

REGISTRATION FOR PRIMARY TO OPEN ON MONDAY MAR. 7

County Auditor Distributes Supplies This Week; New Rules for Electors

In preparation for the opening of the election registration period Monday, March 7, County Auditor Harry C. Parsons will this week be engaged in the task of distributing registration supplies to the 27 registrars in the county.

No elector who voted in the last general election in the state precinct in which no new residents will be required to re-register for the primary or general election. But he who has removed his residence to another precinct, he may register there at any time after the date of the registration.

The period for registration with the various registrars will remain open until 6 o'clock on the evening of Monday, March 7. The primary election date is Tuesday, May 24. The registration books will then be closed until the following Saturday when they are to be reopened for general election registration, Parson's statement.

Nash other than farming, or to finance other business.

No loan will be made for the purchase of machinery or livestock, or for the purchase of livestock other than work stock used in crop production.

Loans will not be made to pay taxes, or on interest on delinquent loans.

The right is reserved to make payment of the loans in installments.

The loan will be payable on or before November 30, 1932, and will bear interest at the rate of 6 per cent.

The sum of \$100,000,000 has been allocated to the department of agriculture by the Corporation for Loans to Individual Farmers, with preference given to those who are engaged in crop raising in 1932.

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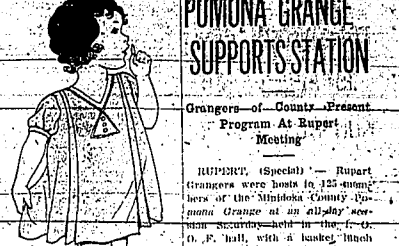

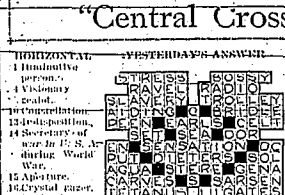

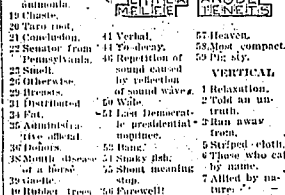
