have announced their candidacy, speaking Senator John Thomas, who is "fully understood" will be a candidate for re-election.





## Japan Threatens to Blow up Rail Lines; Gunfire Still Heavy

Tokio's Forces Claim Important Victories; Hope for Truce Fades; Chinese Artillery Rakes Kiangwan

SHANGHAI (UP) — The Japanese threatened today to blow up all railway lines leading to Shanghai and destroy trains unless the Chinese cease fire by noon.

The Japanese considered the threat to be an ultimatum.

The Chinese were given until 2 p. m. Tuesday to meet the demands. Otherwise the Japanese will dispatch their aerial bombing planes to wreck the Shanghai-Nanking

and Shanghai-Hangchow lines over which the Chinese may move troops from Nanking and Soochow and from Kiangsi and other southern concentration points.

Meanwhile, hope for an early truce dimmed again in Chongming, where the Chinese artillery fire on a village they had defended to the death for a week.

Truce Being Negotiated

The heavy gunfire was reduced after a truce was agreed upon between the Chinese and their defenders — and as reports were received that a truce had been reached between the Chinese and the Japanese.

Many were trapped in the upper stories of their houses by the sudden "truce" and were unable to reach ground because of intense cross-fire.

Japanese planes bombed through the early morning hours.

HOOVER FAVORS CHANGE IN LAWS OF BANKRUPTCY

Revamping Urged in Special Message To Congress

WASHINGTON (UP) — President Hoover today sent a special message to Congress urging important changes in judiciary procedure, deemed to facilitate the administration of justice.

The changes, considered by the attorney general, are submitted by the administration on the bankruptcy laws.

**BANKRUPTCY LAW CHANGES**

The President particularly stressed the importance of changes in bankruptcy laws to meet the increase in bankruptcy cases in recent years and urged legislation "to provide remedial processes in voluntary proceedings to prevent undue delay in the administration of justice."

The President plainly urged that criminal procedure should be simplified.

He suggested that the laws be revised to furnish motions to summarily evict tenants because of disqualification of rental property.

Makes Recommendations

The President recommended:

1. That the Supreme court be authorized to prescribe uniform rules of practice and procedure for all federal courts.

2. That legislation be enacted permitting an accused person to waive the requirements of indictment by grand jury, and speed the entire process.

3. That legislation be passed providing that no less than 30 eligible jurors shall be drawn from the community in which the trial is held.

4. That the juvenile cases be turned over to state authorities to handle.

5. That a corporation operating in one state be incorporated in another state.

6. That Congress act on recommendations by the attorney general to amend the bankruptcy law in the District of Columbia.

7. That the bankruptcy laws be extended to cover all debts, including debts of individuals, partnerships, corporations, and associations, both debtors and creditors.

8. That legislation be broadened in seeking discharge of debts.

The President said:

"Inability to pay debts is a social evil which must be remedied."



Japanese soldiers shown here are dragging field pieces to the front lines in their onslaught on the Woosung front north of Shanghai.









## INSTALLMENT AUTO TAGS

AUTHORITIES in Arkansas have found a novel way of making the depression easier for motorists, simply by permitting automobile owners to pay for their 1932 license tags in installments instead of in a lump sum, as is usually the rule.

Many taxpayers are unable to pay the full amount now, but can pay part of it now, part of it in June and the remainder in September. And the plan has much to commend it.

There are those, of course, who insist that people whose incomes have been radically reduced by unemployment or part-time work have no business trying to run their automobiles. But the auto, in a great many cases, is an absolute necessity. A ruling that permits the ordinary citizen to continue using his auto when he is hard up is apt to be a wise one.

ORR CHAPMAN

## THE PROBLEM AT GENEVA

AS the so-called disarmament conference drags along at Geneva, it becomes more and more apparent that few, if any, of the governments represented there are really looking for disarmament.

The problem is a tougher one than we had supposed. For rivalry in armaments is, after all, only a symptom, not a disease in itself. It is an effect, not a cause.

Back of it lies the fact that we have a world civilization in which international differences, in the last analysis, can only be settled by force. As long as we have such a set up, everybody concerned will keep on maintaining the instruments by which force is applied.

All of this becomes clear when you examine the specific points on which discussion at Geneva has been going forward.

A recent cable pointed out that only the American delegation is opposed to the abolition of the battleship. The other naval powers are willing to do away with it. Uncle Sam demurs.

Now when you get right down to it—what earthly difference does it make?

The word battleship evolved from the old expression, line-of-battleship, which meant a ship carrying enough heavy guns to be able to take its place in the main line of battle where the hardest blows are given and received. In the old sailing ship days such vessels were three-deckers, mounting from 74 to 100 guns. Lighter one and two-deck ships—frigates, corvettes, sloops-of-war and so on—were meant for scout work.

Suppose that every navy sank its battleships; what then? The most powerful ships remaining, whatever their type, would become line-of-battleships—would be counted on to do the heavy work when two fleets collided. At present, these would probably be the 10,000-ton, eight-inch gun treaty cruisers.

Destroy the 30,000-ton dreadnaught, and you simply promote the heavy cruiser to take its place. The essential situation remains precisely the same. You may economize slightly on construction costs, but the navy as a fighting machine remains practically unchanged.

The delegates at Geneva, in other words, are squabbling over minor points. You can't abolish armaments without abolishing the causes that lead to war, any more than you can abolish unemployment without doing something that leads to depression.


