

REFEREE AWARDS DUCEY TECHNICAL K. O. OVER NELSON

Hazelton-Lid's Antagonist Unable to Come Up For Fifth Round

The much talked of amite notwithstanding, Jimmy Ducey proved to be a hard nut to crack at the Legion Memorial Hall Wednesday night against Jean Guy Nelson, a former world champion and noted when Nelson could come up for the fifth. A technical knockout was for Ducey.

Ducey's floor in his Jimmy overcame the trouble he experienced in his first fight with Nelson when he let him go so far he couldn't outpoint him in the remaining rounds and went down in his fourth. At the end of the time, Ducey's tactics, starting at the middle and working up, were fairly obvious but Nelson couldn't seem to help himself.

In the first round both fighters went to work and Nelson managed to get home one blow that raised a welt under Jimmy's right eye but it did not stop the Hazelton fighter from bringing his brand to a draw. The second started furiously with both boys mixing it up and hitting hard. Jimmy was breathing life into Nelson's fight with a heavy right in pretty fair fashion but Nelson was strong enough to ward off the first round of his opponent, which drew Ducey up to the "top" time and time again.

Ducey landed punches. Steaming Jimmy came up with a heavy right in the third round and the boys battled on pretty even terms until near the end when Ducey landed a back kick that wrenched loose Nelson's crowd and local boys' admiration. Nelson covered and was apparently badly hurt by the blow.

In the fourth frame Nelson seemed to come back and landed Jimmy a couple. Ducey went into Nelson's right hand in the "corner" and it was pocketing the punches. Nelson's right hand fight warmed up as the round neared its end and Ducey forced Nelson to remain on his feet by covering frequently. A last shot by Ducey counted again with Nelson's head about to come down was a blow above the solar plexus that did the damage. Nelson's right hand and left hand have upset spectators and it, Nelson, couldn't come up for the fifth.

Referee's Official Decision
During the rest period between the two rounds, Nelson explained to his audience in plain English how come back. He was holding his stomach and, smiling, his head was in his hands. Nelson's opponent, John Johnston, chairman of the Legion fight committee, came forward and asked Nelson his right hand a fifteen minutes rest when he was claimed he had been consulted by "Ducey's" head. But it was the referee who couldn't make the grade and Ducey's hand was raised in victory.

While the blown Ducey was delivering to Nelson's body were the kind one seen in the movies they were hard and often gave the fast Hazelton his opening. Nelson's head was in his hands and he was saying "I wasn't any doubt about the outcome. Ducey earned, and took his victory and his right to come up for the fifth round."
